Stallworths Make '50th Year' \$1.2 Million Gift to AAMU

"Playing football was never the end goal," said 1974 Alabama A&M University graduate and former Pittsburgh Steeler John Stallworth to spring commencement undergraduates Friday, May 3. "My goal was to own my own business. Football was the vehicle I chose to get there. I left A&M with a bachelor's degree in business and returned in the off season to receive my MBA--all in preparation for realizing my dream of having my own business."

Following his commencement address, Stallworth (2nd, r) presented to AAMU President Daniel K.Wims, VP Jamal Ali and trustees a donation of more than \$1.2 million to support student scholarships at AAMU.

Stallworth celebrated his 50th anniversary with the Classof 2024.



The excited group included 126 firstgeneration college graduates. The class--53% female and 47% male--also boasted 269 honors

graduates. Over 45 percent of the new alumni have already secured employment, 28 percent plan to continue their education,

and 5 percent will enter the military. During the recent undergraduate ceremony, 11 ROTC cadets were also commissioned.



Alabama A&M University has announced the launching of its new Ph.D. in social work program, open for enrollment in the Fall of 2024.


The program stands out as the first fully online research doctorate in social work based at

a Historically Black College and University (HBCU).

The addition, along with the new Ph.D. program in curriculum and instruction, brings AAMU's doctoral offerings to five. Sister HBCUs

4. COMMITTEES. On Wednesday, the House Energy and Commerce Committee summoned National Public Radio CEO Katherine Mayer to a hearing to investigate allegations of liberal bias by a former employee and the House Oversight Committee

held a hearing on the DC government's "response to unlawful activity and antisemitism" at the George Washington University's pro-Palestinian encampment.

5. APRIL JOBS REPORT.

Last Friday, the Department of Labor reported that the U.S. economy added fewer jobs than expected in April while the unemployment rate rose, lifting hopes that the Federal Reserve will be able to cut interest rates in the coming months. Nonfarm payrolls increased by 175,000 in April, significantly below the 240,000 estimate. The unemployment rate ticked higher to 3.9% against expectations it would hold steady at 3.8%. Average hourly earnings climbed 3.9% in April from a year earlier, which was below the 4% forecast.

6. HIGHER EDUCATION. Last week, Republican members on the House Education and the Workforce Committee released an institutional impact analysis of key portions of the College Cost Reduction

the committee on a party line vote in late January. The analysis focused on the bill's risk-sharing provisions along with "Promise Grants." H.R. 6951 also addresses accreditation, student data collection policies, Title IV program eligibility, transfer, regulatory relief and other major issues. With the release of the analysis, the committee stated that "There is bipartisan agreement that student loan debt is too high, completion rates are too low, and far too many students are left worse off after paying for postsecondary education than if they had never enrolled in the first place." The College Cost Reduction Act is not expected to be enacted in the 118th Congress.

Rep. Lands Introduces Maternal Healthcare Legislation

Rep. Marilyn Lands recently introduced bipartisan legislation to expand healthcare access for pregnant women.

The bill, HB494, the Maternal Healthcare Access Act, would extend presumptive Medicaid eligibility to pregnant women in Alabama.

In Alabama, many women struggle to enroll in Medicaid and are unable to access healthcare when they first discover they are pregnant. Rather than delay needed healthcare until their Medicaid application is approved, the bill extends presumptive coverage. Similar legislation was enacted in Mississippi in March.

The legislation is Rep. Lands' first bill and has

strong bipartisan support. She is the Alabama State House's newest member, after winning a special elec-

tion March 26. Lands based her campaign on reproductive rights, opposing Alabama's ban on abortion, in addition to supporting in vitro fertilization (IVF) in the

aftermath of LePage v. Center for Reproductive Medicine. Lands was endorsed by Planned Parenthood in the election. A major state media source noted: "The race drew national interest against the backdrop of the controversial Alabama State Supreme Court ruling that frozen embryos are

considered children under state law."

