Rosa Parks Committee Makes Formal DOJ Request

One year ago, concerned citizens engaged in peaceful protest in downtown Hunts-ville to display their concerns about the murder of George Floyd and the policing of Black people and other People of Color. The unfortunate treatment of some of the protestors by police officers and other law enforcement agents ignited a local movement that raised concerns and questions about some of the tactics and protocols used by the

Huntsville Police Department (HPD).

Since those initial concerns were raised, other incidents have occurred – including the very recent stomping of Kemontae Hobbs by a HPD officer. Because Hobbs has been identified by his mother as having a mental disability, the use of force by the officer is particularly disturbing.

In light of these and other incidents, the Rosa Parks Committee of Huntsville

has followed through with its pledge to make a formal request for the Department of Justice to investigate the HPD. Concerns include the policing of citizens experiencing mental health crises, those engaged in lawful assemblies and protests, and those who are racial minorities.

'Bob' Harrison Center Reopens

After much anticipation, the Robert "Bob" Harrison Senior Wellness and Advocacy Center will reopen to members and guests this month.

"We can't wait to welcome everyone back," says District 6 Commissioner Violet Edwards, who oversees the center. "We have taken several safety precautions and feel we can open a safe space for seniors to be able to socialize and workout."

The center, located at 6156 Pulaski Pike, has been closed for the past 15 months due to COVID-19.

It will open with abbreviated times and programs on Monday, June 14, 2021, from 8 a.m.-1 p.m.

Normal hours will be phased in as the center reestablishes its membership. Hand sanitizer stations and disinfectants will be readily available for members to use, and the facility will get a deep cleaning daily.

The wearing of face masks will be strongly encouraged and social distancing will be mandatory.



"Perhaps the biggest addition we have made is the hiring of lifeguards. This was by far the biggest request made by members as we sought ways to enhance their experience," says Edwards.

were invited to the Welcome Back Bash on Thursday, June 10, 2021, on the Harrison Center grounds from 11 a.m. - 2 p.m.

There bash included free food, games, and the chance to catch up with old friends.

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Biden-Harris Administration Announce Plans to Build Black Wealth

On the centennial of the Tulsa Race Massacre, the Biden-Harris Administration announced new steps to help narrow the racial wealth gap and reinvest in communities that have been left behind by failed policies. Specifically, the Administration is expanding access to two key wealthcreators – homeownership and small business ownership – in communities of color and disadvantaged communities.

- The Administration will:
- Take action to address racial discrimination in the housing market ...
- Use the federal government's purchasing power to grow federal contracting with small disadvantaged businesses by 50 percent ...

The Administration is also releasing new information regarding President Biden's American Jobs Plan proposals to create jobs and build wealth in communities of color:

• A new \$10 billion Community Revitalization Fund to support community-led civic infrastructure projects that create innovative

shared amenities, spark new local economic activity, provide services, build community wealth, and strengthen social cohesion.

- \$15 billion for new grants and technical assistance to support the planning, removal, or retrofitting of existing transportation infrastructure that creates a barrier to community connectivity, including barriers to mobility, access, or economic development.
- A new Neighborhood Homes Tax Credit to attract private investment in the development and rehabilitation of affordable homes for low- and moderate-income homebuyers and homeowners.
- \$5 billion for the Unlocking Possibilities Program, an innovative new grant program that awards flexible and attractive funding to jurisdictions that take steps to reduce needless barriers to producing affordable housing and expand housing choices for people with low or moderate incomes.
- \$31 billion in small business programs that will

increase access to capital for small businesses and provide mentoring, networking, and other forms of technical assistance to socially and economically disadvantaged businesses seeking to access federal contracts and participate in federal research and development investments ...

President Biden is charging Secretary of Housing and Urban Development Marcia Fudge with leading a first-of-its-kind interagency initiative to address inequity in home appraisals. The effort will seek to utilize, quickly, the many levers at the federal government's disposal, including potential enforcement under fair housing laws, regulatory action, and development of standards and guidance in close partnership with industry and state and local governments, to root out discrimination in the appraisal and homebuying process. These are the kinds of policies and practices that keep Black families in Greenwood and across the nation from building generational wealth through homeownership ...

The Biden-Harris Ad-

ministration is launching an all-of-government effort to expand contracting opportunities for underserved small businesses across the country. At its center is a new goal: increasing the share of contracts going to small disadvantaged businesses by 50 percent by 2026—translating to an additional \$100 billion to SDBs over the 5-year period. To achieve this goal, agencies will assess every available tool to lower barriers to entry and increase

opportunities for small businesses and traditionally-underserved entrepreneurs to compete for federal contracts. The impact could be historic: all told, attainment of the new goal will represent the biggest increase in SDB contracting since data was first collected more than 30 years ago.


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AAMU Receives Fulbright Distinction for 2nd Year

Alabama A&M University has been named a Fulbright Historically Black College and University Institutional Leader by the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs (ECA). The Fulbright HBCU Institutional Leader designation recognizes AAMU's noteworthy engagement with the Fulbright Program.

ECA created the Fulbright HBCU Institutional Leaders initiative in recognition of the special role the nation's 105 HBCUs play in making sure students, faculty, and administrators are able to participate in and benefit from the Fulbright Program.

This year marks the second time that AAMU achieved this recognition. The campuses highlighted this year demonstrated engagement with Fulbright exchange participants and promoted Fulbright Program opportunities on their campuses during the 2019-2020 academic year.


In December 2019, AAMU was part of the inaugural group of 19 institutions that received the designation for the 2018-19 academic year.

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

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Revisiting Voter Suppression: A Political "Thorn in the Flesh" and a Left-Handed Compliment

"... so I wouldn't get a big head, I was given the gift of a handicap to keep me in constant touch with my limitations... . At first I didn't think of it as a gift, and begged God to remove it...." - 2 Corinthians 12:7,8

Here, the Apostle Paul felt that in order to keep him from over-celebrating his victories, God permitted an unnamed thorn to pierce his flesh and humble him.

Paul's response to his "thorn in the flesh" actually

strengthened him into expanding his evangelistic outreach throughout Asia Minor, and not suppress it.

Efforts of states at voter suppression (thorns in the flesh) can be just what's needed to keep young people and people of color aware, agitated and active in retaining and even expanding their recent political victories.

Recent national election victories have elevated the significance and voting power of young voters and people of color. The historic 2020-2021 elections of Vice President Kamala Harris and Georgia U.S. Senators Jon Ossoff and Raphael Warnock are being met aggressively with 400+ voter suppression bills in 47 of our 50 state legislatures.

But as Paul noted 2000 years ago, those weakening thorns can be used to make ones stronger.

White House victories often cause their supporters to fall asleep politically. Historically, they lost their subsequent midterm and presidential election years.

Conversely, such outcomes can mobilize the losers. Due to current voter supressionists' efforts, however, these next few years could reverse those trends.

Voter Suppression Campaigns: The New "Pandemic"

This current voter suppression "pandemic" might just keep Democrats and their supporters awake, agitated, and politically active, forecasts former Republican National Committee Chair Michael Steele.

Steele chided Republicans, "How do you think this ends? Do you think black folks will just sit by and let you get away with this?" He reminded them that GOPs would be remembered as voting against their right to vote.



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Hearing Aid


Romans 10:17
