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
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HIC Plans for "Meet Your Muslim Neighbor"

If you cannot affirm living such a life, there is still time. Invest in you. Invest in developing your potential. Invest in the belief that you are capable. And remember that above all, you define what success looks like to you.

Never tremble in stating who you are because the proclamation doesn't match up to someone else's résumé. You are who you are, and you have the power to be you extremely well. Do not drown in a hand-me-down life when you are continuously being equipped to lead one custom-made just for you.

"Military Milestoner" Martha McSally Squealed, Revealed - and Healed

"For his anger endureth but a moment; in his favour is life: weeping may endure for a night, but joy cometh in the morning" Psalm 30:5, King James Version. (CNN, 3/7/19)

Freshman Sen. Martha McSally of Arizona revealed Wednesday that she was raped while she served in the military.

McSally, who is a Republican, made the revelation during a Senate Armed Services subcommittee hearing on sexual assault in the military.

McSally said to witnesses present, "So like you, I am also a military sexual assault survivor," but she says she did not report and did not trust the system to do so. Welling up with emotion, McSally said she almost left the Air Force over her despair.

"Like many victims, I felt the system was raping me all over again. But I didn't quit, I decided to stay," she said after taking a pause to gather herself.

She called the issue of sexual assault in the military a "deeply personal" topic for her.

"We've come a long way to stop military sexual assault but we have a long way to go," McSally said.

An aide to the senator told CNN that she has spent the past several days working on the testimony. McSally felt the need to come forward because she wanted to speak honestly with witnesses.

McSally rose to the rank of colonel in the US Air Force before retiring. She was the first American woman to fly in combat after a ban on women was lifted.



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Calhoun Announces Results of Nursing Exams

Calhoun Community
College officials today announced that the most
recent graduates from the
college's Associate Degree Nursing (ADN) and
Licensed Practical Nursing
(LPN) programs performed extremely well on
their licensure exams, with
both groups outpacing
state and national passage

According to Bret McGill, dean of Calhoun's Health Sciences division, of the 127 registered nursing students taking the NCLEX (National Council Licensure Examination) during the 2018 testing cycle, a total of 117 or 92.13% passed the exam on their first attempt, exceeding both the state (87%) and national (88.3%) rates. Calhoun's 3-year average for passage rates for the ADN exam is 92.2%.

Calhoun LPN graduates had even more impressive results, with a perfect 100% passage rate from the 26 students testing, compared to the state average of 94.7% and the national rate of 85.9%. Three-year average for the college's LPN

graduates is 97.14%.

McGill attributed the impressive results to several factors. "We feel that changes made over the last several years in our program such as admissions standards, increased professional development for the faculty, and utilization of best practices in curriculum delivery and assessment from across the Alabama Community College System have contributed significantly to the continued gains we've experienced in our passage rates."


Champion Game Plan for Life

Spotlight on Our Elders ... Featuring

Mr. Bob Petty

Mr. Bob Petty has served in some capacity as an education professional for well over 45 years, utilizing his extensive experience in teaching, training and supervision in various settings to impact the lives of hundreds of young men and women.

Petty earned the Bachelor of Science degree in engineering technology and the M.Ed. degree in industrial technology education from historic Alabama A&M University. He went on to pursue additional studies at Athens State University, Mississippi State University and Winston-Salem State University (N.C.). These institutions equipped Petty with a proven ability to teach electricity, electronics and applied physics, as well as to serve as an able supervisor of both students and other teachers.

The educator traces his long length of service back to his nearly 30-year affiliation with J.F. Drake State Commu-

nity and Technical College where, from 1972-2000, he ably taught in and ultimately led the Department of Electronics/ Electricity, providing able guidance to instructors,

supervising the total operations of the unit, counseling and interviewing students for enrollment, coordinating and spurring job placement for graduating students, serving on boards and committees, and even networking with high schools and technology centers.

From 2000-2010, Petty served as an education service provider for AWS Limited, where he served as a liaison between the firm and various area colleges, in addition to securing tutoring, transporta-

tion and housing for international students. During the period, he primarily served as an education service provider for the National Training Board (NTB)-Bermuda, operating

as liaison between NTB and Tennessee Valley area colleges and universities.

Further, Petty maintains a nearly 20-year affiliation with the North Alabama Center for Educational Excellence (NACEE), providing tutorial services to high school students, developing partnerships with community industries and agencies, and counseling and interviewing students.

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Here are the top issues in Washington, D.C., for this week's edition.

- 1. The House and Senate are in session this week. The Senate will vote on a resolution terminating President Trump's Southern Border Emergency Declaration, which the House approved 2 weeks ago by a vote of 245-182. According to published reports, there are now 4 Senate Republicans who have announced they oppose the emergency declaration - Senators Paul (KY), Murkowski (AK), Collins (ME), and Tillis (NC) – who, if they vote yes on the resolution along with all Democrats, would send it to the President for an expected veto (the first of his presidency). The House, among other items, will vote on a series of bills dealing with Russia and the Putin regime and a bill urging Special Counsel Robert Mueller's report to be made public when it is issued. 2. On Monday, Presi-
- dent Trump transmitted his Fiscal Year 2020 Budget to Congress, which was delayed for a month because of the 35-day government shutdown earlier this year. According to White House officials, we should expect at least a 5% across-the-board cut in domestic spending, \$8.6 billion for the Mexican border wall, and a big boost to defense spending items which will have a hard time moving forward in the Dem-

ocratic-controlled House.

On Thursday, the President will meet with Irish Prime Minister Leo Varadkar for the annual Shamrock Bowl Presentation and attend the Friends of Ireland luncheon in the Capitol.

3. According to a report late yesterday, the White House plans to again use its budget proposal to push measures that would put colleges on the hook for how well their students do after graduation, Although it's unclear exactly how the administration will make its risk-sharing pitch, the report states its FY 2020 budget proposes to hold institutions of higher education accountable for results by requiring colleges and universities to share a portion of the financial responsibility associated with Federal student loans to encourage them to improve performance. The Trump administration also used its fiscal 2019 proposal to endorse the idea of evaluating colleges based on the rate at which their students repay their federal loans. Risksharing has drawn bipartisan support in Congress, which is working yet again to rewrite the federal higher education law.

4. On Tuesday, the House Communications and Technology Subcommittee held a hearing on a bill by Rep. Mike Doyle (D-PA) to restore net neutrality protections (which bar internet service providers from intentionally blocking, slowing down, or charging money

for specific online content), which were repealed by the Trump Administration in 2017.

5. Last week, in a noteworthy move for the GOPcontrolled Senate, Senate Judiciary Committee Chair Lindsey Graham (R-SC) announced that he will hold a hearing on March 26 on the topic of gun control, focusing on "red flag" laws, which allow family members, school officials or law enforcement officers to seek a court order to confiscate guns from an individual who is considered an extreme risk to themselves or others (currently 15 states have red flags laws on the books). In February, the House passed legislation extending the review period for background checks on firearm purchases and requiring all gun sellers, including gun show sellers, to conduct background checks on firearm buyers.

6. The National Park Service last week issued its initial prediction that peak cherry blossom bloom on the Tidal Basin will occur April 3-6. The buds are currently a bit behind where they were at this date last year, but the current weather forecasts through the rest of March point to warmer temperatures to bring things back up to speed. The Washington Post issued its own prediction of a slightly-earlier peak bloom on April 1-5. In case you're keeping score, the cherry trees reached the "green bud" stage on March 5, with 4 more stages to go before peak bloom.

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