In a statement, Rep. Lands described the impor-

> tance of the bill, "The Maternal Healthcare Access Act will save lives by helping women access care in the first trimester of pregnancy. This legislation is

urgently needed to address Alabama's maternal mortality crisis."

Lands spoke publicly about the bill last week at the State House Democratic Caucus Press Conference in Montgomery.

Reps. Rafferty, Ensler, Gray, Drummond, DuBose, Collins, Hulsey, Shaver,

Daniels, Hollis, McClammy, Hall, Clarke, and McCampbell have also co-sponsored the legislation.

May God grant you spiritual success in realizing the things that really matter and then standing for the truth because it is the right thing to do.





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Goodbye, (to my) "Mr. Chips"!

"Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old, he will not depart from it." - Proverbs 22:6



My "Mr. Chips," Dr. John J. Alewynse, died on Saturday, April 20

Goodbye, Mr. Chips was a 1939 Oscar-winning psychological fiction movie depicting a beloved teacher-disciplinarian, Mr. Chipping. Alewynse was my hands-down favorite college English professor who mentored me, twice.

In our English 501 History of the English Language course during my super-senior year, he caused us English majors at then-Hampton Institute to elevate our "Black English" slang and see it quite differently.

ENG 501 illustrated how language morphs over centuries by dropping its inflections or endings. The verb "doeth" evolved to "doth" and now to "does," Alewynse offered.

He then asked, "First-person singular?" We answered, "I do."

Second-person singular? "You do."

Now, third-person singular? "He, she, or it does." D'uh.

Then, he pivoted: "But now what does the less formally educated English-speaking person say for the third person singular?" With a smirk, we blurted out, "He, she, or it do!"

"Do you see what happens in terms of language? Although we consider such persons who say, 'he, she, or it do' to be less educated, in reality, what they have done quite naturally is drop off the inflection "e-s" from the ending and simply say, he, she, or it 'do.'

"Perhaps it would be safe to say that what is called 'Black English' is really the language of the future, based on historical patterns."

The "Bro-mance" 2.0

That afternoon in November 1976, John Alewynse became "m'brotha." Some 20 years later, I was pleased to recount that educating moment to him. I had returned to work at Hampton as its assistant freshman studies director, and he was then in a position to further educate me.

As now the department chair, Alewynse approved my becoming an adjunct instructor and offered me the opportunity to teach freshmen in my college major.

Today, I'm not only a four-time Amazon best-selling author but am also creating my first online course and launching my first webinar, "How to Tell, then Sell Your Story Without Losing Your Control-or, Your Money!" - thanks largely to Dr. John Alewynse's mentoring.



Born in Scottsboro, Alabama, Mr. Allen (Ben) Cothron was the middle child of loe and Buth Born in Scottsboro, Alabama, Mr. Allen (Ben) cothron was the middle child of loe and Buth

child of Joe and Ruth Cothron. He attended Carver High School 11 years before transferring to Councill Training School in Huntsville, Alabama, from which he graduated in 1964.

Following high school, Cothron attended Alabama A&M College (University) for three years before being drafted into the Army. After completing six weeks of Basic Training at Fort Benning, Georgia, he received his first stripe of Private First Class. He was sent to the Adjutant General School at Fort Benjamin Harrison in Indiana.

He was enrolled in the Stenography Class, which was an accelerated program. After completing the course, his first assignment was the Assistant to the Commandant of the Army Management School at Fort Belvoir, Virginia. After a year at the Army Management School, Cothron received his orders for Vietnam. Upon arriving, he was assigned to the 18th Engineer Brigade in Cam Ranh Bay. While waiting for his new assignment, he filled sand bags for two weeks. Finally, he was assigned to an artillery unit in Nha Trang, South Vietnam. He asked about

his MOS (71C30 - Stenography) and was told, "We don't need no stenographers; we need fighting men!" He was placed in an artillery unit (First Field Force Artillery Unit). He received his second stripe of corporal. Some of the decorations, medals, commendations, citations and campaign ribbons he received were: 1) National Defense Service Medal; 2) Vietnam Service Medal; 3) Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal w/60 Device; 4) Expert Badge (M-14 Rifle); 5) Expert Badge (M-16 Rifle); and 6) Special Training (71C30 Stenography).

