New Transportation Ordinance Passes Huntsville City Council

Huntsville City Council President Will Culver carried a unanimous vote at the most recent meeting of the Huntsville City Council, approving taxi-style private driver services Uber and Lyft to operate in Huntsville.

After much research, debate and long anticipation, Huntsville joins the ranks of larger cities in offering the mobile app private driver services.

While the Huntsville City Council has approved Uber and Lyft to operate within the city of Huntsville, each company will still have to seek licensure and other approvals.

With the safety of the citizens at the forefront of its decision, the Huntsville City Council amended the taxi ordinance and will require Uber and Lyft to conduct annual background checks on their drivers, annual vehicle inspections and additional liability insurance.

Although neither Uber nor Lyft has yet to submit the formal paperwork to the City of Huntsville requesting to operate, with the expressed interest from the companies and the frequent business travelers to Huntsville, I am certain that it will not be long before at least one is operating within the city limits.

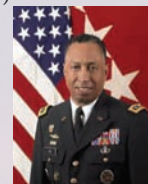

Last week, the Huntsville Spiritual Chorale, under the direction of Brenda and William Davis, performed in Baton Rouge, La., at the HERITAGE Festival of Negro Spirituals.

Negro spirituals are an enduring legacy and more than a century later, their messages are no less powerful or inspiring.

Where will we be acquiring the next generation of dedicated vocalists who will preserve and perform

the Spirituals? Yes, we are relying on the upcoming generations to "passionately articulate the message," according to the late W.E.B. DuBois.

Brenda and Bill are being proactive, trying to keep the authentic dialect or traditional phrasing alive by conducting workshops on the Spirituals and soliciting scholarships for students to participate in the workshops and the traveling performances.

As a 501 (c) (3), the Chorale, a non-profit organization, depends on dona-

tions. However, reaching out to the younger generation is critical.

We applaud the students who rehearsed and traveled with the Chorale for volunteering to add another musical style to their repertoire. A Washington Recap

Hello, everyone. Here are your top issues in D.C.:

1. The House and Senate were both in session. The Senate tried to finish work on the Energy Policy Modernization Act, which has stalled due to GOP objections to an amendment that would authorize \$600 million for lead abatement in Flint, Michigan (where on Sunday, Hillary Clinton spoke to a crowd of 1,000 at Flint's House of Prayer Missionary Baptist Church and called on Congress to fix the problem). It was also slated to vote on a North Korea sanctions bill.

The House took up several bills, including a bill to rein in the National Science Foundation by requiring that all research grants support the "national interest," a bill to require the Treasury Secretary to appear before Congress not less than 21 days before the federal government anticipates reaching the national debt limit, and legislation to revise the current federal food calorie labeling regime and penalties so that it is more suitable for convenience stores and other non-chain restaurant concerns that do not have a uniform menu format.

2. On Tuesday (Feb. 9), President Obama submitted his proposed Fiscal Year 2017 Budget to Congress, which will reportedly include:

- o \$300 billion in new spending for transportation projects (paid for by a \$10 per-barrel oil tax);

- o \$1.1 billion to address prescription opioid abuse and heroin use;
- o \$755 million for cancer research, as mentioned in his State of the Union speech;
- o \$1.8 billion for 45,000 smart bombs to use against ISIS;
- o a proposal requiring every employer not currently offering a retirement savings program to set up an auto-enrollment individual retirement account for workers (and tripling the startup credit that employers receive for offering a retirement plan); and
- o a proposal to extend the federal government's 100% funding share of Medicaid expansion costs for the first 3 years of a state's expansion, regardless of when the expansion begins (currently scheduled to decrease to 90% in 2017).

3. Recently, House Transportation and Infrastructure Chairman Bill Shuster (R-PA) unveiled his long-awaited FAA Reauthorization bill, which includes a controversial plan to privatize the federal government's air traffic control

system funded by user fees. The new non-profit air traffic control corporation would have an 11-member board, which would include the federal government, mainline airlines, general aviation users, and union representatives. The current FAA bill expires on March 31.

