

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Washington in One Minute



Here are the happenings in Washington, D.C., this week:

1. ON THE FLOOR. The House and Senate are in session this week. The pending business in the Senate is the \$40 billion Ukraine aid bill, which the House passed last week by a vote of 368-57. The House has a long list of bills for the floor this week, including a bill to prohibit price gouging by fuel companies and emergency legislation related to the supply of baby formula. Last week, Senate Republican Leader Mitch McConnell and 3 other GOP Senators - Sens. Collins (ME), Barrasso (WY) and Cornyn (TX) - traveled to Kyiv to meet with Ukrainian President Zelensky. On Tuesday, the House and Senate met in joint session to receive an address from Greek Prime Minister Kyriakos Mitsotakis. 2. THE WHITE HOUSE.

On Monday, Vice President Harris traveled to Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates (UAE), to lead a delegation to honor UAE President Khalifa bin Zayed Al Nahyan, who died on May 13, and President Biden met with Greek Prime Minister Kyriakos Mitsotakis at the White House. On Friday, the President will begin a four-day trip to Japan and South Korea. Last Friday, the President spoke by telephone with Prime Minister Andersson of Sweden and President Niinistö of Finland regarding their countries joining NATO and, also on Friday, met with local law enforcement officers and mayors in recognition of National Police Week and called on cities and states to use American Rescue Plan (ARP) funding to put more police officers on the beat (while noting that to date state and local governments have desig-

nated \$6.5 billion for public safety projects in ARP state and local funds in more than half of states and more than 300 communities across the country). Last Thursday, President Biden met virtually with representatives from Walmart and Target and infant formula manufacturers Reckitt and Gerber on the shortage of infant formula caused by a voluntary recall of infant powdered formula by Abbott and the closure of its manufacturing facility in Sturgis, Mich.

3. SUPREME COURT. The Supreme Court was set to issue opinions Monday from its current docket, likely the Mississippi abortion case Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization. Monday marked the first "opinion issuance day" since the leak of the draft Dobbs opinion on May 2. 4. JANUARY 6 COM-MITTEE. In a highly unusual move, last week the House Select Committee to Investigate the January 6th Attack on the United States Capitol issued subpoenas to 5 sitting Members of Congress: House GOP Leader Kevin McCarthy (CA), Rep. Scott Perry (PA), Rep. Jim Jordan (OH), Rep. Mo Brooks

(AL), and Rep. Andy Biggs (AZ). The 5 GOP Members were previously invited to appear voluntarily before the committee but refused. The January 6 Committee will start its hearings on Thursday, June 9. 5. STUDENT LOAN DEBT. With President Biden considering executive action to cancel some portion of student loan debt, the National Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators, along with a cadre of 21 higher education organizations, developed recommendations to improve the

federal loan system. More than two-dozen resulting suggestions range from how to streamline loan plans to how to better oversee servicers. NASFAA's recommendations, which are being released in a report on Monday, May 16, focuses on three major areas: loan servicing, loan repayments and defaults.

come full of surprises of its own; however, don't let it rob you of today's gift, be-


cause life is short enough. So, let us all learn how to think things through as it pertains to our families


and loved ones and let us not worry

# Anthony Anderson: From Black-ish to Howard University Grad-ish!

"I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. Finally, there is laid up for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will give to me on that Day, and not to me only but also to all who have loved His appearing" 2 Timothy 4:7,8.

## **A&M Names New VPSA**

After a national search and selection process, and review of almost 50 applicants, AAMU has named Dr. Braque Talley as its next Vice-President for Student Affairs. A native of Starkville, Mississippi, Dr. Braque Talley has developed a distinguished career as a higher education administrator and educator. Currently, he serves as Vice-Chancellor of **Enrollment Management** and Student Success at the University of Arkansas - Pine Bluff (UAPB), where he also teaches graduate courses in Educational Leadership. As Vice-Chancellor, Dr. Talley was responsible for reversing a four-year downward enrollment trend and launched efforts that led to all-time University highs for graduation and retention rates.

Before joining UAPB, he served at his undergraduate alma mater, Rust College, as Vice President of Enrollment Management. While Talley served in this capacity, Rust College achieved increases in overall student enrollment and retention, and his team garnered more than \$1 million in grants and other gifts to undergird student support initiatives. Moreover, he was

responsible for enrolling the two largest first-year classes in the college's history. Previously, Dr. Talley served as a Coordinator of Marketing and Recruitment at Alabama A&M University after serving as a graduate research



assistant and recruiter, during which graduate enrollment at AAMU also reached the highest levels since 2005.

Dr. Talley graduated
Cum Laude from Rust College with a Bachelor of Arts
degree in English. He earned
the Master of Urban and
Regional Planning (MURP)
degree from Alabama A&M
University and the Doctorate
of Philosophy from Jackson
State University in Higher
Education. He has completed professional development programs at Johns

Hopkins University, Clark Atlanta University and the University of South Florida. Dr. Talley also is a graduate of the Executive Leadership Institute (ELI) and the Higher Education Leadership Foundation (HELF).

