In 2005, the Committee of 100 established the John R. Riche Scholarship program to recognize local outstanding African-American young leaders who possess the qualities of leadership, commitment to community service, and respect for diversity evidenced by the late John Riche, a Committee of 100 past Chairman and founder. Recipients receive reduced dues for two years and attend all Committee of 100 programs in addition to mentoring opportunities.

Markeeva Morgan (top right) is a program manager with Marshall Space Flight Center. He served in the U.S. Navy and received the Navy Commendation Medal. Morgan was honored by the University of Mississippi as Outstanding Young Alumni in 2007 and serves on the university's Advisory Board for the

Angela Whaley (bottom left) is a technical writer at Wyle Laboratories and ran for Huntsville City Council in 2008. Six Things to Know Before Giving

Six Things You Need To Know Before Deducting a **Charitable Donation**

You may be able to claim a deduction on your federal tax return if you gave money or goods to a charity in 2015. Here are six major facts you should know about charitable donations.

Qualified Charities

You must donate to a qualified charitable organization. Gifts to individuals, political organizations or candidates are not deductible. An exception to this rule is contributions under the Slain Officer Family Support Act of 2015. To check the status of a charity, use the IRS Select Check tool.

Itemize Deductions

You must file Form 1040 and itemize deduction



to deduct your contributions. You will need to File Schedule A. Itemized Deductions, with your federal tax return.

Benefit in Return

If you get something in return for your donation, you may have to reduce your deduction. You can

only deduct the amount of your gift that is more than the value of what you got in return. Examples of benefits include merchandise, meals, tickets to an

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stead of cash, your deduction amount is normally limited to the item's fair market value. Fair market value is generally the price you would get if you sold the property on the open market. If you donate used clothing and household items, they generally must be in good condition, or better, to be deductible. Special rules apply to cars, boats and other types of property donations.

Form to File and Records to Keep

You must file Form 8283, Noncash Charitable Contributions, for all noncash gifts totaling more than \$500 for the year.

Donations of \$250 or More

You must have a written statement from the charity if you donated cash or goods of \$250 or more. It must show the amount of the donation and a description of any property given. It must also say whether you received any goods or services in exchange for the gift.


