Here is what's happening in Washington, D.C., the nation's capital, this week:

1. CONGRESS. The House and Senate are in recess this week and will reconvene on Feb. 26 (Senate) and Feb. 28 (House). Last week, the Senate approved a \$95 billion Ukraine/Israel/Taiwan military aid bill on a 70 to 29 vote with 22 Republicans voting in favor. The House last week impeached Homeland Security Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas on a narrow 214-213 vote, but failed to bring up for debate a bill that would have lifted the state and local tax (SALT) deduction cap from \$10,000 to \$20,000 for married couples for the current tax year and abruptly canceled action on a bill to reauthorize Section 702 of the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act (FISA), which expires on April 19. Approximately 40 Members of the House and Senate traveled to Germany over the weekend (joined by Vice President Harris and Secretary of State Blinken) to attend the annual Munich Security Conference. The newest Member of the House, Rep.-elect Tom Suozzi (D-NY), will be sworn in when the House reconvenes next week, resetting the House party breakdown to 219 Republicans and 213 Democrats with 3 vacancies. 2. THE WHITE HOUSE. The President will submit his Fiscal Year 2025 Budget to Congress on March 11 (4 days after his State of the Union Address on March 7) and will welcome Polish President Andrzej Duda and Prime Minister Donald Tusk for a joint meeting at the White House on March 12. 3. SUPREME COURT. On Wednesday, the Supreme Court heard arguments in a case brought by Ohio, Indiana, and West Virginia against the

geting power plants and other industrial sources of pollution. The case is Ohio v. EPA. 4. JANUARY INFLATION REPORT. Last Tuesday's Labor Department price index report showed that the drivers of inflation have shifted from goods, like used cars, gasoline and groceries, which are now falling in price or rising much more slowly, to services, including hotel rooms, restaurant meals and medical care. 5. HOUSE RETIREMENTS. Last week, House Homeland Security Committee Chair Mark Green (R-TN) announced his retirement, becoming the 4th GOP Committee Chair and 21st House Republican to announce retirement or an intent to run for other office. On the other side of the aisle, 23 House Democrats have done the same. Chair Green joins departing House Appropriations Committee Chair Kay Granger (R-TX), House Financial Services Committee Chair - and recent Interim House Speaker - Patrick McHenry (R-NC), and House Energy and Commerce Committee Chair Cathy McMorris Rodgers (R-WA) in the exodus.

6. HIGHER EDUCATION.



It is the product of a forwardlooking, upwardstriving people." - Albert Murray Last week, the U.S. Department of Education (ED) hosted the second of three negotiated rulemaking sessions on Title IV program integrity and quality issues, including accreditation, state authorization, distance education, return of Title IV funds, cash management and TRIO eligibility. Many of the issues raised in the first rulemaking session held in January reemerged in the second

session. They include a shared commitment between ED and negotiators to simplify processes around return of Title IV funds and disagreements over how to capture withdrawal dates for students enrolled online. Other areas of conflict included cash management proposal to require colleges to move to an "opt-in" model for including textbooks in tuition and fees, the regulation of distance education programs,

and state authorization issues around reciprocity agreements. At this point it is unclear if negotiators can reach consensus on these issues.

"The Setup"



FEBRUARY 23 - W.E.B. Du Bois - After completing graduate work at the University of Berlin and Harvard, where he was the first African American to earn a doctorate, he became a history, sociology, and economics professor at Atlanta University. A founder of the NAACP in 1909, Du Bois had risen to national prominence as a leader of the Niagara Movement, a group of African American activists who wanted equal rights for Black people. He was against the Atlanta compromise, crafted by Booker T. Washington. Instead, Du Bois insisted on full civil rights and increased political representation, which he believed would be brought about by the African American intellectual elite.

Let me tell you, believer, God is a God of restoration. Once you let go of the wheel, earnestly pray to Him about the circum-



Remembering "The Black Mamba": Kobe Bryant's Greatest Winning Shots

"If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." - 1 John 1:9

On February 8, Kobe Bryant's widow Vanessa memorialized her husband at the unveiling of his statue at the Crypto.com Arena, his last home court, with one of his sayings:

"Leave the game better than when you found it, and when it comes time for you to leave, leave a legend,"... And that, he did," <u>Vanessa Bryant Delivers Emotional Speech At Unveiling</u> <u>Of Kobe Bryant Statue.</u>

Four years ago, the January 26th helicopter crash killing Basketball Hall of Fame shoo-in Kobe Bean Bryant caused many to mourn this tragedy, but also to remember his outstanding on- and off-court accomplishments.

The media covered widely his winning shots in basketball games, but it provided less coverage of his winning shots in the game of life.

Kobe's Kudos

- A high school 1080 SAT score and conversant in Italian, French, Dutch, Serbian, Slovenian and Spanish languages;
 First guard to leap directly from high school into pro basketball;
- One of the first Black second-generation NBA players;Five championship rings, 18 All-Star Game appearances, and two Olympic gold medals;
- 102 current NBA players wear Kobe 4 sneakers; and
- 2018 Oscar, Sports Emmy, and Annie Awards!

