



Madison Utilities Opens New Water Facility

The Water & Wastewater Board of the City of Madison (Madison Utilities) officially opened the new Terris Tatum Tennessee River Intake Facility on Friday, July 13.

Named for the long-serving Madison Utilities Board Chair, Terris Tatum, this first Tennessee River Intake Facility for the City of Madison will allow for the withdrawal and treatment of an initial four (4) million gallons of water per day for treatment to service the residents of Madison with clean drinking water, with capacity for later plant expansion.

Tatum was first appointed to serve as a member of the Water and Wastewater Board of the City of Madison on March 12, 1991, and has served as Board Chairman since 1998. Since he has served on the board, Madison Utilities has completed \$50 million in infrastructure improvements to serve the residents of the City of Madison.

Aeolians Win Big in South Africa

The Oakwood University Aeolians achieved highest scores in two categories to win big at the 10th edition of World Choir Games in Tshwane, located in the northern part of South Africa.

Competing in the categories of Spirituals, University and College and Musica Contemporanea, the Aeolians bested over 22 other choirs from around the world, triumphing not only with the highest score in two of the three categories entered, but winning three gold medals, of which two were championships at the biennial event. Their gold medal-winning scores were:

- Spirituals 97.88
- University and College Choirs: 96.88
- Musica Comtemporanea: 91.00

The invited assortment of over 300 choirs this year hailed from around the world. Many came from South Africa, Sweden, Germany and beyond, as well as further-flung locales such as Singapore, Indonesia, Argentina, China and the United States.

organizers, hosted the world's largest choir competition for the first time on the continent of Africa with Tshwane as the host city. This year marks the 30th year of the games and 11 days of competition.

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Washington in One Minute

Here are the happenings in and around Washington, D.C., this week:

- 1. The full Senate will take up a package of 4 FY2019 appropriations bills: Transportation/HUD, Financial Services, Agriculture and Interior.
- 2. On Tuesday, President Trump traveled to Kan-

sas City, Mo., to address the 119th Veterans of Foreign Wars National Convention. On Wednesday, he met with European Union President Jean-Claude Juncker at the White House. On Thursday, the President traveled to Dubuque, Iowa, for a roundtable event where, according to the Des Moines Register,

the price of soybeans has dropped 20% since retaliatory tariffs against Iowa farm products imposed by China took effect earlier this year. He will then fly 330 miles south to Granite City, IL, where in March 2018, U.S. Steel put 500 workers back on the job by restarting one of two idled blast furnaces in response to the President's tariffs on imported steel and aluminum.

- 3. On Tuesday, the House Judiciary Committee held a hearing on how states may collect sales and use taxes on remote transactions in the wake of the Supreme Court's June 21 decision in South Dakota v. Wayfair which tossed out the 1992 physical presence doctrine, which allows states to expand their authority over online sales taxation.
- 4. On Wednesday, jury selection began in the trial of former Trump Campaign manager, Paul Manafort, in federal court in Alexandria, VA. Manafort was indicted in October 2017 on bank and tax fraud charges. According to Fox News, ex-lobbyist Tony Podesta, brother of Hillary Clinton's Campaign chair John Podesta, has been offered

immunity to testify against Manafort by Special Counsel Robert Mueller.

- 5. On Wednesday and Thursday, Secretary of State Mike Pompeo held the first Global Summit on Advancing Religious Freedom at the State Department with faith leaders and diplomats from the around the world. Vice President Mike Pence was expected to attend the event.
- 6. On Thursday, talks resumed in Washington with Mexican, Canadian, and U.S. officials attempting to complete the renegotiation of the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA). Mexican President-Elect Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador released a 7-page letter on Sunday that he sent to President Trump asking for swift conclusion to the NAFTA talks.
- 7. On Thursday at 11a.m., the Senate Committee on Health, Education,

Labor and Pensions held a full committee hearing on "Modernizing Apprenticeships to Expand Opportunities"

8. Last Thursday, President Trump signed an executive order establishing the National Council for the American Worker, an advisory board of administration officials, state and local leaders, and industry executives, to address urgent workforce issues. At the same event, a group of major employers, including FEDEX, Walmart, IBM, Boeing, and Apple, pledged to train (or retrain) thousands of American workers over the next 5

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

Body positivity groups are calling for the boycott of "Insatiable", Netflix's newest comedy series that stars Huntsville actress Debby Ryan.

