Here are the happenings in Washington, D.C., for the week.

- 1. The House and Senate are in session this week, leaving town on Thursday night for a one-week Memorial Day Recess. Once again, the Senate will try to get an agreement on the FY 2019 emergency supplemental appropriations bill, 2 versions of which - now totaling \$19.1 billion - have passed the full House. Key bills on the House floor this week include a bill to reverse the Trump Administration's efforts to dismantle the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau and a bill to allow small businesses to band together to offer 401(k)s and to create a new tax credit of up to \$500 for companies that set up plans with automatic enrollment ...
- 2. President Trump met for Round 2 at the White House with House Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-CA) and Senate Democratic Leader Chuck Schumer (D-NY) for continued discussions on a bill to fund infrastructure construction around the nation, following last month's meeting where the two sides agreed to pursue a \$2 trillion infrastructure package ...
- 3. On Tuesday, Trump

Administration officials traveled to Capitol Hill to brief all House and Senate Members on the heightened tensions between the U.S. and Iran. In addition, House Democrats invited former CIA Director (and prominent Trump critic) John Brennan to discuss his views about the situation in Iran at their private weekly caucus meeting on Tuesday, according to The Washington Post. The Trump Administration recently sent an aircraft carrier and other military resources to the Persian Gulf region and withdrew nonessential personnel from Iraq, raising alarm among some members of Congress over the possibility of a confrontation with Iran.

- 4. On Thursday, the House Appropriations Committee continued its work on the FY2020 appropriations bills this week with expected subcommittee markups of the FY2020 Agriculture and Transportation/HUD Appropriations bills ...
- 5. The Hill newspaper reported on May 17 that acting White House chief of staff Mick Mulvaney and acting OMB Director Russ Vought have been meeting with fiscal conservative groups to reassure them that President

Trump will not support a massive tax increase to pay for a national infrastructure bill ...

6. On Friday, President Trump agreed to withdraw tariffs of 25% and 10%, respectively, on imports of steel and aluminum from Canada and Mexico that he had imposed a year ago. In return, Canada and Mexico said they would lift retaliatory duties on many American goods, including politically sensitive farm products, such as pork (coincidentally, The Washington Post reported last Thursday that Chinese buyers canceled a major order for American pork). Also, on Friday, the President announced he is giving Japan and the European Union 180 days to agree to limit their auto shipments to the United States or face the threat of U.S. tariffs.

7. The House Oversight and Government Reform Committee has scheduled a hearing this week to discuss for-profit colleges. It will be held on Wednesday at 2 p.m. The witnesses will be Diane Auer Jones, the principal deputy under-secretary of education; a former student of the Illinois Institute of Art, a for-profit school; Christopher Madaio from the Maryland attorney general's office; and David Halperin, an attorney and longtime critic of forprofit schools.

Billionaire Wipes out Debt of Morehouse Grads

A billionaire technology investor and philanthropist says his family is providing grants to wipe out the student debt of the entire 2019 class at Morehouse College.

Robert F. Smith made the announcement Sunday morning in front of nearly 400 graduating seniors, eliciting the biggest cheers of the morning.

"My family is going to create a grant to eliminate your student loans," Smith said, according to a tweet from the school.

The total amount Smith is pledging to donate is \$40 million. The total debt the students have is still being calculated. Morehouse

President David Thomas had "no idea" the announcement was coming.

"People were stunned. If you look at any other film footage, you will see the students turning to each other. What did he say? Did he say what I think he said," Thomas told CBS News correspondent Mark Strassmann. "This will allow them to pursue their dreams ... As opposed to serving the debt."

Morehouse College is an all-male historically black college located in Atlanta. Smith is the founder and CEO of Vista Equity Partners, a private equity firm that invests in software, data, and technology-driven companies.

During his commencement speech, Smith referenced Martin Luther King

Jr. and spoke of a 21st century tech-based economy being a "Fourth Industrial Revolution."

"When Dr. King said that the 'arc of the moral universe bends toward justice," he wasn't saying it bends on its own accord. It bends because we choose to put our shoulders into it together and push," Smith said. "Technology is creating a whole new set of on ramps to the 21st century economy, and together we well help assure that African Americans will acquire the tech skills and be the

beneficiaries in sectors that

are being automated."

Smith received an honorary doctorate from Morehouse during the ceremony. He had already announced a \$1.5 million gift to the school.

The "In" an "End" of Waiting for God

Psalm 40:1-3


"He brought me "up" also "out" of a horrible pit...and "set" my feet upon a rock...And He has put a new song in my heart." This was David's testimony of the experiences he had as he was "waiting for God." He opened this Psalm by declaring that he "waited patiently" for the LORD. These two words are actually translated from the same Hebrew word that carries the meaning of not only a time of waiting but also the mindset during that time. The word patiently means "to bind together." David was literally saying that while he was waiting

for God to change his pit experience, he was able to do so without falling apart. As a matter of fact, it was David's waiting that kept him together. The language suggests that this experi-

ence did "end" at some point and because David said that he was brought "up and out," it is obvious that God was present "in" the pit with him. David has left for us in perpetuity, proof that in every pit experience, there is an "in" and an "end." Our elders put it this way; "I'm wrapped up and tied

up with Jesus." Providential pits are often God's way of helping us to prepare testimonies that have what courtroom language refers to as having probative value; that

which tends to prove the argument presented. When our pit experiences "end," that's proof that God was "in" there with us.

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Young Violinist Featured by Youth Orchestra


