Huntsville Ready for Southern Fried Film Festival

The four-day Southern Fried Film Festival (SFFF) is back and better than ever for its 5th year on June 8-11.

The opening night film, "The Longest Goodbye," directed by Ido Mizrahy, will be screened at the INTUI-TIVE Planetarium at U.S. Space and Rocket Center on Thursday, June 8, at 7:30 p,m. with a gala reception prior at 6:30 p.m. The film follows NASA psychologist Dr. Al Holland, rookie astronauts Kayla Barron and Matthias Maurer, and former astronaut Cady Coleman, among others, as they grapple with the tension between their dream of reaching new frontiers and their basic human need to stay connected to home.

Opening night will be shared by director Ido Mizrahy, producer Valda Witt, former astronaut Cady Coleman, her son James Simpson, and NASA psychologist Dr. Al Holland. They will be present to share their unique experiences and insights into the making of the film.

The festival also will showcase a variety of films over the next three days at Studio Theatre at Lowe Mill with various starting times. Live music will be per-



formed by local musicians, along with panel discussions with the filmmakers.

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Here are the happenings in Washington, D.C., this week:

1. CONGRESS. The House and Senate are in session this week. The House Appropriations Committee reportedly will start marking up the Fiscal Year 2024 appropriations bills this week at the subcommittee level (despite the recent House debt limit bill calling for \$130 billion in cuts to non-defense spending) with possibly the Agriculture, Military Construction, Legislative Branch, and Homeland Security bills getting done this week.

Last week, Senator Dianne Feinstein (D-CA) returned to the Senate after a severe bout of shingles and cast her first vote Wednesday on the Senate floor since Feb. 16, 2023.

In recognition of National Police Week that draws 25,000 to 40,000 attendees from police departments across the nation, the House will take up several police-related bills, including one that would amend immigration law to make assaulting a law enforcement officer a deportable offense.

The Senate this week may take up a rail safety bill by Ohio Senators Brown (D-OH) and Vance (R-OH) that would require minimum train crews of two (2) people, enact new safety standards for carrying hazardous materials, and

increase fines for railroads found at fault.

2. THE WHITE HOUSE. Last week, the White House

postponed a scheduled Friday (May 12) meeting with House and Senate leaders on raising the national debt limit, saying that it would happen on Tuesday, May 16. On Wednesday, the President departed for a 7-day trip to Asia and Australia, starting with the G7 Leaders' Summit in Hiroshima, Japan, on May 19-21, followed by a stop in Port Moresby, Papua, New Guinea, on May 22 to sign defense and surveillance agreements, and then on to the Quad Leaders' Summit in Sydney, Australia, on May 24, for a meeting with the leaders of Australia, Japan, and India.

3. SUPREME COURT.

The Court will continue to issue decisions from its current docket on Thursday. In a very unexpected ruling last week, the Court in a 5-4 decision written by Justice Gorsuch, and joined by Justices Barrett, Kagan, Sotomayor, and Thomas, upheld a 2018 California animal rights ballot initiative (known as "Proposition 12"), which mandated minimum space requirements for egg-laying hens, pigs used for breeding, and calves used for veal, and prohibits the selling of animal products from farms outside the state that do not meet the minimum

requirements. In a dissent, Justice Kavanaugh warned that the Court's decision in National Pork Producers Council v. Ross could provide a blueprint for states to pass laws to advance their policy preferences in the future, on issues ranging from illegal immigration to abortion.

4. APRIL INFLATION **REPORT.** Last Wednesday, the Labor Department announced that the annual inflation rate slowed to 4.9% in April, rising only 0.4%, which is the lowest annual rate of inflation since April 2021. The 4.9% rate was down considerably from the high of 9.1% recorded in June 2022 and 6.4% in January 2023.

5. EDUCATION. On

Tuesday, U.S. Department of Education Secretary Miguel Cardona testified at a House Education and the Workforce Committee hearing entitled "Examining the Policies and Priorities of The Department of Education."

Book Captures Black Life in North Alabama

Most Black folks had never traveled many miles from the area where they were born, but after the Civil War, others moved to northern cities seeking better lives for their families. For some, life was nothing more than survival with work from dawn to dusk; for others, life was an opportunity to provide a better existence for themselves and their family.

