
New Book Captures Rich History of Local Holy Family School



Fangs Up, FAMU Rattlers! "Uncle Tim" Salutes and Welcomes Your New Men's Coach, Patrick Crarey II

Suppose the foundation of successful leadership is influence and relationships.

In that case, Patrick Crarey II, the new men's basketball coach at Florida A&M University (FAMU), is poised to build a thriving basketball program. His impressive track record, marked by winning influence and strong relationships, speaks volumes about his qualifications.

"Uncle Tim," as he still calls me, first met the seven-year-old in April 1991 at an Oakwood College Aeolians Choir concert at the Ephesus Seventh-day Adventist Church in Richmond, Virginia. He and his older sister April, younger brother Brandon, and their parents, ER doctor Patrick and clinical therapist Denise, were present.

That first encounter led to a close family relationship, and therefore, I indirectly watched "little Patrick" grow in his basketball coaching prowess later.

Over the next 33 years, I witnessed Patrick's transformation into a leader of student-athletes and a highly respected winning coach on a national level. His journey is a testament to his dedication and passion for the game.

Patrick's coaching prowess featured a 10-year run that led the Washington Adventist University (MD) Shock to a USCAA national championship in 2014. This feat solidified his reputation as

tional championship in 2014. This feat solidified his reputation as a successful head coach and athletic director.

Then, in 2021, his subsequent tenure at St.Thomas University (FL), where he achieved a 61-27 overall record in three seasons, further underscored his ability to lead teams to victory, winning the 2024 Sun Conference regular-season title and being named coach of the year.

During the 2023 NBA Summer League, Crarey served as its San Antonio Spurs guest coach, working closely with Victor Wembanyama, the league's No. 1 draftee and subsequent Rookie of the Year. "Working with the Spurs last summer enlightened me on many different things in basketball. We will be a systematically- and analytically-based team."

"I don't have a lot of slogans, but I have one: relationships and championships. . . . My relationship with my God, my family, and my players are the most important things in my life," Crarey stated in his April 17 introductory press conference.

More than money, Crarey concluded, his biggest resource to have is people. "I will make you proud. Quickly. Fangs up!"

Mr. Richard Knight

Born March 1948 in Mobile, Ala., Mr. Richard Knight was the second child of a single parent. His mother was a firm disciplinarian to Richard and his sister, expertly and lovingly raising them without their father. His mother worked as a "domestic" worker until she was called home to be with the Lord just two weeks after Knight turned 14 years old. Her loss became the pivoting moment in his life. To this day, Knight will tell you that his mother's firm hand made him the man that he became. His aunt took custody of Richard and his sister after their mother's death.

At a young age, Knight worked long hours doing community service and odd jobs "to earn money." That also included doing farm work. He learned barbering, another skill he could use to earn money. Before age 15, Knight struck out on his own to become a self-made man. The values and work ethic his mother instilled in him from an early age is what got him through very hard and difficult times. He became acquainted with "poverty" conditions early in life and decided he would work hard to change his circumstances in an effort to avoid poverty for the rest of his life. Though very young, he was very wise for his age and began to make solid and responsible choices. To this day, he lives with those values his mother poured into him.

In 1966, Knight graduated

from Union High School in Monroe County, Ala. He loved building things with his hands. He continued his education at J.F. Drake State Technical College in Huntsville. He took up bricklaying and masonry trades and was an honor student throughout his attendance and graduated in 1968. He had only worked for a short time after his graduation when he was drafted into the U.S. Army; but he enlisted in the United States Marine Corps. Knight trained hard as a young recruit and was sent to Vietnam in May 1968. He served one tour of duty as an Infantry (0331) Machine Gunner M60.

When he completed his time in the Marine Corps and returned home to the United States, along with his fellow comrades, they were not well received. To their amazement, after putting their lives on the line and experiencing some of the most horrific emotional encounters that nearly cost them their sanity and their lives, much to their dismay, they were met with angry protestor's and not a "Welcome Home Parade". But he received an honorable discharge and stepped into the real world "as a man," who took on a wife and started a family of his own. As of August 2019, he has been married for 45 years. They have four (4) children, two (2) grandsons and one (1) granddaughter. Knight worked for a manufacturing firm as a refractory supervi-



sor and Installer. After 34 years of service, he retired in 2003. In 34 years of service, Knight only used 30 days of leave in 34 years. That is unheard of. This is indicative of his strong work ethic.

After retiring, he began to do special work that he says, "The Lord has called me to do": to work with the Vietnam Veterans. This is his ministry. He has worked just as hard, if not harder, since retiring and with no pay. But he absolutely loves it! He is devoted to his calling and loves what he does; and he does it extremely well. He has made such a huge difference in the lives of veterans. He has gotten much done for all of the men and women who have come to him for his help and assistance. This is truly his "high calling". Knight promised God that, if he survived Vietnam, he would never use another gun again in his life. He kept his promise and has never been in trouble with the law. He taught his children to "|ove their fellow man, their country and to love God".

For this special performance, Panion, a 2023 Alabama Music Hall of Fame inductee, will produce, arrange and conduct the National Symphony Orchestra.

