2. CONGRESS. The House reconvened on Tuesday and took up, among other items, a bill to allow employers to create Health Reimbursement Arrangements (in lieu of employer-provided healthcare plans) to reimburse employees for medical expenses and plan premiums and a resolution condemning New York City Mayor Eric Adams for housing undocumented immigrants in city schools who were sent by

a speech on clean energy and the environment in Palo Alto and attended two fundraisers in Atherton and Los Gatos ... According to The Washington Post, the next two weeks will see at least 20 fundraisers attended by the First and Second Families ahead of the June 30 quarter's end. On Thursday, the President hosted India's Prime Minister Narendra Modi for an official state visit that included a state dinner on Thursday night.

4. SUPREME COURT. The Court will continue to issue decisions from its current docket this week, as it moves to wrap up its 2022-23 term. The cases that are still pending include a case on whether the Colorado graphic design firm 303 Creative can withhold services on religious grounds from gay couples wanting to post wedding websites, a case on the affirmative action admissions policies at Harvard and the University of North Carolina, and the case on President Biden's student loan


forgiveness plan (note: 2 weeks ago President Biden vetoed a bill that would have canceled the student loan plan). 5. FISCAL YEAR 2024 AP-PROPRIATIONS. The Senate Appropriations Committee started off its markups of the FY 2024 appropriations bills Thursday with full committee votes on the Military Construction/VA appropriations bill and Agriculture appropriations bill (skipping subcommittee markups on both bills). The House will have full committee markups this week on 4 bills: Defense, Energy & Water, Homeland Security, and Leg Branch.

6. DEFENSE BILL AND ABORTION POLICY. This week, the Senate Armed Services Committee will start its consideration of the annual multi-billion-dollar Defense Authorization bill, which will include a vote on a separate bill by Sen. Joni Ernst (R-IA) to rescind the Pentagon's abortion policy, which allows servicemembers up to 21 days of leave June 23, 2023

for abortions and fertility treatments and reimburses them for travel expenses. The vote on the Ernst bill is seen as an attempt to persuade Sen. Tommy Tuberville (R-AL) to end his 4-month-long hold on all civilian, flag, and general officer nominations at the Defense Department, which he instituted to protest the policy. 7. COLLEGE COSTS. On June 14, Senator Bill Cassidy (R-Louisiana), the ranking member of the Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions Committee, and several of his Republican colleagues on Wednesday released a package of five bills focused on curbing college costs for students.

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

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

Congrats, NBA's Denver Nuggets: the new international standard of leading from the middle!

"Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, ..." Matthew 28:19.

On Monday night June 12, the Denver Nuggets defeated the Miami Heat 94-89, to win its first NBA championship.

More importantly, however, they showcased not only its leading from the middle but also the league's growing international flavor.



In 2014, Nikola Jokic was not a top draft choice, but the 41st draftee in the NBA's second round of prospects. He chose instead to remain in his native Serbia, further polishing his skills.

Joining the NBA in 2015, he rose from relative obscurity to third place in the 2016 NBA Rookie of the Year balloting and All-Rookie First Team honors.

He's now a five-time NBA All-Star, 2021 and 2012 league Most Valuable Player, and now the 2023 Finals MVP.

After suffering a torn ACL in 2022, Nuggets co-star Jamal Murray returned in 2023 to team with Jokic in leading the Nuggets to its first championship in its 47-year history. As a rookie in 2017, he led the NBA in games played, all 82 games, and made its All-Rookie Team.

Just like the Serbian Jokic, the Canadian-born Murray represents the league's expanding international outreach and flavor.

According to How does the NBA impact society and the sports industry?, the NBA is viewed by many as:

- One of the most internationally outreached major sports leagues, as 108 of its current 450 players (24%) are internationals.
- Seven foreign-born NBA players have received 11 Most Valuable Player (MVP) awards: Hakeem Olajuwon (Nigeria), Tim Duncan (U.S. Virgin Islands), Steve Nash (Canada), Dirk Nowitzki (Germany), Giannis Antetokounmpo (Greece), Nikola Jokić (Serbia), and Joel Embiid (Cameroon).
- More specifically, the last five MVPs Antetokounmpo (2019, 2020), Jokic (2021, 2022), and Embiid (2023) - are internationally born-players.
- Having the youngest audience demographic of any sport; and
- A total of 250 members of NBA teams, coaches, and players from 30 different NBA teams serve as camp coaches for over 1200 youngsters from over 100 countries worldwide.

