Huntsville Gets 'Gig City' Honors in Music City

Fiber Connect 2021, the
Fiber Broadband Associa-
tion (FBA) presented a Gig
City Award to Huntsville
Utilities, the City of Hunts-
ville (*Above: Mayor Tommy
Battle, 2nd, r*), the Huntsville
Madison County Cham-
ber, and The Broadband
Group and Google Fiber at
a conference in Nashville.
The FBA recognized these
groups for their outstanding
collaborative initiative that
leveraged fiber to increase
connectivity across com-
munities in Huntsville and
improve economic develop-
ment and quality of life.

Huntsville has a history
that is deeply rooted in inno-
vation. The town supported
the launch of the Space Race
with the establishment of
NASA, the Marshall Space
Flight Center and the U.S.

Space & Rocket Center. The
area also features Cum-
mings Research Park, the
second largest research
park in the nation, which
is home to world-class Ge-
nome research and a global
epicenter for cyber security.
Huntsville is devoted to
science and technology,
and ensuring its businesses
and residents have access to
high-performance internet
connectivity is an important
city objective.

Recognizing the need for
additional fiber infrastruc-
ture for its own internal
communication and op-
erational needs, Huntsville
Utilities took matters into its
own hands. Working with
The Broadband Group, a
leading telecommunications
consulting and business
advisory firm, Huntsville

Utilities pioneered a Util-
ity Lease Model where the
utility aligns interests with
private industry to expand
fiber citywide. As electric
utilities adopt grid mod-
ernization initiatives, this
Lease Model enables them to
build or expand fiber optic
networks and include excess
fiber capacity to be used by
third party tenants, like ISPs
or 4G/5G mobile operators.
For Huntsville Utilities' fiber
network, Google Fiber was
the first tenant to deploy
multigigabit broadband
services to residential and
small business customers in
Huntsville and surround-
ing areas. Huntsville ranked
12th for the fastest internet
speeds in the nation, ac-
cording to an analysis by
HighSpeedInternet.com.

Washington in One Minute



Here are the happenings in Washington, D.C., this week:

1. **ON THE FLOOR.** The House has adjourned for the August recess and has no votes scheduled on the House floor until September 20 (although House committees will start meeting again on August 31). The Senate is in session this week and will continue work on the \$1 trillion Bipartisan Infrastructure legislation (the final text of which was released on Sunday as the "Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act"), which it hopes to finish before the Senate adjourns at the end of the week. See a summary of the infrastructure bill here: summary. Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-NY) would also like to take up the \$3.5 trillion reconciliation bill

containing the President's American Families Plan, which includes universal pre-K, paid family and medical leave, nutrition assistance, extensions of child tax-credit expansions, clean-energy tax incentives, federal procurement of clean energy technologies, a clean-energy accelerator, and the establishment of a Civilian Climate Corps.

2. **THE WHITE HOUSE.** Last Friday, President Biden met virtually with Governors from 7 Western States: Govs. Max Gordon (WY), Kate Brown (OR), Greg Gianforte (MT), Jay Inslee (WA), Brad Little (ID), Gavin Newsom (CA) and Tim Walz (MN) to discuss the wildfires. The White House also announced 2 new working groups within the National Climate Task Force — the Wildfire Resil-

ience Interagency Working Group and the Extreme Heat Interagency Working Group. Last Monday, White House Press Secretary Jen Psaki announced that the U.S. ban on travelers from Europe would remain in place indefinitely, citing concerns about the Delta variant (in mid-June, the EU added the U.S. to its "green list," permitting arrivals of even unvaccinated travelers).

3. **VACCINE REQUIREMENTS.** Last Thursday, President Biden announced the following regarding the COVID vaccine: all federal government employees and onsite contractors will be required to get a vaccine or comply with a weekly or twice weekly screening testing requirement and be subject to restrictions on official travel; the Defense Department is instructed to start the process to add COVID-19 vaccination to the list of required vaccinations for members of the military; school districts nationwide should host at least one pop-up vaccination clinic over the coming weeks for all kids over 12 years of age; all small- and medium-sized businesses will now be reimbursed for offering their employees paid leave to get

their family members, including their kids, vaccinated (since April, the employees had the right to take leave to get their own vaccinations); and states, territories, and local governments should offer \$100 to those who get vaccinated using funds distributed to them from the American Rescue Plan.

4. **PPP LOAN FORGIVENESS.** Last Wednesday, the Small Business Administration (SBA) published a new regulation allowing small business owners who received PPP loans of \$150,000 or less to seek forgiveness of those loans by applying directly to the SBA (instead of going back to their banks) via an online portal that will go live on August 4. The PPP loan program disbursed \$806 billion to millions of businesses between April 2020 and June 2021. For access to the new portal, click here: SBA forgiveness portal.