Also featured will be gospel stars Marvin Winans of the Winans family; Dorinda Clark-Cole of the Clark Sisters; Maurette Brown Clark, whose career started as a member of the Richard Smallwood Singers; Vision, the choir heard on many of Smallwood's most famous recordings; and the Bowie State University Choir and Howard University Gospel Choir, of which Smallwood is an alumnus.

"A Gospel Symphony Celebration: Tribute to Richard Smallwood at 75" will be Panion's third time conducting the National Symphony Orchestra; the first was for a July Fourth concert with Stevie Wonder on the grounds of the United States Capitol for a crowd of 500,000 and tens of millions on television, and the second for two sold-out shows with R&B singer India Arie.

"I am honored to be invited back to lead this world-renowned orchestra, and to know that I am forever listed among some of the most important conductors in history to have this privilege, such as Mstislav Rostropovich, Pierre Boulez, Herbert von Karajan, Zubin Mehta, Leonard Slatkin, Seiji Ozawa, Sir Simon Rattle and Leonard Bernstein," Panion said. "To see their photos displayed on the walls in the conductor's dressing room is a pinch-me moment."

Since its founding in 1931, the NSO has been committed to performances that enrich the lives of its audience and community members. In 1986, the National Symphony became an artistic affiliate of The Kennedy Center,



where it has performed since the Center opened in

1971. The 96-member NSO participates in events of national and international

importance, including the annual nationally televised concerts on the lawn of the United States Capitol, The Kennedy Center Honors and the orchestra's representation of the United States on their international tours, Panion says.

For the 2023-2024 season, Panion appears with The Greensboro Symphony, Syracuse Orchestra, Buffalo Philharmonic, Charlotte Symphony, Alabama Symphony, Richmond Symphony, Virginia Symphony, Canton Symphony, Baltimore Symphony and the National Symphony.

During the upcoming 2024-2025 season, Panion will lead the Alabama Symphony in a reprisal of the highly successful "A Gospel Symphony Celebration" featuring Dorinda Clark-Cole, set for Sunday, Nov. 17, at UAB's Alys **Stephens Performing Arts** Center. Panion will present a special valentine concert on Saturday, Feb. 8, 2025, featuring "American Idol" winner Ruben Studdard in "Ruben Sings Luther."

AAMU Agribition Center Makes Transformation for NASA's 'Break the Ice' Lunar Challenge

Excitement mounted behind AAMU's Agribition Center as crews transformed the terrain, creating a lunar-like landscape for the adrenalinepumping Final Phase of NASA's Break the Ice Lunar Challenge.

This groundbreaking competition, initiated by NASA in 2020, seeks innovative solutions for excavating icy lunar regolith and delivering crucial resources in the Moon's extreme environments. The ultimate goal? To develop cutting-edge technologies that will pave the way for a sustained human presence on the Moon.

Competitors from across the globe have battled through Phase 1 and Phase 2, designing and testing their mettle in both indoor and outdoor environments. The challenge culminates in designing, building, and rigorously testing robots capable of withstanding the brutal conditions of the Moon's permanently shadowed regions at the Lunar South Pole. Out of numerous contenders, only six formidable teams advanced to the finals:

- · Starpath Robotics (San Francisco, CA)
- \cdot Terra Engineering (Gardena, CA)
- · The Ice Diggers (Golden, CO)
- · Cislune Excavators (Los

Angeles, CA)

- · Space Trajectory (Brookings, SD)
- · MTU Planetary Surface Technology Development Lab (Houghton, MI)

These teams converged at AAMU's Agribition Center from June 11 to 12, vying for victory in the intense Level 3 testing phase, where a staggering \$1.5 million in prizes was up for grabs.

NASA's Break the Ice Challenge went out with a bang, and organizers were excited to coordinate with Alabama A&M University and its Agribition Center for the final event," according to Kim Krome, acting program manager for NASA Centennial Challenges at the agency's Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Ala.

The unique facilities of the Agribition Center provided the perfect backdrop to close out the \$3.5 million competition.

The competition tested two critical components: excavation and transportation. In the arena, six identically sized concrete slabs, each about 300 cubic feet, replicated the challenging conditions of the Moon's South Pole craters. A gravity-offloading crane system applied the counterweights on the excava-

tors, to mimick the Moon's one-sixth gravity.

Outside the Agribition Center, challenge teams took turns on a custombuilt track outfitted with slopes, boulders, pebbles, rocks, and gravel to simulate the lunar surface. This volatile surface stretched approximately 300 meters and included several twists and turns for more intermediate handling.

Each team had one hour to dig as much material as possible or reach their robot's payload capacity. Up to three top-performing teams earned the chance to test their solutions inside one of Marshall's thermal vacuum chambers, replicating the harsh temperature and vacuum conditions of the lunar South Pole.

The stakes were skyhigh: the first-place team took home a colossal \$1 million, while the second-place team earned \$500,000.

The NASA Break the Ice Challenge unfolded on Tuesday, June 11, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., and Wednesday, June 12, from 8:00 a.m. to 4 p.m. with an awards ceremony commencing at 5 p.m. This exhilarating event was free and open to the public.
