OU Receives SACSCOC Reaffirmation

Oakwood University recently underwent its site visit and accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) from February 20-23, 2023.

President Leslie Pollard presented the results of the site visit to the faculty and staff. The University was fully accredited for another ten years with only one minor recommendation, which was resolved immediately.

The magnitude of the success experienced by the institution during this reaccreditation is reflected in the words of the SACSCOC On-site Visit Committee chair, who acknowledged that she had never been part of a visit that ended with almost 100% compliance during her several years of collaboration with SACSCOC.

Accreditation is crucial to universities, as it determines their eligibility to receive federal and state funds, their ability to transfer credits with other schools, and their ability to earn recognition from students, other universities, businesses, nonprofit and government communities. Regional accreditation is the way that the federal government ensures com-



pliance with federal laws and mandates for higher education, as well.

The University gives thanks to God for the unity, outstanding teamwork, and shared vision demonstrated by all constituents during the SACSCOC visit, which can now be safely said was a coronation visit ordained by the Almighty.

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Washington in One Minute



Here are the happenings in Washington, D.C., this week:

1. CONGRESS. The Senate is in session this week. while the House is out. Last Tuesday, Senate Intelligence Committee Chair Mark Warner (D-VA) introduced bipartisan legislation that would grant the Biden administration new powers to regulate popular Chinese video-sharing platform Tik-Tok and other foreign-owned apps. 3 Senators are out this week: Senate Republican Leader Mitch McConnell (R-KY) is hospitalized due to a concussion he suffered in a fall at D.C.'s Waldorf Astoria Hotel last Wednesday; Sen. Dianne Feinstein (D-CA) is recovering at home from a case of shingles; and Sen. John Fetterman (D-PA) continues to receive treatment

for depression at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center.

2. THE WHITE HOUSE. On Monday, President Biden visited San Diego, CA, and met with Australian Prime Minister Anthony Albanese and U.K. Prime Minister Rishi Sunak and then attended a Democratic fundraiser that evening. On Tuesday, he gave a speech calling for tougher gun control measures in Monterey Park, CA, where a gunman killed 11 people at a dance studio in January. On Wednesday, he was in Las Vegas, NV, to give a speech on reining in prescription drug costs.

3. FEDERAL RESERVE. Last week in testimony before the House and Senate, Federal Reserve Chairman Jerome Powell said that the Fed's policymakers have

yet to decide how large an interest rate hike to impose at its next meeting on March 21-22; however, Business Insider reported Monday that Goldman Sachs is advising its clients that the implosion of Silicon Valley Bank and the resulting panic in the banking sector will prevent the Federal Open Market Committee from hiking interest rates next week. Goldman Sachs is still expecting the Fed to deliver 0.25 percentage points rate hikes in May, June, and July with a terminal rate — when officials are expected to end this rate hike cycle — of 5.25% to 5.5%.

4. HIGHER EDUCATION. Momentum for short-term Pell continues to grow. On last Friday, Rep. Bobby Scott (D-VA), the ranking member (and former chair) of the House Education and the Workforce Committee, released the House

Democrats' bill to authorize short-term or workforce Pell. The Republican Committee members released their version in January. Proponents in the Senate to extend Pell Grant eligibility to quality, short-term workforce development programs, led by Senator. Tim Kaine (D-VA) re-introduced their bipartisan proposal in January. Rep. Scott's bill comes as advocates from community colleges to business organizations highlight the expansion as an important pathway for good-paying jobs and careers. For adults, short-term Pell would make affordable programs that can quickly open job opportunities. For employers, it would open a pipeline for much-needed skilled workers.





NBA's Kobe Bryant vs. NBA 2.0's King David (Part 1 of 2) "And a little child shall lead them." - Isaiah 11:6.

As a lead-up to my upcoming book, Where Jump Shots Meet Jesus, over the next several weeks, I will illustrate how championship-winning NBA basketball parallels best practices from the Bible, the latter of which I brand "NBA 2.0."

(Wikipedia): "Bryant shot four airballs at the end of the game, and Utah won 98–93 in overtime to eliminate the Lakers 4–1. He first missed a game-winning two-point jump shot in the fourth quarter, and then misfired 3 three-point field goals in overtime, including two tying shots in the final minute. O'Neal commented that '[Bryant] was the only guy who had the guts at the time to take shots like that."

Kobe's multi-platform artistry included a 2018 Academy Award.

A Biblical "rock star" for his poetry and music, David became King Saul's harpist.

Unfortunately for many of us, our most significant defeats follow our biggest victories.
