Washington One Minute

Here are the happenings in Washington, D.C., this week: 1. CONGRESS. The House and Senate are in session this week. The Senate is expected to take up its version of the \$886 billion Defense Authorization bill this week that narrowly passed the House on Friday on a largely party-line 219-210 vote (last year's bill passed the House on a more bipartisan 329-101 vote), after conservatives successfully attached a host of policy riders to the bill that would restrict funding for service members to travel to obtain abortions; deny transgender troops

coverage for gender transition surgeries and hormone therapy; eliminate all of the Pentagon's diversity offices and employees; ban the Pentagon from buying books that espouse radical gender ideology; prohibit Defense Department schools from teaching that the nation or its founding documents are racist; ban the flying of gay pride flags on military bases; and ban affirmative action admission policies at U.S. military academies (the recent Supreme Court case that ended affirmative action exempted military academies). Notably, the House decisively voted

down a series of GOP amendments that would have restricted further military assistance to Ukraine. The House, among other items, will take up the 5-year reauthorization of the Federal Aviation Administration and its

programs, including a controversial provision to raise the retirement age for pilots from 65 to 67 years. On Wednesday, Israeli President Isaac Herzog will address a joint meeting of Congress.

2. THE WHITE HOUSE. After returning from his 5-day European trip, the President spent the weekend at Camp David. On Tuesday, the President met with Israeli President Isaac Herzog at the White House. On Wednesday evening, he hosted members of Congress and their spouses at the annual Congressional Picnic on the South Lawn of the White House. On Thursday, he will travel to Philadelphia to make remarks on the economy. On Monday, the First Lady held a youth soccer clinic at the White House in conjunction with the MLS All-Star Game which was played in DC on Wednesday. Last Friday, the Biden Administration announced that 804,000 student loan borrowers with a total of \$39 billion in loans will have their loans erased per the forgiveness rules for borrowers using the income-driven repayment (IDR) plan that al-

lows forgiveness after 20 or 25 years of qualifying months. 3. SUPREME COURT. The court is adjourned until Monday, Oct. 2. On Thursday, the Senate Judiciary Committee will vote on a bill to create a new code of conduct for Supreme Court justices, including enhanced disclosure requirements - especially when connected to anyone appearing before the court. The bill is titled "the Supreme Court Ethics, Recusal and Transparency (SCERT) Act." 4. JUNE INFLATION RE-

PORT. Last week, the Department of Labor announced that the inflation rate had dropped to an annual rate of 3% in June, the lowest rate in more than two years and down substantially from 9% in June 2022. In related news, at the next Federal Reserve meeting on July 25-26, the Fed is expected to enact a quarter percentage point rate hike.

5. FY2024 APPROPRIA-TIONS. This week, the House Appropriations Committee will continue work on the FY2024 appropriations bills, with full committee markups on Tuesday and Wednesday for the Transportation/HUD and Interior bills. Next week, the House is planning to take up the Agriculture and Military Construction bills on the House floor. Notably, despite many cuts to domestic spending programs, the House GOP Leadership has protected the project earmarking process and has published lists containing thousands of project earmarks in this year's bills. On Thursday, the Senate Appropriations Committee will markup 3 bills in full committee: Energy & Water, State/Foreign Operations, and Transportation/ HUD.

6. UPS STRIKE. Last Friday, United Parcel Service (UPS) announced that it would start training non-union workers as replacements for the 340,000 UPS Teamster employees who are threatening to walk off the job at the end of July when their current contract expires. UPS delivers 25 million packages per day, representing a whopping 6% of the U.S. GDP. The Biden Administration, which last year intervened to prevent a massive rail strike, has reportedly been in contact with both sides, but has not yet formally started negotiations.

7. INDICTMENT WATCH. According to The Washington Post, Special Counsel Jack Smith may bring indictments in the investigation into the Jan. 6 insurrection in the next 3 weeks, while Georgia's Fulton County D.A. Fani Willis has requested that no trials or in-person hearings be held the week of August 7 (possibly signaling that she will be issuing indictments in the Georgia portion of the plot to overthrow the 2020 election).





gardens for 30-plus years ... tomatoes, okra, potatoes, beans, corn, strawberries, watermelon and oh yes, the green patch. He tilled and planted. Others picked, cooked and canned. Many were blessed. One day he said, "I'm tired". He set all the equipment on the side of the yard and sold it.

He started his professional career in 1957 as a math technician for the Army Ballistic Missile Agency who changed their name in 1960 to NASA Marshall Space Flight Systems. He was one of five (5) black men who integrated this organization. Every morning they met, carpooled to work and brought everyone back



to their respective vehicles. The weight of the black race was on their shoulders.

In 2015 a featured publication, "We Could Not Fail, The First African Americans in Space", was written by Richard Paul and Steven Moss. It illustrated the roles NASA Space Program played in promoting civil rights. The publication became a documentary that aired on the Public

Broadcasting System in 2019. Richard Hall can be found in Chapter Seven.

Experience Certified Christian Life Coaching = Jesus 2.0

"Two are better than one, because they have a good return for their labor: If either of them falls down, one can help the other up. But pity anyone who falls and has no one to help them up" - Ecclesiastes 4:9,10

Oprah Winfrey, Presidents Clinton and Obama, Tiger Woods, Leonardo DiCaprio, and, yes, even Metallica all share one common experience: hiring a coach - a.k.a., a "trainer".

"Everyone needs a coach. We all need people to give us feedback. That's how we improve," endorsed Bill Gates.

There's a trained life coach for virtually every imagined need - e.g., career transition, stress relief, wellness/ fitness, defensive driving, cancer recovery, post-divorce co-parenting, communication, spiritual development, . . . Southern cooking!

And coaching differs from counseling, . . .

Coaching vs. Counseling?

Whereas counseling and therapy are state-licensed to address clients' past pains, coaching starts with one's present-day self-assessment tools and future-focused action steps, aided by the accountability to a trained, often certified life coach.



Marion Barley Hall was born in Madison County, Alabama, on December 10, 1936, to the late Daniel and Orell Draper Barley. She attended Councill Training High School and graduated in 1954.
