Alabama A&M University students, Samarion Flowers and Morgan Marshall were named among undergraduate, graduate, and professional students from 29 different states and countries for their accomplishments in academics, leadership, and civic engagement.

A Detroit, Mich., native, Flowers is a senior urban and regional planning major and a Thurgood Marshall College Fund scholar. Marshall, a senior communications major from Montgomery, Ala., is an Entertainment Industry College Outreach Program student currently part of the HBCU in LA initiative.

"Our 2023 HBCU Scholars are talented students who embody the culture of excellence and inclusion championed by our nation's HBCUs," said U.S. Secretary of Education Miguel Cardona. "On behalf of the U.S. Department of Education and everyone across the Biden-Harris Administration, I congratulate each of our 2023 HBCU scholars on this prestigious recognition and thank them for their commitment to serving their communities."

Currently enrolled at 70 of HBCUs, this group of scholars were selected from a competitive pool of over 300 applicants.

1. CONGRESS. The House and Senate are in session this week. The House will bring the first 2 of the 12 annual FY2024

appropriations bills to the floor: Military Construction/VA and Agriculture. Last week, the hard-right House Freedom Caucus exacted a pledge from the GOP Leadership to make further cuts to the EV2024

also a persistent rumor that that the House will take up resolutions to expunge the 2 impeachments of former President Trump (for soliciting Ukraine's interference in the 2020 U.S. presidential election and for inciting the Jan. 6 attack on the Capitol), after Politico last week reported that House Speaker Kevin McCarthy (R-CA) had promised former President Trump a vote on expungement before the 6-week August congressional recess, which starts this Friday. The Senate on Tuesday continued voting on its version of the \$886 billion FY2024 defense authorization bill.

2. THE WHITE HOUSE. On Tuesday, President Biden signed a proclamation to create the Emmett Till and Mamie Till-Mobley National Monument across 3 sites in Chicago and Mississippi, on what would

have been Mr. Till's 82nd birthday. On Thursday, the President welcomed Italian Prime Minister Giorgia Meloni to the White House and on Thursday evening, the President is scheduled to deliver remarks at the Truman Civil Rights Symposium at the National Archives. On Friday, the President will travel to Maine. On Monday, First Lady Jill Biden was in Paris, where she participated in ceremonies to mark the U.S. rejoining the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), from which the Trump Administration withdrew in 2017.

3. FEDERAL RESERVE MEETING. The Federal Reserve's Federal Open Market Committee met this Tuesday and Wednesday and was expected to raise rates by 25 basis points, which many in the financial world believe will be the last rate hike in this cycle. According to Reuters, the S&P 500 Index is up nearly 19% year-to-date and closed on Thursday at 4,534.87, only about 6% below an all-time high reached in January 2022.

4. HOMELAND SECU-RITY HEARING. On Wednesday at 10:00 a.m.,

Homeland Security Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas testified before the House Judiciary Committee and was expected to face many questions on last week's action by the Biden Administration to order the State of Texas to remove the 1,000foot chain of orange buoys in the Rio Grande River that it installed to deter illegal crossings near Eagle Pass, TX, because state officials did not obtain permits to place the barriers in the international waterway, where construction is regulated by border treaties between the U.S. and Mexico.

5. CLIENT WASHING-TON VISITS. Last week. Hamm Consulting Group welcomed clients Lansing Community College and the Network of Schools of Public Policy, Affairs, and Administration (NASPAA) for meetings on Capitol Hill and with various federal agencies to advocate for higher education, workforce training and development, and the education and training for students to enter public service.

with what's going on inside of us.


God is concerned with matters of the heart. Whenever we start comparing our lives to other people, we end up frustrated, incomplete, and miserable.



Our First John

King Herod could not resist John the Baptist's words and life-calling. Despite imprisoning John for exposing Herod's affair with his sister-in-law Herodias, the king was drawn to the first John - Christianity's "O.G.".!

Our Last John

On July 30, when we said goodbye and thanks to the last John (Lewis), civil rights O.G. and longtime Georgia congressman, we commemorated our last John mimicking our first John. Both:

Caused "Good Trouble," John Lewis' slogan for justified civil disobedience;

Were imprisoned for speaking truth to power; but most importantly,

Paved the way for future human rights activism and political in-correctness.

Their Legacies

In baptizing his cousin, John launched Jesus' threeyear ministry. Today 2000 years later, approximately 2.7 billion people - one of every three world citizens - claim to be followers of Jesus Christ.

Lewis was the early wunderkind of the Civil Rights Movement which spawned such 60's Good Trouble as the Anti-Vietnam War, Free Speech, Gay Rights, and Women's Liberation movements.