5. FY2022 APPROPRIA-

TIONS. This week, the Senate Appropriations Committee will begin markups of its versions of the FY2022 appropriations bills, starting with the Energy & Water, Military Construction/VA, and Agriculture Appropriations bills. Last week, the full House approved 9 of the 12 annual appropriations bills on the House floor before adjourning for the August recess.

6. **HIGHER EDUCATION.** On Monday, the Bipartisan Policy Center hosted a virtual discussion on "How to Sustainably Finance Higher Education and Promote College Affordability."


Have you ever come to a place in your life where you say to yourself, "This is not working anymore and it's time for me to make a change"--just like we find here with the Prodigal Son.

Whenever we decide to go back home, God will be filled with



Revisiting Toni Morrison and Her 10-word Tutoring Session!

Read Habakkuk 2:2,3

Arguably, I'm able and enjoy sharing with you what God places weekly on my heart - i.e., articles that overlap Bible best-practices with current events and newsmakers - because of an unexpected, un-scripted personal tutoring session from Ms. Toni Morrison (1931 - August 5, 2019), from the early 1980's.

My "Lady of the Eighties"

Soon after publishing her 1981 novel *Tar Baby*, Ms. Morrison came to lecture at then-Hampton Institute (now University), my alma mater where I then served as assistant PR director.

Then and there, this former English major had the dual pinch-myself luxury of arranging and hosting her series of pre-lecture media interviews. In a break between two such interviews and before this twenty-something ego-holic had been "self-diagnosed" in his self-addiction, I opined to her my dis-belief in the necessary bother of re-writing article drafts, professing instead a one-and-done posture.



Her 10 Words Changed My World

With a look akin to a loving mother seeking to aright a wayward self-righteous son, the future Nobel Literaturist and Pulitzer Prize writer offered, "tim: you've gotta do the re-writes, . . . you just have to."

Those 10 words spoken with loving care and expertise began to change me, both attitudinally and functionally.

"Then the Lord answered me and said: 'Write the vision and make it plain on tablets, That he may run who reads it. For the vision is yet for an appointed time; but at the end it will speak, and it will not lie'" Habakkuk 2:2,3.

Then, 10 Years Later, . . .

Ten years later, when I became an adjunct instructor for freshman (English) composition courses at HU, I "Morrison-ized" my students on the importance of the re-drafting - why? - because Toni Morrison tutored me gently with just one simple un-scripted 10-word sentence of advice.

My sincere hope and prayer is that you are a beneficiary of the "Toni touch" on my writings and, more importantly, my life.

You Can Have What You Want

Psalm 106:13-15

This is a favorite saying of those who claim that God is under pressure to give to those who belong to Him, everything that they want when the right kind of faith is exhibited; that usually being some predetermined amount of what is called a 'seed offering'

to the ministry of the one making the claim.

The writer of Psalm 106 would beg to differ, however. He also issued a cautionary caveat to this matter of having what you want.

In reference to Israel's time in the wilderness, the Psalmist made mention of the trait that still exists in

the hearts of God's people; that is, forgetting the previous works of God and not seeking Him on a consistent basis.

This leads to an insatiable desire and cravings for that which only temporarily satisfies and an

They soon forgot his works;
they waited not for his
counsel. - Psalm 106:13 KJV

insistence on having what one wants. The Psalmist noted that God gave them their request, but sent leanness into their souls, or as one translation put it, but their souls starved away to nothing.

That is the part that the

health and wealth proclaimers do not tell us. The whole truth is you can have what you want, but the soul suffers.

This is not God being petty, this is God being proactive and preventive.

This is His love and wis-

dom doing what He does best, taking care of His own. Don't fall for partial proclamations.

Seek rather God's whole counsel, then the soul will prosper.


Jackson was employed as a longshoreman for over 30 years, and he served as a foreman and union representative for ILA, Local 3000.



But a total stranger sat down next to me and inspired me to take a path in life down which very few people travel. From that moment, I began writing a new chapter in my life. And that has made all the difference." His previous school performance landed Manny at the back of Erin Gruwell's English class—a group now known worldwide as the original Freedom Writers and portrayed in the movie

starring Hilary Swank. The former dropout now holds degrees from the University of California at Berkeley and Trinity International University. He is working on his doctorate in Chicago.

His appearances have energized members of the Department of Education, the National Education Association, and hundreds