Last week, the trailer made its rounds across the Internet and not many people are here for it. Premiering in less than two weeks, the show is already in hot water due to its controversial premise.

The series follows Patty (played by Ryan), a bullied, obese high schooler who dramatically loses weight after having her mouth wired shut over the summer. Returning to school with her newly-obtained physique, Patty plots revenge against those that previously wronged her.

"Insatiable" has a fullseason order and it appears that the popular streaming service has no plans to remove the show. No stranger to controversy, Netflix received backlash for their involve-



ment with "13 Reasons Why", another show that focuses on a high school following the suicide of a student. Based off Jay Asher's 2007 novel, the series got flack for its depiction of mental illness, suicide, and references to gun violence.

Marketed as a comedy, many organizations are accusing "Insatiable" to be a form of "fat shaming", calling the show "toxic." However, actress Alyssa Milano, who plays Patty's mother responded to naysayers stating, "We are addressing (through comedy) the damage that occurs through fat shaming."

The leading lady has yet to make an official statement regarding the show's backlash, but she did re-post an article that bolsters her T.V. parent's views. Ryan is best known for her tenure on the Disney Channel, appearing in popular programs "The Suite Life on Deck", "16 Wishes", "Radio Rebel" and "Jessie."

Ryan Seacrest and showrunner Lauren Gussis are executive producers. The controversial series stars Debby Ryan, Alyssa Milano, Dallas Roberts, Kimmy Shields, Irene Choi, Erinn Westbrook, Christopher Gorham and Michael Provost.

Huntsville Says Goodbye to Another Centenarian

Alabama A&M University's oldest alum, Mr. Robert Coleman "R.C." Adams, transitioned on Monday, July 16, 2018, at age 104.

Born in the town of Linden in Marengo County, Ala., Adams began his earthly journey on May 5, 1914. Following his primary and secondary education in Linden, Adams served in the United States Army during World War II.

Upon his return from the military, he made his home in Huntsville, Ala., in 1949. He earned his undergraduate degree in building science in 1955 and started Adams Construction Company.

His career and entrepreneurial endeavors led him to Huntsville's Community Action Agency and as owner of his own taxi cab company.

A faithful and dedicated member of Progressive Union Missionary Baptist Church, Adams was well known for his community and civic involvement.



During the 1960's, he participated in the civil rights movement and followed Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., around the state of Alabama

and was present at the Selma to Montgomery march across the Edmund Pettus Bridge on March 7, 1965.

Additionally, he served as one of the organizers of the Huntsville/Madison County Branch of the NAACP and served as president.

In his vast lifetime, Adams received scores of honors, accolades, commendations, citations and proclamations for recognition for his life work and service to the greater Huntsville area as one of the oldest members of the community.

The celebration of life service was held on Friday, July 20, 2018 at Progressive Union Missionary Baptist with Dr. Wayne P. Snodgrass as officiant. Terri L. Ray and the staff of Nelms Memorial Funeral Home assisted the family.

the wrong motives. Not realizing that we stand in the way of our own prayers. And finally when we seek self-gratification it affects our relationship with God. Because God dislikes those who seek to be number one at the expense of others.

Proverbs 29:23 says, A man's pride will bring him low, but the humble in spirit will retain honor. You see. we are not faithful to God when we constantly feed the desires of our flesh. So the remedy for all of these problems can be found in James 4:7, where it says, "submit yourselves to God and resist the devil and he will flee from you."

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