The youngest 1963 March on Washington speaker at age 23, our last John is dubbed by many as the "O.G." of today's Black Lives Matter movement, fueled by young people worldwide demanding racial justice and fairness.



A&M Physicists Receive DOD Grant

As part of the FY2023 U.S. Department of Defense Historically Black Colleges and Universities and Minority-Serving Institutions (HBCU/MSI) Research and Education Program, the Alabama A&M University Department of Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics was recently awarded a grant for its project titled "Investigation of the Effect of Metallic Nanoparticles Plasmonics on Rare-Earth Luminescence."

Individual awards of up to \$800,000 will support research projects in defense priority areas at 50 institutions, including 12 HBCUs and 38 MSIs across 18 states and the District of Columbia.

Principal investigator

Dr. Rami Bommareddi and co-principal investigator Dr. Ashok K. Batra helped secure a \$620,000 award for AAMU out of 80 HBCU proposals.

"We extend heartfelt congratulations to both Dr. Reddy and Dr. Batra on this extraordinary achievement," said Associate Dean and Chairperson Dr. Padmaja Guggilla. "Dr. Reddy has truly emerged as a trailblazer within the Physics Department, and this grant serves as a testament to his outstanding contributions."

The awards are the result of a merit competition administered by the Army Research Office under policy and guidance from the Office of the Under Secretary of Defense for Research and Engineering, with participation from the Office of Naval Research and the Air Force Office of Scientific Research.

"This prestigious grant not only recognizes the exceptional service of our faculty, but it provides valuable opportunities for both graduate and undergraduate students to participate in this groundbreaking research," said Guggilla.

The AAMU project seeks to pave the way for new discoveries and advancement in the field of rare-earth luminescence.



Dr. Joseph Henderson

Coach Joe Henderson was born in Hale County. Alabama. He received his high school education from U.S. Jones High School in Demopolis, Ala. He later earned both the Bachelor of Science degree in history and physical education and the master's degree in counseling and guidance from Alabama State University in Montgomery. Continuing his educational pursuits, Coach Henderson earned his educational specialist degree from Georgia State University in Atlanta, Georgia, in psychological counseling. He received the Doctor of Education degree in human development counseling from George Peabody College at Vanderbilt University, Nashville, Tennessee. He served his country in the U.S. Army as a military policeman for two years, becoming the first African-American to receive "MP of the Month" at Camp Casey, Korea.

In 1975, Coach Henderson entered the ranks of college coaching at Alabama A&M University. His first assigned duties were as an instructor in physical education, ath-



letic counsel, assistant basketball coach and head track coach. He was given one (1) shoe to start his track program. From one shoe at AAMU, Coach Henderson produced seven (7) Olympians, over 100 All Americans, three NCAA Division II Women's Outdoor Championships and one Indoor NCAA Division II Women's Championship. His women's team won 16 consecutive SIAC outdoor track and field championships and 12 consecutive SIAC cross country championships. Some of his most successful athletes were: Grace Jackson Small (Olympic Silver Medalist), Jearl Miles Clark (Olympic Gold Medalist); Dannette Young Stone (Olympic Gold Medal-

AAMU National T&F Champion); and a host of NCAA national champions, All Americans and SIAC champions. His peers voted him Regional (NCAA) Coach of the Year seven (7) or more times and National NCAA Coach of the Year three (3) times. During the early years of his college career Coach Henderson served as commissioner of the Alabama AIAW, which included all of the major colleges and universities in Alabama and athletic director at AAMU from 1977-1979. When he was appointed as athletic director in 1977, the athletic program consisted of four male sports. During his two years and under his supervision, the athletic program grew from four men sports to seven (7) men sports and six (6) women sports. Under his administration, the only national soccer championship was won by Coach Salah Yousif.



State Reps. Hall and Daniels Hold Town Hall Meeting on Redistricting, Updates

Sunset Law, the Alabama Athletic

Alabama State Representatives Anthony Daniels and Laura Hall held a town hall meeting that focused on redistricting as well as provided key legislative updates on the 2023 regular session.

The meeting was held Monday, July 17, at Mae Jemison High School. The following is a listing of the House bills passed during the regular session:

HB217-Anthony Daniels (Madison): Exempts from state income tax any overtime hours for hourly waged workers (overtime hours = hours above 40 per week).

HB289 – Juandalynn Givan (Jefferson): Requires the disclosure or release of recordings made by body-worn cameras or dashboard cameras used by law enforcement agencies, upon request by the subject of the recording or a family member of the subject.


HJR243 – Penni McClammy (Montgomery): Establishes the Joint Study Commission on Grocery Taxation, to complete the full removal of the sales tax on grocery items.