Black Folktales of the Muscle Shoals is a collection of stories from Black people interviewed by Huston Cobb Jr. and Rickey Butch Walker. In it, the authors share an array of personal stories about these individuals and their families

who were tied to the land along the Muscle Shoals of the Tennessee River in northwest Alabama.

Some of the Black individuals interviewed identified themselves as mixed-ancestry descendants of Black slaves, White folks, and American Indians.

Their stories are reminiscent of an era when life was much simpler, and change came slowly. When change came, it was primarily propelled by inventions, wars, and civil rights campaigns.

Daniel 3:18 says, "But even if God does not (rescue us) we want you to know, O king, that we will not serve your gods or worship the image of gold you have set up."





Parker Griffith, M.D.

Born August 6, 1942, Dr. Rolf Parker Griffith, Jr., is an American retired physician, entrepreneur and politician in Huntsville, Ala., who served in the Alabama State Senate from 2006 to 2008 and then as the U.S. Representative for Alabama's 5th congressional district from 2009 to 2011.

Griffith was born in Shreveport, La. He taught 7th-grade arithmetic for less than a year at T.H. Harris Junior High School (later Middle School) in Metaire in Jefferson Parish in suburban New Orleans prior to being admitted to medical school. He received his medical degree from the Louisiana State University Medical School in 1970 and served in residency at the University of Texas M. D. Anderson Cancer Center.

After serving at the LSU Service Charity Hospital in New Orleans and a year of neurosurgery at the University of Texas Medical Branch (UTMB) in Galveston, Texas, Griffith began preparing to become a radiation oncologist, one who specializes in using radiation to cure cancer, training in radiation oncology through a combined

program between UTMB and M.D. Anderson Cancer Center in Houston. He served as a Medical Corps captain in the U.S. Army Reserve from 1970 to 1973, while continuing his medical training at the LSU Service Charity Hospital in New Orleans.

Griffith was recruited on a "cold call" to Alabama and established the Huntsville Cancer Treatment Center. As a physician, he provided discounted care to patients who lacked insurance. Griffith also conducted several clinical trials in conjunction with the University of Alabama School of Medicine, and partnered with St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis, Tenn.

He retired from medicine in December 1992, though he still holds a license to practice in both Alabama and Texas.



Griffith won a seat in the Alabama State Senate, representing the 7th district (2006). He carried 66% of the vote to his opponent's 34%. During his term in the State Senate, he sponsored bills to promote investment in alternative fuels, cut taxes, and establish a Statewide Trauma Care System to speed critical medical care.

Griffith and his wife Virginia have five children and 11 grandchildren. He cofounded the Griffith Family Foundation, which awards cash grants North Alabama schools and nonprofis and to elementary school libraries in the region.

Huntsville's 19th Century Black History Telling Our Stories Hook and Ladder Company A Circle of Remembrance Ollye B. Conley Researcher The Circle of Remembrance

In 1870, the following article appeared in *The* Weekly Advocate on May 6th:

A new Fire Company has been organized, of which see notice. A Colored Hook and Ladder Company. They will, we are satisfied, give the city an efficient Fire Brigrade in times of need. The Huntsville Weekly

Democrat stated that on October 1, 1874, the fire bell startled the city. The Steam Fire Company and Colored

Hook and Ladder Fire *Company went promptly* to the burning house. The Hook and Ladder Company put it out promptly with buckets of water. The Steam *Fire Company, attached the hose to the nearest plug, the hose could not reach the* burning house and was not effective.

On many occasions the Hook and Ladder Company was there to save buildings and people throughout the city. The

Journal stated in an article dated January 25, 1901 that L. C. Betts and Mingo Steele served as members of the Hook and Ladder Company for twenty-five and thirty-three years, respectively. L.C. Betts was foreman and Mingo Jones was clerk. During all this time, they never missed more than one or two fires.

Mingo Jones was born in Huntsville, Alabama, in 1851. He married Kate Russel. They had three children; Henry, Robert


carpenter by trade. He died in January of 1907.
