J.F. Drake State Rolls Out Strategic Plan

J.F. Drake State Community and Technical College rolled out of its strategic plan as well as plans to solicit community input. Faculty, staff and administrators have concentrated their efforts in recent weeks on the development of strategic initiatives to provide direction for the future of the college.

Christopher A. Lewis, interim president, presented the strategic plan on Tuesday, August 15. Drake State opened its doors to the public to collect insight and feedback on the institution's strategic plan. The new strategy, called "Initiative 2021" focuses on returning enrollment to 1,400 by 2021. The strategic plan establishes a clear framework for performance improvement that emphasizes student suc-

cess, workforce development, and evidence-based program development and evaluation.

Specific goals include: Institutional Goal 1: Provide administrative, academic, and student support to assist students in achieving their personal, academic, and career goals. Institutional Goal 2: Offer programs of study with integrated general studies that will assist students in developing the knowledge, training, work skills and ethics necessary to become productive, contributing members of society.

Institutional Goal 3: Create atmosphere conducive to learn-

ing by providing competent staff, up-to-date equipment, state- of- the- art technology, and adequate physical facilities. Institutional Goal 4: Provide adult education and workforce development to prepare students for gainful employment in business, industry, and service.

Washington in a Minute



Here are the top issues in Washington, D.C., this week:

- 1. The House and Senate are in recess until September 5.
- 2. On Monday, President Trump signed a memorandum determining whether China should be investigated for intellectual property violations. He then travelled to New York City, where he stayed until Wednesday before returning to his golf resort in Bedminster, N.J., for the rest of the week.

3. On Saturday, Attorney

- General Jeff Sessions called for a federal investigation into the violent weekend in Charlottesville, Va., caused by the clash of protesters over the removal of a Robert E. Lee statue. The investigation will be led by U.S. Attorney Rick Mountcastle and the Richmond field office of the FBI. A 32-yearold woman was killed and as many as 19 others were injured when a car plowed into a crowd of counter protestors. Two state troopers were killed in a related accident when their helicopter crashed.
- 4. Last week, the House Rules Committee posted a message telling Members of the House to get their appropriations amendments ready for the 8 remaining FY2018 appropriations bills

(the House passed a package of 4 appropriations bills in July). The official notice does not set an amendment deadline other than saying it will be before the end of the recess - but it has been reported that it will be August 25. The House intends to put the 8-appropriations bill package on the House floor on the first week of September. To date, none of the 12 annual appropriations bills funding the operation of the federal government has been signed into law (the deadline is October 1). The Politico

website reported last week that White House Director of Legislative Affairs Marc Short met with top GOP and Dem staffers on the Senate Appropriations

Committee offering to agree to lift the defense and non-defense spending caps in

exchange for funding the Mexican border wall – in an effort to forestall a government shutdown at the end of the month.

5. A group of immigration law teachers and scholars are urging President Trump to keep the Obama administration's program that protects from deportation immigrants who were illegally brought to the country at a young age. In a new letter, more than 100 law professors outline a legal case for keeping the De-

ferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program, known as DACA. The legal scholars argue in the five-page letter that the legal foundation for DACA is "crystal clear." University of California president Janet Napolitano, who helped set up DACA when she was Obama's secretary of Homeland Security, published an op-ed on Friday in The Washington Post urging Trump to keep the program - and for Congress to step in with a legislative solution.

6. On Tuesday, Alabama holds a special GOP primary for the remainder of AG Jeff Sessions' Senate term, currently occupied by Sen. Luther Strange (R-AL) who has 8 opponents in the primary. Last week, President Trump endorsed Sen. Strange, who the latest poll has running in 2nd place after former Alabama Chief Justice Roy Moore (who was suspended from the court last year for instructing probate judges to deny marriage licenses to gay couples). Unless a candidate secures more than 50% of the vote,

the top two vote-getters will face-off in a Sept. 26 contest. The final round of voting is scheduled for Dec. 12, when the Republican nominee will face the Democratic nominee.

Father, father, We don't need to escalate, You see, war is not the answer, For only love can conquer hate, You know we've got to find a way, To bring some lovin' here today, Picket lines and picket signs, Don't punish me with brutality, Talk to me, so you can see, Oh, what's going on?" It is time for us to stop and take a good look at who we are as Americans. It is terribly distressing that we don't really care how we treat each. Our elders used to say, "The more things change, the more they remain the same." It's a sad day in our country and around the world when all we know how to do is shout at each, call names and spew hatred and bigotry, regardless of the source. 

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
