


Here are the latest top issues and events in Washington:

1. CONGRESS. The House and Senate are in session this week. Last night (Sunday) at 10:00 p.m., the House Budget Committee approved the GOP's top 2025 agenda item, the Budget Reconciliation Bill/GOP tax cut legislation, by a vote of 17-16 (with 4 Rs voting "present") after failing to pass it on Friday when 4 hardline Republicans voted no because they said the bill does not cut spending deeply enough. As it is currently

written, the House bill would provide \$3.8 trillion in tax cuts over the next decade while also adding between \$2.5-\$3.3 trillion to the national debt—one reason Moody's Ratings downgraded the U.S. credit rating on Friday from the highest rating (Aa1) to one notch below (Aaa) ... The Senate will attempt a second vote to break the filibuster on the GENIUS Act, which would streamline the use of stablecoins—one of two main legislative items on the crypto industry's 2025 agenda (the first cloture vote

failed on May 8 with a 48-49 vote). The May 8 vote failed amid demands from Democratic senators for a provision to be added that would prohibit the President and other senior officials from profiting from crypto ventures while in office ...

- 2. EXECUTIVE BRANCH. The President announced plans to speak Monday with Russian President Putin, Ukrainian President Zelenskyy, and NATO leaders in separate phone calls to try to arrange a ceasefire in the war in Ukraine. On Thursday, the President hosted a gala dinner at his Virginia golf club for the 220 top buyers of his \$TRUMP meme coin.
- 3. SUPREME COURT. In a 7-2 vote last Friday (with Alito and Thomas dissenting), the Supreme Court

stopped the Trump Administration from using the Alien Enemies Act (AEA) to deport Venezuelan nationals it claims are members of the Tren de Aragua gang, sending the case back to the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals to determine what type of notice the Venezuelan detainees are entitled to. Although the court did not directly address the legality of using the AEA, it referenced the Albrego Garcia case, where the U.S. has been unable to return an individual who was erroneously deported to El Salvador, as giving extra weight to the concerns of the detainees ...

4. INFLATION REPORT.

Last Tuesday, the Labor Department reported that inflation, as recorded by the Consumer Price Index, rose 0.2% in April, leading to an annual rate of 2.3% over the last 12 months, down slightly from March's annual rate of 2.4%. The fastest rising costs in the economy are for shelter (rent and owners' equivalent rent of residence), medical care, and electricity and natural gas. Notably, egg prices decreased by 12.7% last month. In related news, the U.S. Census Bureau reported on Thursday that retail sales slowed sharply in April to 0.1%, following a surge of 1.7% in March as shoppers rushed to beat the new trade tariffs ...

5. WORKFORCE/APPREN-TICESHIPS. At the May 15 House Appropriations Labor, Health and Human Services. and Education Subcommittee hearing, U.S. Labor Secretary Lori Chavez-DeRemer promoted President Trump's goal of reaching 1 million new registered apprenticeships annually, highlighting a surge in new programs and apprenticeships following an April 23 executive order ...

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The Voice of Diversity

As we gather in backyards and around dinner tables this Memorial Day, many of us are reflecting on what it truly means to be American. For some, it's a day off work or a chance to welcome the unofficial start of summer. But at its heart, Memorial Day is sacred. It comes from the courage of people from every background, every zip code, every faith and identity who believed in something greater than themselves.

We cannot honor our fallen without also honoring the full truth of our history. That means teaching our children the full story—not just the victories, but the struggles, the injustices, and the progress won through sweat and sacrifice. That means ensuring every American—regardless of race, gender, ability, or orientation—has a place at the table and a voice in shaping our future.

Memorial Day isn't just a moment of remembrance—it's a call to action. It asks us to be worthy of the sacrifices made on our behalf. To care for our veterans when they come home. To defend democracy, not just with weapons, but with empathy, service, and civic engagement. To build a country where everyone can see themselves in the story of America.

So this Memorial Day, I hope we all take a moment—not just to remember, but to recommit. To recognize that unity doesn't mean sameness, and that inclusion is not a threat, but a strength. Let's honor those who gave their lives by continuing the work of building a more just, more equitable, and more united America.

help us to keep our priorities in order even though things are changing around us.



Ego-Holic, Interrupted: How I Discovered My Most Destructive Addiction — and What I'm Doing About It

In November 2024, America witnessed three ego-laced headlines: Biden lost the White House, Mike Tyson returned to the ring (and lost), and Donald Trump made a shocking comeback.

What do they share in common? Ego — sometimes inflated, sometimes deflated. I know both. Because 23 years ago, ego cost me a dream contract.

I faked expertise in an IT consulting job — and got fired. My client said, "Tim, your problem isn't talent. You needed help, but never asked for it."

Around the same time, I began training with a speaking coach who helped me discover something deeper: I wasn't just struggling with pride. I was addicted to my sense of self.



I called it "ego-holism." And the name stuck.

Soon after, I gave a speech on it. My best friend was in the audience, and her feedback stung: "This message is yours, not theirs."

But God showed me the opposite. The healing is in the revealing. Her critiques became the foundation of my calling.

Ego-holism isn't arrogance (that's egotism). It's chronic insecurity. Low self-worth. Or overconfidence masking pain.

And I'm not cured. I'm recovering. That's why I'm creating EMC² — the Ego-holism Measurement Calculator for Correction. It's a tool to help leaders identify the cost of unmanaged ego.

Because talent isn't the problem. Ego is.

And managing it? That's the real victory.

Dr. Arthur L. Walker is a former president of the 6,000-student Motlow State Community College in Moore County, Tenn.

During his 18year tenure with the college, he progressively advanced through the academic developranks from instructor to becoming the first African-American to hold the position of president. Walker moved Motlow College forward in areas of student access, capital projects, and fundraising. He spearheaded a \$2.3 million fundraising drive to construct the low College in 2006, first free-standing building for the Motlow College Smyrna Teaching Center, a building that was named in his honor in October 2017.

As Director of the Fayetteville Center, Dr. Walker facilitated the construction of the Fayetteville Cen-

ter and the Sundquist Center for Advanced Technologies, all while directing enrollment growth, program ment, marketing and community relations.

Prior to his tenure at Motlow College, Walker served 26 years in the U.S. Air Force (USAF), including two tours in Alabama. After retiring from Mot-Walker launched a third career: president of his own company—Empowerment Concepts, Inc.—a professional development firm. In this capacity, he consulted and provided training for a wide variety of organizations.



Walker earned his associate degree at Okaloosa-Walton Junior College (FL), bachelor's at Athens State University, master's at Troy University, and doctorate at the University of Memphis.

Dr. Walker is married to Rosa Rice Walker, a retired school teacher. They have one adult daughter, Angela, and are members of Saint John AME Church in Huntsville.

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

The Bulldogs' home opener is the following week with the 15th Annual Louis Crews Classic as AAMU plays host to Alcorn State, with a 6 p.m. kickoff from Louis Crews Stadium on September 6.

game, a tune up before beginning Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) play the following week as the Bulldogs play host to Lane College on September 20.


Fans will have to wait two weeks as A&M welcomes Mississippi Valley State to Crews Stadium on October 11 for its homecoming game. Kickoff against the Delta Devils is scheduled for 2 p.m.

AAMU will close out its home campaign with back-to-back games inside Crews Stadium, starting on November 8 with a 2 p.m. kickoff against Prairie View A&M. One week later, November 15, the Bulldogs hold Senior Day with a 2 p.m. kickoff vs. FAMU.

General admission season tickets are \$135 (no parking). Faculty and staff, The Bulldog Club, alumni and military can purchase season tickets for \$190.
