State Officials Fund Outdoor Lighting at Drake State

Drake State Community & Technical College will soon have a new outdoor LED lighting system, thanks to a \$27,628 donation through the efforts of state Sen. Sam Givhan, R-Huntsville and Rep. Laura Hall, D-Huntsville.

"A well-designed LED lighting system can provide both safety and financial benefits for the campus, and a student's experience cannot be successful without safety," said Bruce Bulluck, Drake State director of operations.

LED, or light emitting

diode, is a lighting technology which is more energy efficient and less expensive to operate and maintain than conventional lights. LED lights also appear brighter and distribute light more evenly. These characteristics make LED lights the perfect choice for college campuses.

The donation came from Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) funds made available to state legislators to spend at their discretion.

Washington in One Minute



Here are the happenings in Washington, D.C.:

1. The Senate is in recess. As of Sunday night, House Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-CA) had decided to call members back to Washington later in the week to vote on a bill to prohibit the U.S. Postal Service from implementing any changes to operations or level of service it had in place on Jan. 1, 2020. The Speaker is also calling on House Democrats to hold press events on Tuesday at post offices in their districts to call attention to reported

changes that have prompted slower mail deliveries and may endanger the timely delivery of mail-in ballots in time to be counted for the November election.

2. President Trump traveled to Mankato, Minn., and Oshkosh, Wis., Monday for 2 quick campaign rally stops at each city's airport. On Tuesday, he traveled to Yuma, Ariz., for another campaign rally at the airport. On Thursday, he met with new Iraqi Prime Minister Mustafa al-Kadhimi at the White House and then traveled

to Old Forge, Pa., for a rally (near Joe Biden's hometown of Scranton). According to The Wall Street Journal, President Trump will be featured each day of the Republican National Convention on Aug. 24-27, a departure from previous nominating events when the candidate was only showcased on the final night. The newspaper also reported that the President will accept the nomination during a prime-time speech on Aug. 27 scheduled to be delivered from the White House.

3. On Saturday, CBS News reported that the U.S. Postal Service Inspector General (IG) has launched an investigation into recent staffing and policy changes, including limiting worker overtime pay, put in place by Postmaster General Louis DeJoy and to review DeJoy's conflicts of interest (it has been reported that DeJoy still owns at least a \$30 million equity stake in his former company that is also a USPS contractor). The IG received a letter on Friday requesting the

review signed by Sen. Elizabeth Warren and 8 other key House and Senate Democrats. In related news, on Sunday House Oversight and Reform Committee Chair Carolyn Maloney (D-NY) invited DeJoy to testify at a hearing at 10 a.m. on Aug. 24.

4. Monday was the start of the virtual Democratic National Convention, which ran through Thursday night (Aug. 20). Primetime speeches were scheduled from 9-11 p.m. (EDT) each night. For the full schedule, go to: DNC schedule. Some highlights were: Monday - Michelle Obama, Bernie Sanders; Tuesday - Bill Clinton, Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez; Wednesday - Kamala Harris, Barack Obama; and Thursday - Pete Buttigieg and Joe Biden's acceptance speech broadcast from the Chase Center in Wilmington, Del. The New York Times reported that Joe Biden raised \$50 million in the 48 hours after choosing Sen. Harris to be his running mate on Tuesday.

5. Last Friday, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) announced a new deadline for Americans who missed the April and May deadlines to request the \$500 stimulus payment for each dependent child under 17 as part of the CARES Act. The new period to request the payment runs from Aug. 15 through Sept. 30, 2020, and may be accomplished via the IRS' online portal for people who didn't file a tax return for 2018 or 2019. For more information, go here: IRS.