After spending a year in Vietnam, he was stationed at Fort Eustis, Virginia, in the 1097th Transportation Company as Company Clerk. While at For Eustis, Cothron received his third and final stripe, the rank of Sergeant. After completing his obligations to the U. S. Army, he was granted an Honorable Discharge. Following a short time in retirement, he went to work for Science and Technology Inc. (SCI), a civilian contractor company on Redstone Arsenal, Huntsville, Alabama. He worked as a facilitator/instructor, managing the Army Education Satellite Program. Among the courses he facilitated were: Defense



Small Purchases; Defense Acquisition Contracts (Basic and Advanced); Contracting Officer Representative (COR); Provision; Basic Logistics Support Analysis and Commodity Command Standard System.

Cothron participated in many workshops and conferences designed to promote the intellectual warfare of the student. He retired after 10 years with Science and Technology Inc. After another short time in retirement, he was called back to Science and Technology Inc. by the Vice President, who wanted Cothron to join the "Score Team" and travel to Fort Huachuca, Arizona, to help revise the Standard Operation Procedure for purchasing material for the Army Installation, for which SCI had a service contract. After completion of the task at Fort Huachuca, he retired for the final time.

The Village of Promise (VoP) was founded in 2011 by (Mrs.) Bobby Bradley and Gloria Batts to address the pressing needs of children and families in distressed, high poverty neighborhoods through a multi-generational approach to education and services.

Famed former NASA astronaut Mae Jemison, M.D., addressed VoP's recent 2024 Speaker Series event on Tuesday, April 23, in the more than 600-person Saturn Ballroom of the Von Braun Center. An accomplished entrepreneur, engineer, physician, educator and humanitarian, Jemison leads efforts to link the physical and social sciences with art and culture to solve problems and foster innovation.

"Everyone has a right to be involved with what happens in the world today," Dr. Jemison told local media covering the event. "I also want us to hope for the best--to wish for the best-- for our fellow humans and for our fellow creatures on this planet. That will take us a long way toward moving forward."

During her captivating presentation, Dr. Jemison invited the audience to consider their individual reactions to a world of both scarcity and abundance, and how they can make generational impacts within the 86,400 seconds of each passing day.

Jemison also noted children's fascination with

Jemison was selected in 1987 from 2,000 applicants for one of just 15 slots in NASA Astronaut Group 12, the first team selected following the Challenger disaster a year earlier.

Huntsville to Build New CSI Building



The City's eight-person crime scene investigation team (CSI) team in the Huntsville Police Department's Criminal Investigation Division has worked in cramped quarters for years.

Relief is on the way in the form of a new 14,000-square-foot investigation building complete with labs, office space, evidence processing areas and vehicle processing bays.

"We have the advanced technology in place for crime scene analysis, but we need dedicated space to be more efficient and process evidence faster," said Police Chief Kirk Giles.

A new CSI building will be constructed on Wheeler Avenue across from Huntsville Police Headquarters. The project also includes a separate, climate-controlled 13,500-square-foot facility for vehicle and evidence storage.

"The law requires us to hold evidence for years, and in some cases in perpetuity," said Investigator Jeremy Phipps. "The new warehouse will allow us to meet legal storage requirements for decades to come."

Along with providing additional secure storage,

Phipps says the new CSI facility will also meet the department's needs for growth.

"The additional space will allow us to add more equipment for processing evidence and the room to work multiple cases at one time while securely protecting evidence from cross-contamination," he said.

Pearce Construction has the green light to proceed with the \$9.7 million project. Work is expected to begin in late spring and should take one year to complete.