Kobe's Calamity

The media will remind us of his July 2003 sexual assault charge from a 19-year-old Denver, CO, hotel attendant charges later dropped and settled out of court following his public apology.

Kobe's Comeback

Media coverage, however, was not as widespread in April 2005, when Kobe and wife Vanessa held a recommitment ceremony - his marital apology.

In five years, Kobe rose from the NBA's Most Vulnerable Player in some eyes to its 2008 Most Valuable Player. "I will not make the same mistakes in the future that I have made in the past. I will make new mistakes, I am sure. And I will learn from them, too.

It's like, God blessed me with the ability to do this, I'm not going to shortchange that blessing. I'm going to go out there and do the best that I can every single time."

Subsequently, his product endorsements returned, and he died as the highest-paid team-sports player in history, worth an estimated \$770 million.

Again, so long, Kobe. And thanks for both the kudos and, more importantly, your comeback from calamity.

A native of Oneonta, Ala., Jacquelyne Kyle Bennett, performed phenomenally as a supervisory human resources specialist in the Civilian Personnel Advisory Center of Redstone Arsenal. She served as a personnel management staffing specialist from 1968-69. From 1969-79, Bennett was a supervisory personnel staffing specialist. She served as an employee relations specialist from 1979-84, a supervisory employee relations specialist from 1984 until her retirement in July 2015, with 48 years of government service in human resources.

She earned a master's degree in personnel administration and psychology in 1995 from Alabama A&M University, where she earlier received a bachelor's in secondary education and English in 1967.

Elder Bennett has given in service to Fellowship Presbyterian Church for over 45 years. She serves as the Team Convener for The Witness and Service Ministry Team Food Distribution Program of Fellowship Presbyterian Church. During the third week of each month she can be found at Fellowship at various times organizing, preparing, and supervising for food distribution. Bennett and volunteers work to set out over 200 boxes, drive personal vehicles to retrieve food and then unload the boxes at the church, and then deliver food boxes to infirmed individuals or those without transportation. In addition to the list of families on the distribution roll the distribution program has provided additional boxes to families at Thanksgiving and Christmas. Elder Bennett donated a customized storage facility at Fellowship to fulfill a long-standing and dire need for administering the food program and securing storage of food items and materials.

Additionally, her soprano voice has been has been a mainstay for three choirs at Fellowship: the Inspirational Choir; the Unity Choir and the Chancel Choir. One would be hard pressed to find another soloist to ever attempt to sing "Deep River" or "I've Been Redeemed" after 'Ms. Jackie' has put her voice to it.

Her music ministry also serves the community as a member of the Nell Lane Bradford Legacy Choir which sings at the Gala Banquet for the Bradford Scholarship Foundation, Incorporated.

Elder Bennett has served on the Drama Team and Planning Team for many celebrations at Fellowship Presbyterian Church. For the 2019 Black History Month Celebration she portrayed black educator and civil and women's rights leader Mary McLeod Bethune with great passion.

Elder Bennett is also



a member of Fellowship Presbyterian Church Presbyterian Women, whose purpose is to nurture faith through prayer and Bible study. She has volunteered to lead many of the Bible study lessons, which require considerable research and preparation.

This loyal daughter of Alabama A&M University celebrated her 50th year college reunion on the campus during Founder's Day and Class Reunion weekend May 2017. Mrs. Bennett and her Golden Class raised over \$50,000 to celebrate their 50 vears.

Mrs. Bennett for 16 years has worked tirelessly as a fund raiser for the Annual Alabama A&M University Black Tie Scholarship Gala, a premier fundraising event designed to close the financial gap of students aspiring toward higher education. Last year alone, she raised over \$13,000 and, through her community outreach efforts, she has helped raise \$140,000.

AAMU Prepares for 24th Annual Black Tie Gala

Rapper, producer, and beatboxer Doug E. Fresh will headline entertainment for the 24th Annual Alabama A&M University Black Tie Gala, April 19, 2024 at the AAMU Event Center. The music lineup will also include Grammywinning Rebirth Brass Band.

Known as the Human Beat Box, Doug E. Fresh and a team of fellow DJs - the Get Fresh Crew burst onto the Hip-Hop scene with the release of "The Show" in 1985. The song was only the fourth rap single to reach gold record status. Fresh was a pioneer of "beatboxing" the mimicry of early drum machines to back emcees or rappers in cyphers in the early years of New York Hip-Hop.

Formed in 1983, the Grammy-winning Rebirth Brass Band is a true New Orleans institution. The band is known for combining New Orleans brass band music, including the tradition of second line, with funk, jazz, soul and hip hop. Rebirth has evolved from playing the streets of the French Quarter to playing festivals and stages all over the world.



"Do Whatcha Wanna" has become one of the most famous songs in the modern brass band repertoire. Featuring call and response amongst instruments and drums, this contemporary New Orleans hit is built on the "Bamboula" rhythm played by the bass drum. Other favorites like "Feel Like Funkin' It up" and "We Come to Party" depict Rebirth's festive vibes and bring the spirit of New Orleans alive whenever they take the stage.