HB13 – Chris England (Tuscaloosa): Authorizes municipal law enforcement officers to issue a summons and complaint in lieu of a custodial arrest for certain nonviolent criminal offenses.
HB133 – Neil Rafferty (Jefferson): Relating to state income tax; to establish the Preceptor Tax Incentive Program to provide income tax credit incentives for certain medical students who train in rural and underserved counties in the state.

HB45 – Jeremy Gray (Lee, Russell): In relation to public K-12 sports; Education for students, parents, and schools about cardiac health and sudden cardiac arrest. Establishes penalties and protections for public K-12 coaches who do not take training for sudden cardiac arrest or who do not follow safety procedures. HB154 – Napoleon Bracy (Mobile): Provides a 2% cost of living wage increase for Alabama state employees.

HB3 – Rolanda Hollis (Jefferson): Bans smoking/vaping in a motor





vehicle when a child under the age of 14 is present.

HB4 – Prince Chestnut (Dallas, Perry): Blocks employers from mandating employees to be microchipped as a mandatory condition of employment. Employers that would require employees to have implanted microchips would be charged with a Class D Felony.

HB247 – Anthony Daniels (Madison): Changes the name of the Innovation Corporation to "Innovate Alabama" and revises the residency requirements for recipients of STTR/SBIR grants (for technology accelerators and underrepresented businesses); reestablishes the technology accelerator tax credit program within Innovate Alabama (was formerly within Department of Commerce). Part of the historic "Game Plan" economic development package.

HB253 – Adline Clarke (Mobile): Renews the Historic Rehabilitation Tax Credit for renovation of historic properties and provides further for criteria for those properties.

HB304 – Neil Rafferty (Jefferson): Authorizes alcoholic beverage sales by food and beverage trucks within established entertainment districts by extending the license to municipalities in all classes.

HB486 – Laura Hall (Madison): Exempts the Alabama Women's Tribute Statue Commission from the public works competitive bid law in cases involving works or statues directly related to Rosa Parks and Helen Keller on the grounds of the Capitol.

HB155 – Laura Hall (Madison): Secured \$169, 633 to be appropriated from the State General Fund to the Coalition Against Domestic Violence for the fiscal year ending on September 30, 2024.

HB55 – Juandalynn Givan (Jefferson): The Department of Health would establish a Certificate of Nonviable Birth to issue to parents, upon request, for certain nonviable births.

HB127 – Pebblin W. Warren (Macon, Lee): Enables funding for the Children's Health Insurance Program and programs for tobacco control among children with the purpose being to reduce the consumption of all tobacco products by children.

HB107 – Juandalynn Givan (Jefferson): Relating to Jefferson County; prohibiting certain forms of street racing and exhibition driving on both public and private property without consent of the property owner.

HB108 – Juandalynn Givan (Jefferson): Relating to Jefferson County; amending section 45-37-30, Code of Alabama 1975, to provide funding of the Jefferson County Cemetery Board as well as making nonsubstantive, technical revisions to update the existing code language to current style.

HB205 - Neil Rafferty (Jeffer-

Sunset Law; to continue the existence and functioning of the Alabama Athlete Agents Commission until October 1, 2027.

HB207 – Neil Rafferty (Jefferson): Relating to the Alabama Sunset Law, the existence and functioning of the Alabama Board of Examiners of Landscape Architects until October 1, 2027.

HB206 - Neil Rafferty (Jeffer-

son): Relating to the Alabama

HB322 – Tashina Morris (Montgomery): Relating to Montgomery County; to further provide for the salary of the members of the Montgomery County Commission.

HB326 – Artis "A.J." McCampbell (Sumter, Marengo, Pickens, Tuscaloosa): Abolishes the office of constable in Marengo County. HB332 – Barbara Boyd (Calhoun, Talladega): Relating to Talladega County: to abolish the

Talladega County; to abolish the office of constable effective at the conclusion of the current term.

HB336 – Rolanda Hollis (Jefferson): Amends Sections 9-14C-2 and 9-14C-8, Code of Alabama 1975, to provide for the Red Mountain Greenway and Recreational Area Commission to be renamed the Jefferson County Greenways Commission.

HB381 – Kelvin Lawrence (Lowndes, Autauga, Montgomery, Wilcox): Amends Section 11-54A-7, Code of Alabama 1975, to further provide for the qualifications for directors of redevelopment authorities.

HB449 – Pebblin W. Warren (Macon, Lee): (not signed by Governor) Establishing Macon County Economic Development Authority.

HB463 – Artis "A.J." McCampbell (Sumter, Marengo, Pickens, Tuscaloosa): Amends manner in which deputies, clerical staff, and jail personnel in Marengo County receive compensation.

HB510 – Artis "A.J." McCampbell (Sumter, Marengo, Pickens, Tuscaloosa): Abolishes the office of the constable in Sumter County.