> Dr. Talley is active in several professional, civic, and social organizations, and he has delivered over 25 presentations and lectures at conferences and professional meetings. He has received recognition from the Starkville Daily News ("Top 40, Under 40); HBCU Grow; Mississippi Business Journal ("State of MS-Top 50, Under 40"), SCM ("Humanitarian of the Year"), and Rust College ("Top 10, Under 10").

Dr. Talley's research areas of interest are HBCUs, Higher Education Sustainability, Student Motivation, and Student Engagement. He partnered with The Princeton Review to author "The Ultimate Guide to HBCUs."

Braque is married to Dr. Brittney Tate-Talley, a physical therapist specializing in geriatric care. They have two children, Bridynn (12) and Braque "B.J." Talley, Jr. (1). Dr. Talley will officially rejoin the AAMU family on June 13, 2022.

## The Other Black Friday

Luke 23:44-47

Did you know that there are two "Black Friday's?

The one that we are most familiar with is the day after Thanksgiving when people bunk out overnight often in freezing weather to catch so-called Christmas bargains on the next day when stores open earlier than usual.

The *other* black Friday is the one associated with



the other holiday known as Easter. This Friday is commonly known as Good Friday.

This is the Friday that Jesus hung on the Cross at Calvary dying for the sins of the world.

Here is what made it the other Black Friday. Luke recorded that, By this time it was about noon, and darkness fell across the whole land... The light from the sun was gone.

The sanctified imagination of our elders put it this way, The S-O-N and the S-U-N could not shine at the same time.

Luke also recorded that it was at this same time that the "veil of the temple" was split in two. This was the sign of total acceptance



by any and everyone who sought to enter into the Kingdom of God by faith in the finished work of Jesus Christ at Calvary.

It was this scene that

motivated the songwriter to put pen to parchment and write, They hung Him high; they stretched Him wide; He hung His head and for me He died; that's love!

But that's not how the story ends, three days later He rose again; that's love!

## Rev. Leroy R. Cole

Service and Leadership have been cornerstones of Leroy R. Cole's life since 1960, when he was elected president of his senior class at Capitol High School in Baton Rouge, La. Pastor Cole has always been ready to blaze new trails and meet new challenges. After earning a degree in electrical engineering from Southern University, he saw new opportunities and challenges everywhere he looked. Still, he forged ahead. He served his country in the U.S. Army and was honorably discharged as Captain in 1968.

He joined Federal Electric Corporation and worked as a reliability engineer on the Apollo Space program in 1968. He then joined GTE as a manufacturing engineer in 1973 and left as a manager of manufacturing engineering in 1983. He started a manufacturing engineering department at Intergraph in 1985 and also served as its manager. After retiring from Intergraph in 1997, he was tapped as the Chief Operating Officer of Triana Industries. He led Triana Industries out of bankruptcy to become a \$25 million manufacturing company in nine years. New positions and new employers were numerous, including being the first manufacturing company in the area to recruit and hire Hispanic employees.



But nothing stirred his servant-leader qualities like serving as pastor of Hopewell Missionary Baptist Church for almost 35 years, beginning in 1978. As a servantleader, he was a teacher, warrior, workman, vessel and team-builder. Hopewell is a leader in community missions, organizing tutoring and mentoring programs, distributing food to the hungry and maintaining the community's only Red Cross-certified shelter in the New Market area. Rev. Cole chose to retire from Triana Industries in 2006 to serve as Hopewell's full-time pastor.

While the New Market Community was introduced to the "Hopewell Experience," a phrase coined by Rev. Cole, he was creating a different type of experience in the greater community – one of service. Rev. Cole served on the Red Cross Advisory Board, representing the business community, and served on the board of the Interfaith Mission Service (IMS) as a representative from the religious community. He was a co-founder (and later chairman) of the Greater Huntsville Interdenominational Ministerial Fellowship (GHIMF) in the early 1980s. GHIMF now has over 100 local pastors and ministers.

Education has always been a priority in his life and Rev. Cole saw a need to serve all the children of the county; not just his own. He was a member of the Huntsville City Schools System Strategic Planning Committee and served as President and Vice president of the Board of Directors for The Community Intensive Teatment Youth (CITY) Program for Huntsville City Schools, an alternative school for students in grades 7-11.

But he was never alone in his work. God also blessed him with two remarkable help-mates. He and Vercie Cole were married 27 years before she died after a long illness. He married Linda Graham Cole in 1996 and they have been a partner and friend to each other for 20 years. The Coles have four sons: Minister Lamar Cole, Lance Cole, Pastor Ladell Cole and Damien Godwin.