This NBA/Nuggets experience should become our lesson on expanding beyond our local comforts and embracing and succeeding within the global community like that of the NBA.

Minister LaVern Spearman has served the scouting community in various capacities for more than 30 years. For three decades, he has served as Scoutmaster (SM) of Troop 102, sponsored by First Missionary Baptist Church, Blue Springs Road, Huntsville, Ala.

Over 75 Scouts have earned Boy Scouts of Anlerica's highest achievement award, the rank of Eagle Scout, under his tenure. Over the years and along with other scout leaders, SM Spearman has seen over 6,000 scouts across Madison County and the surrounding Huntsville area become physically strong, morally straight and mentally awake.

He has served in various roles in the church as Deacon, Minister of Church School Education, and as teacher of various Church school classes. He is the president and founder of Body of Christ Ministries, which is a ministry designed to encourage men and women to take their rightful and God-given places in the church, family and workplace.

This ministry orchestrates trips to various Christian retreats, conferences and spiritual outreaches. He teaches an inner-city Monday Night Bible Study to men and women across social, racial and denominational lines. He works with the Neaves-Davis Youth Detention Center to deter all youth from becoming a statistic in the criminal justice system and to show them that "you cannot walk with God and run with the Devil."

Before his retirement in 2012, he taught and shared in a weekly mid-day lunch Bible class with men and women at Redstone Arsenal for over 15 years. In addition, he works extensively with the Kairos Prison Ministry International in strengthening the spiritual lives of prisoners in Limestone and other surrounding counties.

Spearman also serves with the Alabama Walk to Emmaus Community to inspire, challenge, and equip leaders for Christian action in their homes, places of work, and in their local churches and communities and has served as Lay Director of the Huntsville Emmaus Cluster.

Minister Spearman is a Board member of Marketplace Leadership Luncheon ministry with a primary mission of empowering the business community to recognize and fulfill their calling in the workplace, building God's Kingdom, impacting lives, and transforming communities



through biblical principles in understanding the divine purpose for their lives.

Mr. Spearman was employed with the United States Army Aviation and Missile Command at Redstone Arsenal, Ala., as a senior physicist in the US Army Test, Measurement and Diagnostic Equipment Activity, Engineering Division. He is an honor graduate of Alabama A&M University in the physics field and has studied theology with the Liberty Bible Institute of Lynchburg, Va.

He and his wife, Lola, are members of Calvary Assembly in Tanner, Alabama, and have two adult children, son Xavier, and daughter Pastor Shannel Spearman-Burrows, who pastors West Pembroke Assembly Church in Hamilton, Bermuda, and four grandsons ages 12, 11, 11 and 7, as well as one 8-year-old granddaughter.

Huntsville's 19th Century Black History Telling Our Stories Emancipation Day A Circle of Remembrance The Circle of Remembrance

The Emancipation Proclamation was issued January 1, 1863. However, all enslaved people were not freed until the 13th amendment was issued on June 19, 1965. Many African Americans continued to celebrate Emancipation Day on January 1st. One such celebration was held January 1, 1895, at the State Normal School (Alabama A&M University). Professor Samuel Bowles Johnson Carter was the speaker. Following is a portion of the Emancipation Day address given by Samuel J. B. Carter. He stated:

"Go with me in thought while I retrospect and picture a scene in the dark days of slavery. See, our poor fathers and mothers down on their knees on the dew damp ground at the hour of midnight, with wearied limbs and heavy *hearts—with streaming eyes* and grief distorted faces turned toward Heaven, cry, 'LORD, OH LORD, HOW LONG?'-Pouring out their souls unto God in prayer for freedom from the clanking chains, and the iron heel of an institution that was crushing out alike their manhood and their lives -- and for deliverance from the hydra-headed monster, human slavery. Thank God, *their prayers were heard—Yes,* alas! And answered in the fearful retribution of war and devastation.

