



Coronavirus Empties Many Church Pews

Just weeks ago, area churches were responding with benevolence to the needs of students forced off college campuses due to the anticipated spread of the deadly Coronavirus.

Now that spread has become more dire as cases continue to rise exponentially across the United States and the rest of the world.

Churches of all sizes, religions and denominations, many on the Valley, are shutting their doors in rising hope of better days.

"I am directing the

parishes and worshipping communities to extend that suspension of face-toface worship through the month of April," wrote the Rt. Rev. John McKee Sloan, bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Alabama, in a recent letter to Episcopal churches throughout the state. "Obviously, and regrettably, this includes our normal schedules for Palm Sunday, Holy Week and Easter ... Still, the mission of the Church remains ... We'll just have to find different, more creative ways to do it."

Valley Mourns Death of Native Son, "Dean"

A man referred to by the NAACP as the "Dean of the Civil Rights Movement" died Friday, March 27, in Atlanta,

Ga., at the age of 98.

Born to a teacher and grocer in Huntsville, Ala., in 1921, the Rev. Dr. Joseph Echols Lowery cofounded the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (Steady He graduated from Voliam Hooper Counce School. After his coexperiences at Knox

ership Conference (SCLC). He graduated from William Hooper Councill High School. After his collegiate experiences at Knoxville College (Tenn.), Alabama A&M University, Paine College (Ga.), and the Chicago Ecumenical Institute, Lowery pastored Warren Street Methodist Church in Mobile, Ala.

It was during this period in the 1950s when he met Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, who was then pastoring at Dexter Avenue Baptist Church in Montgomery, Ala. He is credited for helping to lead the Montgomery Bus Boycott following the arrest of Rosa Parks in 1955.

Lowery and King, with Rev. Ralph Abernathy and other civil rights activists, formed the Southern Christian

Leadership Conference in 1957. Two decades later, Lowery would head the organization set it on a new course encompassing a range of social and environmental issues.

During the historic Selma to Montgomery March in 1965, Lowery joined organizers on a mission to deliver demands to Alabama Governor George Wallace. State troopers violently attacked the peaceful marchers on the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma, leaving many of the marchers bloodied and badly beaten. Congressman John Lewis, among the marchers that day, suffered a fractured skull during the beatings.

Almost without exception, whenever there was a pivotal moment throughout the Civil Rights Movement, Lowery was a part of it.

Lowery, Rev. Ralph Aberna-

thy, Rev. Fred Shuttlesworth and S.S. Seay, Sr., were sued along with the New York Times as part of a libel suit. The men lost their cars and other property to the State of Alabama. It took the U.S. Supreme Court to reverse the decision in the landmark New York Times Co. v. Sullivan case, which many legal scholars call the most striking freedom of the press case in history.

Rev. Lowery co-founded and led a consortium of black advocacy groups that effectively protested the existence of Apartheid in South Africa from the mid-1970s through the end of white minority rule there. He also was among the first to be arrested outside the South African Embassy in Washington, D.C., during the Free South Africa movement. Dr. Lowery served as the pastor of Cascade United Methodist Church in Atlanta, Ga., from 1986 through 1992.

The distinguished leader not only received the NAACP's coveted Lifetime Achievement Award in 1997 and the Presidential Medal of Freedom from President Barack Obama in 2009. He received honorary doctorates from several colleges and universities, including Morehouse College, Alabama State University and the University of Alabama in Huntsville.

His family members are thankful to God for the favor shown upon Mr. Drake and his entire family.







Feeding by Faith

Huntsville Mayor: Neighbors Helping Neighbors

In the days since a state of emergency was declared in Huntsville, the number of confirmed cases has started to rise.

"There will be more – but how many more will depend on how well we do our part," said Huntsville Mayor Tommy Battle in an update to citizens.

Battle was referring to the 'social distancing' and frequent hand washing brought about by the onslaught of the Coronavirus 2019.

"For the past several months, our City has worked closely with public health partners to update our emergency strategies to combat this coronavirus," commented Battle. "We've had to make difficult decisions. So have all of you."

"I am so proud of how this community has come together to help each other through this challenging time," said the mayor.

