Washington One Minute

Here are the latest top issues and events in Washington:

1. CONGRESS. The House and Senate are in session this week. Three key House committees will meet this week to mark up their pieces of the Budget Reconciliation bill/2017 tax cut reauthorization: Ways & Means, Energy & Commerce, and Agriculture. After the markups, the House GOP leadership's goal is to have the House Budget Committee assemble the bill by week's end and then bring

the package to the House Rules Committee on May 19 ahead of a floor vote later next week. Some key items expected to be included in the tax bill are a hike in the tax on university endowments, a repeal of the electric vehicle tax credit, and a rise in the cap for deducting state and local taxes from \$10,000 to \$30,000. The full House, among other bills, will vote on legislation to allow concealed carry of firearms by off-duty officers and retired officers at shopping malls, school zones, and on mass

transit. In a big defeat for the cryptocurrency industry, last Thursday the Senate failed to get 60 votes to proceed to the GENIUS Act, which would have streamlined the use of stablecoins – one of 2 main legislative items on the crypto 2025 agenda.

2. EXECUTIVE BRANCH.

On Monday, the President departed for an overseas trip to Saudi Arabia, Qatar, and the UAE, which began Tuesday. Last week, the President urged House Speaker Mike Johnson (R-LA) to establish a new 39.6% tax bracket for Americans earning \$2.5 million or more annually, or couples making \$5 million or more, as part of the new tax bill set to be considered in Congress. He also announced a comprehensive overhaul of the nation's air traffic control system,

aiming to replace outdated infrastructure with stateof-the-art fiber, wireless, and satellite technologies at over 4,600 air traffic control sites — including 25,000 new radios, over 600 new radars, and 475 new voice switches; construct six new air traffic control coordination centers; and replace towers and Terminal Radar **Approach Control Facilities** (TRACONs). According to Bloomberg Politics, as of May 1, the President is facing 328 lawsuits related to his executive orders, with the courts thus far issuing more than 200 orders halting the administration's actions in 128 cases.

3. TARIFFS. On Monday morning, U.S. and Chinese negotiators announced a 90day pause in the 145% U.S. tariff on Chinese goods and the reciprocal 125% tariffs on U.S. goods, temporarily reducing the tariffs to 30% and 10%, respectively, while negotiations continue on a binding trade deal. Last Thursday, the White House announced the outline of a trade deal between the U.K. and the U.S., which would include Britain dropping its

tariffs on U.S. beef, ethanol, sports equipment, and other products, and buying \$10 billion worth of Boeing airplanes. In return, the U.S. said it would pare back its tariffs on cars and steel, though it will maintain a 10% levy on all British exports.

4. SUPREME COURT.

The Supreme Court ruled last Tuesday that the Trump Administration may begin enforcing a ban on transgender troops serving in the military, which had been blocked by lower courts. The unsigned order provided no reasons for the ruling and will remain in effect while challenges to the transgender ban proceed. On Thursday, the Supreme Court heard oral arguments in Trump v. CASA, Inc. regarding the federal government's request to be allowed to implement President Donald Trump's January 20 executive order ending birthright citizenship.

5. STUDENT LOANS. Last Monday, the U.S. Education Department (ED) resumed collections on defaulted federal student loans for the first time since March 2020, marking the end of a pan-

demic-era pause. Borrowers who fail to resume payments may face serious consequences, including wage garnishment and withholdings from tax refunds or Social Security benefits. A new TransUnion report reveals that over 20% of borrowers are now 90 days or more delinquent—nearly double the pre-pandemic rate. ED estimates that only 38% of federal student loan borrowers are current on their payments, while almost a quarter of the portfolio is in default or severe delinquency. In a "Dear Colleague" letter, ED reminded colleges of their role in helping students manage loan repayment and warned that institutions with high default rates risk losing access to federal aid. The department also announced it will begin notifying defaulted borrowers about wage garnishment this summer and will publish updated nonrepayment data by institution later this month.



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Somebody's Mother = Somebody's Leader

"Honor your father and your mother, that your days may be long in the land the Lord your God is giving you." — Exodus 20:12

Yes, the 2025 Mother's Day weekend has passed; however now in preparation for 2026, let's now begin to expand our vision beyond cards, flowers, and Sunday brunches.

Let's honor **mothers**—married, single, biological, and spiritual—as **emerging leaders** in our homes, communities, and organizations.

We often picture leaders in suits and corner offices. But the most transformational leadership may be happening behind the stove, in carpool lanes, or at a child's bed-side.