4. Senators Gillibrand (D-NY), Kirk (R-IL) and Moran (R-KS) introduced the "Made in America Manufacturing Communities Act," which will create a program similar to the Obama Administration's Investing in Manufacturing Communities Partnership (IMCP) initiative, which incentivizes communities to establish manufacturing partnerships by providing preferential consideration for up to \$1.3 billion in existing federal economic development assistance across 11 federal agencies, reducing current burdens faced by communities and small manufacturers in navigating and accessing federal support. Bogus Refund Claims Again Makes the IRS Take Notice

You need to be on the lookout for unscrupulous tax return preparers pushing inflated tax refund claims.

Please be wary of tax preparers that advertise outlandish refunds based on federal benefits or tax credits you've never heard of or weren't eligible to claim in the past. You should choose preparers who file accurate tax returns. Illegal scams can lead to significant penalties and interest and possible criminal prosecution.

Don't Fall Victim to Promises of Outlandish Refunds. Scam artists routinely pose as tax preparers during tax time, luring victims in by promising large federal tax refunds or refunds that people never dreamed they were due in the first place.

Scammers build false hope by tricking people into making claims for fictitious rebates, benefits or tax credits. They charge good money for very bad advice. Scam artists also victimize people with a filing requirement and who are due a refund by promising inflated refunds based on fictitious Social Security benefits and false claims for education credits, the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC), or the American Opportunity Tax Credit, among

others.

While honest tax preparers provide their customers a copy of



the tax return they've prepared, victims of scams frequently are not given a copy of what was filed. Victims also report that the fraudulent refund is deposited into the scammer's bank account. The scammers deduct a large "fee" before paying victims, a practice not used by legitimate tax preparers.

You are legally responsible for what's on your returns even if it was prepared by someone else. If you buy into such schemes, you can end up being penalized for filing false claims or receiving fraudulent refunds.

You can help protect yourself by doing a little homework before picking preparers who make refund claims that may sound too good to be true.

Start with the IRS Directory

of Federal Tax Return Preparers with Credentials and Select Qualifications. This tool can help you find a tax return preparer with the right qualifications. The Directory is a searchable and sortable listing of certain preparers registered with the IRS. It includes the name, city, state and zip code of:

- Attorneys
- CPAs
- Enrolled Agents
- Enrolled Retirement Plan Agents
- Enrolled Actuaries
- Annual Filing Season

Also check the preparer's history. Ask the Better Business Bureau about the preparer. Check for disciplinary actions and the license status for credentialed preparers. For CPAs, check with the State Board of Accountancy. For attorneys, check with the State Bar Association. For Enrolled Agents, go to IRS.gov and search for "verify enrolled agent status" or check the Directory.

To find other tips about choosing a preparer, better understand the differences in credentials and qualifications, research the IRS preparer directory, and learn how to submit a complaint regarding a tax return preparer, visit www.irs.gov/chooseataxpro.

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WNBA Head Named

Lisa Borders, who brings more than 25 years of experience in operations, marketing, government relations and public service, has been appointed President of the WNBA, NBA Commissioner Adam Silver announced recently.



Borders, who served most recently as Chair of The Coca-Cola Foundation and Vice President, Global Community Affairs at The Coca-Cola Company, will lead the world's premier women's basketball league, which tips off its historic 20th season on May 14. She will join the WNBA on March 21.

Borders was instrumental in bringing the WNBA to Atlanta in 2008, when she served as Vice Mayor of Atlanta and President of the City Council. The Atlanta Dream has since become a mainstay of the Atlanta sports scene and part of the fabric of the local community.

"As a proven executive with a passion for the WNBA and the game of basketball, Lisa is the right leader at a pivotal time in the league's history," said Silver. "She will be responsible for spearheading our efforts to strengthen the WNBA and accelerate its growth."

"The WNBA has reached a significant milestone, and I feel privileged to be joining the league at such an exciting time," said Borders. "I have always been a staunch supporter of this league and its tremendous athletes. I am impressed by their talent and inspired by their passion. The
