In the early hours of the morning on April 5, 1880, Cadet Johnson Whittaker, one of the first Black students in the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, was brutally beaten by white cadets while sleeping in his barracks.


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APRIL 5 - BOOKER T. WASHINGTON - Washington was from the last generation of black American leaders born into slavery and became the leading voice of the former slaves and their descendants. They were newly oppressed in the South by disenfranchisement and the Jim Crow discriminatory laws enacted in the post-Reconstruction Southern states in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. He was a key proponent of African American businesses and one of the founders of the National Negro Business League. His base was Tuskegee Institute, a historically



black college in Tuskegee, Ala. As lynchings in the South reached a peak in 1895,
Washington gave a speech, known as the "Atlanta compromise", which brought him
national fame.

Springtime: managing lawns, weeds - and egos?

"Can a leopard change its spots, or an Ethiopian his skin?" - Jeremiah 13:23

On Our Lawns, ...

Outside our home's kitchen windows are two "Hi, We're Back!" signs: green and white budding tree branch tips and purple flower-like weeds.

Spring has sprung - and with it, my constant reminder of needing God's management of things that grow naturally - like egos.

Lawn upkeep is not simply an early March one-anddone activity; instead, the best lawncare management requires constant (often weekly) mowing, pruning, trim-

ming, edging, and disposing of excesses deemed unnecessary. The lawn will not manage itself.

In February, I even applied weedkilling spray to stop that purple surge. While it's working currently, months from now, however, those purple wanna-be flowers will re-surface and therefore need re-management. They, too, will not manage themselves.

My grass and hedges will neither cut nor trim themselves; nor will my weeds cure, solve and eliminate themselves. As our lawn's steward, I can and must only manage these natural growths with consistent watch care . . .

... Just like God helps us manage our ego-holism - our addiction to self. States Ryan Holiday, author of Ego Is The Enemy: "Your ego is not some power you're forced to satiate at every turn. It can be managed. It can be directed."

... And In Our Lives

Q: Are you like me struggling unsuccessfully with such ego-holisms as procrastination, selfishness, arrogance, poor eye contact, blame-gaming (excuse-making), disorganization, and even more selfishness?

The Bad News? You and I are stuck forever with those "character potholes." They are embedded in our lives' hard-drives. And try though you and I might, those and other ego problems cannot be cured, solved or eliminates,

The Good News? Just like the even lengths of your lawn grass; the sculpted shape of your hedges; and the presence of those weeds, our lives' "character weeds" (e.g., lust, pornography, conceit, low-/no esteem, etc.) can only be managed through an ongoing management partnership with God.

Just like your and my lawns and weeds cannot cut, trim or eliminate themselves but need our regular management maintenance, our character weeds cannot solve, cure and eliminate themselves, but also need our God-us management.



awards) also received distinctions in the category.

In the 2,001-5,000-student category, HBCU Winston-Salem State received 3 distinctions.

Nominations are reviewed by a national panel of industry experts, with a possibility of 100 total points. Awards are issued for those receiving top marks from judges placing them in the top 16% of the nation for advertising excellence. Fees range from \$50 to \$75 per entry. There is no set number of awards. Depending on the number of entries per category and the quality of the materials the judges assign appropriate awards depending on the entry's overall score. The judges reserved the right to assign no winner

You Can Go Home Again: Man, Son Bound for Honduras on a Mission

After an eventful 46 vears within the United States and abroad, Leonard Hall, Sr., will be returning to spend a week in Puerto Cortes, a small town in his native country of Honduras. Puerto Cortes is located on the northern, Caribbean coastline of Honduras. Leonard and his son Leonard Ir, and at least a dozen others from metro Huntsville will travel as part of a medical and educational delegation spearheaded by St. Thomas Episcopal Church. The mission trip has been scheduled for April 20-27.

For Leonard, there is much to be excited about on this adventure.

For one, of course, there is the rare opportunity to visit his home country, praised for its amazing beaches along the Caribbean coastline, nearby vivid tropical forests, the vibrant Garifuna population, African and Spanish-infused cuisine and laid-back atmosphere.

Second, there is the mounting enthusiasm for the long-run educational mission. During the visit, Leonard will expound upon his decades of expertise, all learned and fine-tuned from the trenches and intricacies of technology,



computer programming and cybersecurity. Leonard remains fully aware that the same issues that confronted his family over generations still exist among the Honduran town's young men and women today. And, despite the undeniable tropical paradise, the average Honduran boy and girl will likely face economic hardships in terms of job opportunities, low wages, and the utter absence of upward mobility.

Third, Leonard is sponsoring a student through St. Thomas, enabling a youth to receive similar experiences in cultural exchange and understanding, service, spiritual growth, global awareness and social justice, as well as a sense of purpose and mission.

Fourth, and perhaps most important of all, is the fact that his outgoing son Lenny will be joining him on the trip to his childhood

playground, a journey even his Alabamaborn wife Brendlyn has never taken. For Lenny, the trip to his father's home country could foster crosscultural ties and lifelong relationships and connections.

"This will give Lenny a new perspective," said the fatherly Leonard. "He has always been interested in other cultures. The people (of Honduras) need a lot of help in many different areas." More than 50 years ago, these same needs for better opportunities swept up Leonard's own father in a wave of migration. His father was born in Jamaica but later moved to the United Kingdom before settling in Honduras, where he worked for the United Fruit Company, then based in Boston. The powerful, and often considered ruthless. banana monopoly eventually morphed into Chiquita Brands International, with

administrative offices in Florida and Switzerland. Leonard, however, grew up among eight sisters and four brothers in a seem-



ingly dichotomous, utopic version of Tela, Honduras, where the diverse community was comprised of Spanish speakers, persons from the West Indies, European ex-pats channeled from Venezuela, as well as other countries. Tela is located in the "department" (county) of Atlantida, and Puerto Cortes in the

"department" (county) of Cortes, key tourist areas. Nonetheless, poverty and lack of opportunities abounded.

attended the Holy Spirit Episcopal Church affiliated with the Episcopal Diocese of Honduras. The current Bishop of the Diocese is Lloyd Emmanuel Allen, and he is a native of Tela, ac well

But Leonard has not visited his home country since his military days in 1978, following basic training at Fort Jackson in South Carolina. He then went to Germany for two years to work on the Pershing missile system from 1977-79. Leonard returned to Redstone Arsenal as an instructor in 1979, and he has performed in key positions ever since.

"I'm looking forward to going to Honduras and helping the people," Leonard said. "I feel incredibly grateful for the opportunity to help those in need. It's a humbling experience that reminds me of the blessings I have in my life."