As a 12-year old boy in 1967 my school principal mother, Mrs. Zeola Germany Allston, had me memorize a poem—not for a grade, but for life. Nearly six decades later, Somebody's Mother by Mary Dow Brine still echoes, from memory:

"She's somebody's mother, boys, you know, For all she's aged and poor and slow. And I hope some fellow will lend a hand To help my mother, you understand ..."

Today's mothers—especially single mothers—are CEOs of their homes. They are operations managers, faith leaders, disciplinarians, and encouragers.

They don't just raise children—they raise **civilization**.

Research shows women bring humility and competence to leadership. According to Harvard Business Review's Tomas Chamorro-Premuzic, women score higher in emotional intelligence and teamwork—traits that build trust and drive performance, https://bit.ly/3YEyuMH.

Yet, their influence isn't limited to home or office:

- Women drive up to 85% of U.S. purchasing decisions.
- **Black women** are now the fastest-growing group of entrepreneurs.
- Despite this, they receive **less than 1%** of venture capital.

Still, they rise—without applause, often without help.

This week and each succeeding week 'til Mother's Day Weekend 2026, take a moment to thank somebody's mother. Offer a hand. Share encouragement. Acknowledge her leadership, whether visible or invisible.

Because as that young boy in the poem reminds us:

"She's somebody's mother..."
And she might just be **everybody's leader.**

God made you significant! You're noteworthy because HE said you ARE a masterpiece! Find your superpower and rest in it! Develop it! Allow it to make room for you and your family.



Mrs. Loretta Spencer

Loretta Purdy Spencer served as the 66th mayor of Huntsville, Alabama. Her first term began October 4, 1996, and her last term ended on November 3, 2008.

Spencer has been a resident of Huntsville since age 7. She graduated from Huntsville High School, and holds a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Alabama. Spencer was the first woman mayor of Huntsville, and the first woman mayor of one of Alabama's "four main cities," which also include Birmingham, Mobile and Montgomery. When Spencer was first elected mayor in 1996, she was the co-owner of a local funeral home. Spencer is a former teacher in the Huntsville City School System.

Spencer first ran for mayor in 1996, after thenmayor Steve Hettinger announced he would not seek another term. Spencer was supported by Hettinger, leading her runoff opponent, Larry Mullins, to attack both as agents of the status quo. Facing a field of ten opponents, Spencer made the runoff, which she won by a convincing 66%–34% majority.

During her first term, Spencer garnered editorial praise for rejuvenating Huntsville's economic development. The Huntsville Times stated that her "string of recent successes is a whiff of the famous optimism and spirit that characterized the city for decades." At the close of her first term, Spencer was re-elected without a runoff, taking 58% of the vote.

In 2004, Spencer won a third term. During the 2004 campaign, Spencer came under attack on several issues. First, she was criticized for the state and the construction of of Huntsville schools. She was also criticized for allegedly favoring the wealthier southern areas of Huntsville over the northern neighborhoods with larger minority populations. This criticism may have been reflected in voting results, in which Spencer failed to carry precincts in north Huntsville. Although forced into a runoff, she won that runoff with 55% of the vote.

In January 2007, Spencer was awarded the Distinguished Service Award by the Huntsville/Madison County Chamber of Commerce.



Among the accomplishments for which Spencer claims credit are a Target Distribution Center, Toyota's V-8 engine plant in Huntsville. She points to the opening of two new schools, and in her third term, the rebuilding of one high school, with others in the planning stages.

Spencer's plan for tax incentive districts, she asserted, provided \$75,000,000 for capital improvements to Huntsville City Schools.

Spencer advocated volunteer involvement. and pointed to her own work in volunteer efforts such as the United Way, Community Free Clinic, Huntsville/Madison Co. Botanical Garden, and the Boys & Girls Club.

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

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Archer Park Community Pillars Celebration Event May 17

Arts Huntsville is inviting the community to a celebration on Saturday, May 17, from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. at Archer Park to unveil "Community Pillars," a sculpture created by local artist Gwyer Sinclair in cooperation with members of the community.

The community celebration will take place at the green space of Archer Park, located at 3315 Archer Drive in Huntsville.

"Community Pillars" is a collaborative sculpture by local artist Gwyer Sinclair. Reflecting its name, "Community Pillars" integrates the creative contributions of students from Ridgecrest, McDonnell, Challenger, and Rolling Hills Elementary Schools, as well as patrons of the Huntsville-Madison County Public Library.

Over 200 participants submitted drawings for the project. From these, 40 designs were selected by Sinclair for inclusion on the artwork. The celebration event offers a morning of familyfriendly fun, featuring an interactive art lesson for kids and complimentary shaved ice for the first 100 guests.