The great God of freedom announced the freedom of the slave on a thousand battle fields. He proclaimed it by the roar of musketry and thunder of artillery—by the shrieks of the wounded and the groans of the dying. Yes, He wrote it out *in the long red lines of battle,* while the trembling earth stood aghast at the reading. Messengers were sent from the fields of *battle to the homes of people, here without an arm, there*

without a leg, while aged men and weeping women cried out *the anguish of their souls—let* the nation live and the bond go free. The struggle continues, and gloom and consternation are depicted in the face of the Union, and for more than three years the life of the Union seemed to be in great peril, and the angel of death hovered over the nation. But, be it said to the everlasting credit of the *Negro, that, the rebellion was* not crushed nor the slave made free, until 180,000 brave manly Afro Americans volunteered their service and went out on the field of battle for the Nation, and fall, if need be, (as *many did) a willing sacrifice* on the blood stained altars of their country in common cause to save the bleeding nation. *Did they flee or falter in time* of danger? No, never! See how bravely they fought and died at Fort Pillow and Waggoner, *New Market Heights and other* places of gloom and death.

Their bravery and determination struck the death blow to slavery and won for the race a title to citizenship and recognition. Suffice it to say that slavery is dead, buried and epitaph is "No Resurrection." The rebellion died with slavery. But alas! It's ghost like Bangnio's, won't down—but stalks about the country haunting and harassing our people in the form of the klu klux klan; regulators, whitecaps and mobs. Regardless of persecutions and proscriptions the Negro has undergone and impediments thrown across his path in every avenue of life, he is steadily marching onward and upward, intellectually, morally and financially, to higher plain of civilization. And he only asks *that other people stand out* of his sunshine and give him an equal showing in the race of life. Man or monkey-according to chances, he has few

equals and no superiors in this or any other country.

Just 22 years ago, on the 1st day on January 1863, the immortal Lincoln, then President of the United States of America, issued and signed that memorable document, the EMANCIPATION PROCLA-MATION that legalized the freedom of the slave population of this country, and the amendments to the Constitution of the United States, and several states as well, clothed him with all rights and immunities of citizenship-though he fails to get them. Since then he has oc*cupied many important places* of honor and trust. He has made his mark on the bench and at the bar; he has faithfully and honorably represented this country as minister in foreign courts; he has had the distinguished honor to be a member of the National Legislature and deliberate on the grave questions of the day in the highest council of the Nation as Senator and Congressman.

Yes, he has marshalled the District of Columbia, and written his name on the currency of this country. He founded high schools and colleges, and managed them with signal skill and ability. He has accumulated wealth in every part of the country, and pays taxes on millions of dollars worth of property. The educated minister, lawyer, doctor and mechanic stands the easy equal of his Ango-Saxton brother.

In the more common walks and avocations of life, where nerve and muscles are required, he measures up to the full standard of a man.

Then courage, my brother, do no stumble, Should your path seem dark at night, There's a star to guide the humble-Trust in God and do the right. Let us do our whole duty now and here. *Hope for everything, nothing* fear; Then shout, shout, let everybody shout, *Join the general jubilee,* For Abraham Lincoln has spoken, And slavery's yoke is broken, Our country and our people now are free.

About Samuel Johnson **Bowles Carter** (S.J.B. Carter)

Professor Samuel J. B. Carter was born in 1843 in the state of Tennessee. He and his wife Malinda, had five children; Allen A., Mattie A. Ida, Samella and Fred D. Carter. He was a teacher, associate editor of the Huntsville Gazette and the Weekly Journal, assistant principal of the State Normal School in 1875, member of the board of trustees of Central Alabama Academy, member of Lakeside Methodist Episcopal Church and acting real estate agent for Boyd & Wellman. He served on many boards and represented the Republican Party at state and national conventions. Samuel was also a poet and outstanding orator. His speech delivered at the State Normal School in 1895 entitled "The Causes that Lead to, and the Results of the Emancipation Proclamation" was published in The Journal newspaper in 1895. Many of his poems are published in The Huntsville Gazette. In 1896, Samuel was a candidate for commissioner of the 3rd district which included the black belt. In 1899, he was in the hack business with an excellent team of horses. In 1903, he served on the grand jury at the United States Court. Professor Samuel J. B. Carter died February 21, 1912. He is buried at Glenwood Cemetery.
