AAMU Holds Name Unveiling for Residence Hall

Alabama A&M University held the name unveiling of the Andrew and Abbiegail Hugine Living Learning Complex on Thursday, June 2.

The University broke ground in mid-August 2016 on the much-anticipated residence hall, which houses 580 students at its Meridian Street site adjacent to the Student Health and Wellness Center. The \$30 million state-of-the-art structure features a complete building automation system that monitors occupancy through motion sensors, reducing the amount of energy used through the HVAC system when rooms are not occupied.

Additionally, the resi-



dence hall has motion sensors in hallways and rooms, enabling both to dim when there is no activity. Thus, lighting in rooms automatically cuts off when the rooms are not in use.

The Hugines served AAMU in the capacities of President and First Lady from July 2009 through December 2021.

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Washington in One Minute



Here are the happenings in Washington, D.C., this week:

1. ON THE FLOOR. The House and Senate are in session this week and gun control legislation will dominate the agenda for both bodies. Last Thursday, despite the recess, the House Judiciary Committee marked up a package of gun control measures - the Protecting Our Kids Act – that will be taken up on the House floor this week. The bill would raise the age limit to purchase semi-automatic rifles to 21 years old, impose a ban on new high-capacity magazines, create a new federal firearms offense for gun trafficking and straw purchases, ban bump stocks and require background check and serial number requirements for ghost guns. House Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-CA) announced last Wednesday that the House also would take up an assault weapons ban. In the Senate, a bipartisan group of 9 Senators is working to compile a package of gun reforms that may include tightening background check laws and providing

grants to incentivize states to pass red flag laws.
2. THE WHITE HOUSE. On

Monday First Lady Jill Biden hosted a ceremony at the White House to unveil a new U.S. stamp honoring former First Lady Nancy Reagan. On Tuesday, the President and First Lady travelled to Los Angeles to host the 9th Summit of the Americas June 8-10, which this year has the theme of "Building a Sustainable, Resilient, and Equitable Future." 3. SUPREME COURT. The Supreme Court will issue decisions in 33 cases this month, as its 2021-22 term comes to an end. Decisions to be released include whether the court will uphold the right to an abortion, whether to restrict the Environmental Protection Agency's power to tackle climate change, whether to force the Biden Administration to keep a Trump-era asylum policy, whether to strike down a New York law requiring a special justification to get a concealed-carry gun permit, and whether to give publicschool teachers and staff more freedom to pray openly on

campus.

4. MAY JOBS REPORT. Last Friday, the Labor Department reported that the U.S. added 390,000 jobs in May, which was 40,000 more than economists had predicted. Businesses had 11.4 million jobs open in April (compared to 11.9 million openings in March), which is about 2 open jobs for each of the 6 million unemployed Americans. 5. COVID VACCINES. On Tuesday, the Food and Drug Administration's Vaccines and Related Biological Products Advisory Committee met to discuss an emergency use authorization request by Novavax for its Covid-19 vaccine for people 18 years and older, which would be the 4th vaccine to hit the market.


6. JANUARY 6 COMMIT-TEE TELEVISED HEARINGS. On Thursday night (June 9), the House January 6 Select Committee (consisting of 7 Democrats and 2 Republicans) began its televised hearings on the attack on the U.S. Capitol. The committee has conducted more than 1,000 interviews, collected more than 100,000 documents, and issued 99 subpoenas for witness testimony and document production. Congress has voted to pursue contempt of Congress charges for 4 subpoenaed witnesses who have not complied. Navarro was indicted by a grand jury last week; Bannon is set to go on trial in July on two counts of contempt, and the Justice Department last week declined to pursue contempt

charges for Scavino and Meadows. The committee has also subpoenaed 5 sitting GOP House Members, including the Republican Leader Kevin Mc-Carthy (R-CA). 7. STUDENT LOANS. On

June 1, the U.S. Department of Education announced it is discharging \$5.8 billion in student loans held by borrowers who attended Corinthian Colleges, a for-profit chain that collapsed in 2015. All 560,000 borrowers with outstanding loans will receive discharges under the borrower defense to repayment rule, which allows students who've been defrauded by their colleges to have their education debt forgiven. The

Education Department said the action is the single largest loan discharge in its history. Borrowers who attended the chain from its founding in 1995 through its closure in 2015 will receive relief even if they have not filed for a borrower defense discharge. The Biden administration has forgiven approximately \$25 billion in student debt since January 2021.

"SAFETY IN THE STORMS OF LIFE"


Psalm 91:1 says, Whoever dwells in the shelter of the Most High will rest in the shadow of the almighty.



Then he spoke to the children of Israel, saying: "When your children ask their fathers in time to come, saying, 'What are these stones?' then you shall let your children know, saying, 'Israel crossed over this Jordan on dry land" - Joshua 4:21,22.

Much like Moses' parting of the Red Sea 40 years earlier, Joshua here commanded a stone monument be erected to celebrate Israel's achieving its goal and reaching its milestone.

The Israelites had traveled from Egypt and their 400-year enslavement there to now enter God's Promised Land, Canaan.

- Conversely, Morgann's valedictorian designation evidenced her #1 academic class ranking (P.S. she chose Troy University in Troy, Alabama); and with
- Mom's 95th birthday, she joined fellow 95-ers Harry Belafonte,
 Pope Benedict XVI, and Black soprano pioneer Leontyne Price!

While your goals or milestones may not be as cherished or squeezed within such an eight-day marathon, still each goal achieved and milestone reached needs to be commemorated and used as a goal to be pursued. And achieved. And celebrated.

Start today pursuing your next goal, whether large or small. Then, convert it from a ceiling of accomplishment into a launchpad for the next blastoff! And celebration.

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Visible & Verifiable Examples

1 Corinthians 11:1; Acts 3:10-12

The words, "Imitate me" from a lesser man's lips would sound very naive and narcissistic. However, from Paul's lips they were neither. He didn't just say, "Imitate me," he added a qualifier, "as I imitate Christ." In other words, leaders must provide potential followers with visible and verifiable examples that



warrant following. Jesus Christ is the only One who can provide that for any leader who desires to be an authentic servant leadership. This is critical because both leader and follower possess the propensity toward operating in the flesh. Followers have to be careful not to become "cliquish" when it comes to certain leaders such as what the Corinthians did with Paul, Apollos, and Peter. Followers also have the tendency to give credit to leaders for things that only God can do. When a leader is used by God and blesses His people in miraculous ways, they must do as Peter and John did when God used them in the healing of a paralyzed beggar. Instead



of taking the credit for it, Peter used it as an opportunity to lift up Jesus.

Paul did the same when he told the Corinthians that he planted and Apollos watered, but it was God who gave the increase. I once heard someone say taking credit for God's work is like receiving mail in one's mailbox that belongs to someone else. When that happens, put it back in the mailbox and put the flag up.
