AKAs' ASCEND Youth Program: Start Here ...

Go Anywhere

Hands-on, multi-session student led STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) activities are key aspects of the ASCEND Youth program implemented by Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., Epsilon Gamma Omega Chapter.

STEM provides limitless opportunities. For instance, the 4-H Alabama Water Watch Program teaches watershed stewardship and water quality monitoring through science-based, hands-on experiences in the classroom/lab setting and at the creek, river, lake, or bay.

Moreover, ASCEND students were introduced to the program with an overview of water chemistry monitoring presented by 4-H and others from Alabama Water Watch, Alabama Cooperative Extension System.

The ASCEND students became certified 4-H water watch members and subsequently conducted a comparative study of a lake on the campus of Alabama A&M University. Through water chemistry monitoring, the students test physical and chemical characteristics of the water to determine pollution sources and long-term trends in water quality.

Six variables are mea-



sured with a customized test kit, and results are compared with water quality standards that define conditions for healthy water bodies in Alabama. Samples are collected monthly by ASCEND students.

Additionally, robotics is an interdisciplinary branch of engineering and science that includes mechanical engineering, electrical engineering, and computer science. It merges design, construction, operation, use of robots, as well as computer systems for their control, sensory feedback, and information processing.

Finally, the ASCEND students built and programmed the robots to perform specific tasks. Engineering design and planning were also incorporated in the project, implemented over three sessions.

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Washington in One Minute



Here are the happenings in Washington, D.C., this week:

1. The House and Senate are in session this week. After a surprising defeat on passing the Farm Bill last week, the House GOP leadership, according to The Hill newspaper, is now moving away from bringing up a resolution to approve President Trump's proposed impound of \$15.4 billion in federal spending, including \$7 billion from the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP).

According to Politico, a discharge petition being circulated by Moderate Republicans to force a vote on immigration in the House is only 22 votes shy of the required 218. The House will continue chipping away at the 2010 Dodd-Frank Wall Street reform legislation

with a bill to exempt most banks and credit unions from a number of mortgage reporting requirements.

It will also take up the "Right to Try Act," which would allow terminally ill patients to have access to potentially lifesaving drugs when no other alternatives exist and the FY2019 Defense Authorization bill.

2. On Monday, President Trump attended the swearing in of new CIA Director Gina Haspel. On Tuesday, he met at the White House with South Korean President Moon Jae-In and on Tuesday night he delivered the keynote address at the anti-abortion Susan B. Anthony Campaign for Life Gala at the National Building Museum.

On Wednesday, he hosted a roundtable discussion

on immigration and on Thursday awarded the Medal of Honor to retired Navy Master Chief Britt Slabinski. On Friday, the President traveled to Annapolis, Md., to deliver the graduation address at the U.S. Naval Academy.

- 3. The Senate Appropriations Committee began its work this week on the FY2019 appropriations bills, starting with subcommittee mark-ups of the FY2019 Agriculture and Energy & Water Appropriations bills. The full House Appropriations Committee marked up the FY2019 Interior Appropriations bill on Tuesday and the FY2019 Transportation/ **HUD** Appropriations bill on Wednesday.
- 4. On Wednesday, the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee

met to mark up the 2018 Water Resources and Development Act (WRDA), which reauthorizes programs and projects of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. According to water industry representatives, the bill is designed to move quickly through the House, with lawmakers omitting controversial provisions that could have held it up.

5. Last Saturday, U.S. and China officials released a joint statement saying the 2 nations agreed to take measures to substantially reduce the United States trade deficit in goods with China and on meaningful increases in U.S. agriculture and energy exports. Then, on Sunday, Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin said on Fox News Sunday that a trade war with China is "on hold."

6. With the latest mass shooting at a high school in Santa Fe, Texas, White House press secretary Sarah Huckabee Sanders on Friday said the tragic incident "activated" the White House school safety commission, which was created after the Valentine's Day school shooting in Parkland, Fla., that left 17 people dead. She said the commission would meet early this week. She also stated that she did not have anything to announce on the prospect of new gun control measures at this point.