6. Last Friday, Congress' investigative agency, the General Accounting Office (GAO), found that Acting Homeland Security Secretary Chad Wolf and his top deputy Ken Cuccinelli do not have a legal basis to hold their jobs, because the previous Acting Secretary, then-Customs and Border Protection Commissioner Kevin McAleenan, was himself installed without a legal basis — and therefore his decisions to appoint Wolf and Cuccinelli to their respec-

tive posts were also invalid. The GAO investigation was prompted by an inquiry from House Homeland Security Chair Bennie Thompson (D-MS) and House Committee on Oversight and Reform Chair Carolyn Maloney (D-NY) and can be read here: GAO letter.

7. Last Friday, The Cook Political Report changed the ratings of 15 House races, with 11 shifting toward the Democrats and 4 toward Republicans, including the GOP's open GA-07 seat going from toss-up to "Lean D," the GOP's NJ-02 seat going from "Lean R" to toss-up, and the Democrats' UT-02 seat going from "Lean D" to toss-up.

The Biden-Harris "Relay Race": When a Veteran #2 knights a new #2!

"I am one hundred and twenty years old today. I can no longer go out and come in.' . . . Then Moses called Joshua and said to him in the sight of all Israel, "Be strong and of good courage, . . ." - Deuteronomy 31:1, 2 and 7a.

Here, Moses presents his successor, admonishing him publicly to be strong and courageous.

On Wednesday, August 12, 2020, Joe Biden presented similarly his history-making running mate Sen. Kamala Harris, saying publicly, "She's smart, she's tough, she's experienced, she's a proven fighter."

"Kamala the First"

When Biden named Harris 24 hours earlier, many changed her last name symbolically to "The First," as in "Kamala the First":

1. The first woman of color . . .
2. The first of Asian American descent . . .
3. The first of Caribbean descent . . .
4. The first Black Greek (Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority) member . . .
5. The first HBCU (Howard University) alum . . .

A Step Back = A Come Back?

As silver-mettle leaders (leaders from the middle), this Biden-Harris ticket represents another first: the first time two previous White House aspirants stepped back, assumed #2 positions, and now stand poised to receive politician's Holy Grail: the White House in incremental steps, potentially - Biden in 2020, and Kamala the First in 2024.



A Racial Slight = An Historic Flight?

In 2008, Sen. Joe Biden dropped out of the Democratic presidential primaries, having once made what some considered to be a racially stereotyped remark on Barack Obama, only later to have been chosen to be his successful running mate.

Similarly in 2019, Sen. Kamala Harris dropped out of the Dems' presidential primaries months after having confronted Biden with a challenge to his racial bona fide, and was later selected as his running mate.

Many see Biden at age 77 (the oldest president, if elected on Nov. 3) as a potential one-termer, with Harris the First well positioned for 2024.

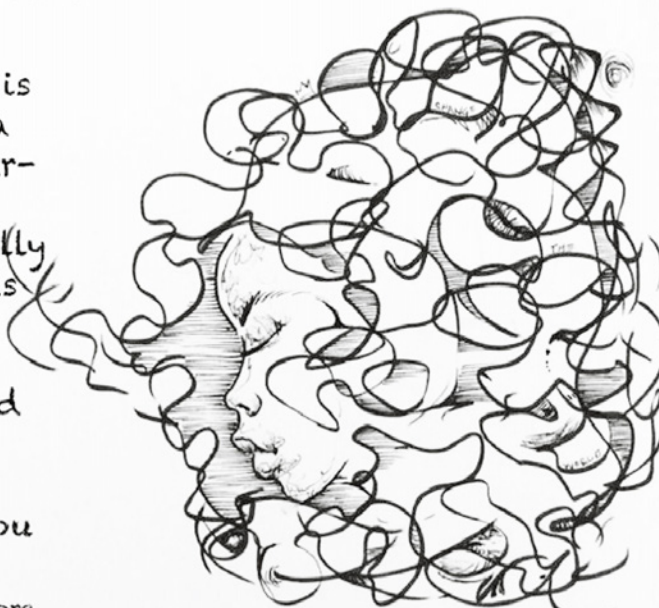