HudsonAlpha has "stepped up" to provide COVID-19 testing and research, institutions and community foundations are helping business owners, and health care practitioners are working around the clock, Battle noted.

Grocery stores offer early morning senior shopping hours, and churches are helping schools serve lunch to students who no longer have a class to attend. "Neighbor is helping neighbor," said Battle.

Meanwhile, City Hall is working to keep services open and running. Sanitation crews will pick up garbage, police and fire will provide protection, and citizens can still do business over the phone and with online services.



As a result, White House officials seem baffled by this pandemic, and thereby choose to



"blame-game" others to mask their lack of preparation; positive test results from both the well-connected and the everyman paint this virus as an equal-opportunity destroyer; and to date, no domestic or foreign agency has been able to solve, cure or control it.

If these instances mirror our knowledge of the end time warnings in the Bible's Book of Revelation, then thank a loving God for allowing us this dress rehearsal.

CHARACTERISTICS OF A DRESS REHEARSAL

THEREFORE, WHAT THREE ACTS MUST WE FOLLOW?

Script-reading is over, as Bible will soon be outlawed; therefore, all lines must be memorized verbatim - no ad libs, "... leaning to your own understanding," (Proverbs 3:5a)

The main character Jesus is located in each of the 31,102 verses of the script. Find, study and share him liberally; and

Appreciate, maximize this final act's most effective tool, the "pregnant pause": a presenter's preceding words - accentuated by inserting a timed silence - to build up suspense for what is to come.

You know, there is no doubt that we are living in difficult times. Just the other day I had to wait in line just to get into a Publix grocery store.


With this Coronavirus Pandemic going on, it appears that there





These words were spoken to the



Huntsvillians Will Remember Beloved Presbyterian Minister

Many people throughout the Tennessee Valley will long remember the life and works of Rev. Dr. John Loritts Herndon, III.

Servant Leader, Humanitarian, Counselor and Pastor/ Teacher are just a few names that summarize the work that Rev. Herndon rendered to the community and the world.

Born in Lincolnton, N.C., to Mr. John and Mrs. Elizabeth Herndon, the Rosetta James Foundation Elder received his postsecondary education training at Livingstone College in biology and chemistry; University of Texas, psychophysiology; St. Mary's University, law; Southern Illinois University, urban planning; and Columbia Theological Seminary, theology.

During his professional career, he served as a research psychophysiologist, School of Aerospace Medicine, San Antonio, Tex.; research fellow, Polymer Chemistry, National Bureau of

Standards, Washington, D.C.; administrator,

NASA Technology Utilization, Washington, D.C.; mental health administrator, State of Georgia; and pastor, Fellowship Presbyterian Church, Huntsville, Ala.

While serving as the pastor of Fellowship Presbyterian Church for 24 years, he and the members of his congre-



gation implemented numerous programs to provide a service to the community and youths, such as the FASST afterschool tutorial program for elementary school children

at Martin Luther King Jr. Elementary School.

Dedicated and committed to the General Assembly and the North Alabama Presbytery of the PC (USA), he served in numerous capacities: General Assembly Committee on the Self-Development of People, 2010; adjunct professor of pastoral theology, University of Pretoria, since 2001;

chair, chairperson, General Assembly Council Nominating Committee, 1996-2000; Committee on Theological Education, 1994-2006; and many others.

As an author, he wrote meditations and other writings related to pastoral theology. He edited for publication a series of sermons and lectures presented at the General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church in Southern Africa on the Assembly's Theme of "Restoring Human Dignity."

He traveled the world, visiting over 27 foreign countries. He and his lovely wife, Mrs. Tommie G. Herndon, were the proud parents of seven (7) children, and 11 grandchil-



The House and Senate are in recess through at least April 20, 2020 (they were already scheduled to be in recess April 6-17).

On Friday, the President ordered General Motors "to accept, perform, and prioritize federal contracts for [hospital] ventilators" under the powers of the

Defense Production Act and named White House trade adviser Peter Navarro to oversee enforcement.

President Trump announced that he was extending the White House's current guidelines on social distancing through April 30 ...