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



"From Huntsville, Alabama, welcome to Gospel Brunch," announced a fashionably clad Deacon Mac (played by featured player Chris Redd) before the camera panned over to an in-studio church choir, belting a theme song vaguely reminiscent to Rufus & Chaka Khan's "Ain't Nobody." The quick namedrop may have caught locals off guard, but the sketch's subject material may touch a soft spot.

"Gospel Brunch," an obvious jab at Southern cooking programs, starred SNL

mainstays Kenan Thompson and Leslie Jones as Traci and Pervis Scott, Alabama cooks with a penchant for butter and grease. Throughout the six-minute sketch, the eponymous duo boasted their abilities to "make Southern foods with spirit, which included arteryclogging dishes like Honey Butter Fried Pork Casserole and Four Cheese Mac N' Cheese with bacon and potato chips.

The sketch also featured host and comedian Amy Schumer as Kayla Manning, a "Paula Dean" character whose idea of vegetarian biscuits and gravy include "a little bit of chicken and a lot of sausage." A highlight included Manning's

character making a pecanflavored smoothie with an entire pecan pie. Despite an unscripted blender malfunction, the Food Network lampoon was all laughs. The Southern state is no stranger to the long-running NBC behemoth. In 2016, University of Alabama hot spots Reese Phifer and Bryant-Denny Stadium were used as the backdrop to a sketch starring then host and pro wrestler John Cena, who played a Crimson Tide baller giving his final science presentation. It was clever, albeit incorrect nod to the Tuscaloosabased university. (Reese Phifer is a communications building.)

To qualify for the


Presidential Scholarship, students must achieve a minimum score of 30 on the American College Test (ACT) and maintain cumulative grade point average 3.50 or higher through high school.

Upon graduation from high school, she continued her study of music at Spelman College in Atlanta, Ga, and graduated with a major in mathematics and minors in chemistry and music. The following year was spent in the study of piano with Vivian Rifkin at the Julliard School of Music (New York) and also in completing the

courses required for the Master of Science degree in Abstract Algebra at New York University.

Other advanced degrees conferred subsequently were an M.A. degree in Analysis from the University of Alabama in Huntsville, an Ed.S. in Mathematics from the University of Alabama, and a D.S. from the Southeastern Institute of Technology. She was later the recipient of a Ford-Carnegie Fellowship for post-doctoral study in mathematics at the University of Wisconsin–Madison.

Dr. Smoot's teaching career began at Alcorn State University in Lorman, Miss.



She was Acting Head of the Chemistry Department for two years. She has taught at Alabama State University, University of Alabama, Oakwood University, UAH and Alabama A&M University. She retired as professor of mathematics at Alabama A&M and UAH after 30 years of service.

Howard Named Interim Head Men's Coach

Dylan Howard has been elevated to interim head coach of the Alabama A&M University men's basketball program for the 2018-19 season, Director of Athletics Bryan Hicks announced last week.

"This is a great opportunity to continue building something special at a great academic institution. I am truly humbled and excited to lead this program for the 2018-19 season," said Howard.

Howard spent the last year as the associate head coach on the men's basketball staff. He has been integral in the recruitment for the Bulldogs and the development of the big man for the program.

Prior to AAMU, Howard spent five seasons as the associate head men's basketball coach at Morehead State. The team finished second in the Ohio Valley Conference with a 10-6

conference mark. In Coach Howard's five seasons at Morehead State, the Eagles won 89 games. He helped lead the Eagles to a 23-14 overall record and 11-5 Ohio Valley Conference mark in 2015-16, along with a second-place finish in the 2016 College Basketball Invitational.

Howard was the top assistant at Mississippi Valley State from 2008-11. He assisted in putting together two top-50 recruiting classes in three seasons at MVSU. Coach Howard recruited five All-SWAC players, including 2012 MVP Paul Crosby and SWAC Tournament MVP Cor-I Cox.

Howard earned a bachelor's degree in criminal justice from the University of Alabama in Birmingham in 1992 and a master's degree in sports recreation and management from Hardin-Simmons in 2005.
