



#### Microsoft CEO Satya Nadella: The Accidental "Recovering Ego-holic"

"Search me, God, and know my heart; test me and know my anxious thoughts. See if there is any offensive way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting." - Psalm 139:23–24

According to Inc.com's article, "Why Self-Awareness Is Crucial to Effective Leadership," When Satya Nadella took over as Microsoft's CEO in 2014, the company wasn't in freefall — but it was stale. Competitors were out-innovating them. Morale was sagging.

Many CEOs in that moment would have started with strategy: cut costs, restructure teams, launch new products. Nadella started somewhere most leaders never think to look... in the mirror.

He didn't ask, 'What's wrong with the company?' He asked, 'What's wrong with me?' He realized that to transform Microsoft, he first had to transform how *he* related to himself — and how his leaders related to each other.

Self-awareness isn't just a

personal virtue.

It's your most practical

leadership tool. It's what

something's off before it

#### Leaders: Go to the T.O.P.

And that is exactly where "The Tim Commandments" **T-O-P model** begins: **T — Target the Problem:** Nadella identified himself as the first point of change. Not the market, not the org chart — himself.

O — Own the Problem: He admitted his blind spots. He invited his leadership team to do the same, not just in business metrics, but in how they 'showed up' emotionally and relationally.

 P — Proceed to Action: Instead of lip service, he embedded self-awareness into Microsoft's leadership culture, making

emotional intelligence as important as technical expertise.

In other words, Nadella didn't just lead at Microsoft. He led *within* Microsoft. You may not run a global tech company. But if you lead *anything* — a team, a project, a family — you have a choice:

Keep leading on autopilot until the warning lights become crises. Or stop, notice, and respond when your leadership dashboard says something's 'off.'

Nadella proved that when you prioritize **who** over **what**, the **what** takes care of itself. Microsoft's valuation more than tripled under his leadership — and the culture became more collaborative, innovative, and resilient.

#### The Ultimate Mirror Moment?

Before we can lead others well, we must let God lead us — starting from the inside out. So, here's your challenge for this week: Where in your leadership are you feeling 'off'? Will you ignore it until it becomes a crisis, or will you Target it, **O**wn it, and **P**roceed before it grows?

Because the first step to transforming your organization... is transforming yourself.



## Mrs. Marie Ann Cothron

Marie Ann Waters-Cothron was born on January 1, 1951, New Year's Day, in Lloyd Noland Hospital located in Fairfield, Alabama, the oldest of three children born to Percy Lee and Willie Jewel Waters. As the oldest child, she set the proper example for her siblings in order to make her parents proud. She grew up in the small steel manufacturing town of Westfield, Alabama, where she attended elementary school. Eventually, all the families in the town had to move to other places because the steel plant expanded. Therefore, her family moved to Ensley, Alabama, where she attended Councill Elementary through the eighth grade.

From 1965-1969, she attended Western-Olin High School, now known as Jackson-Olin High School, where she was placed in the accelerated class because of her good grades. She remains thankful for teachers who challenged her academically. She will never forget the physical education teacher who taught her about better nutrition. Gradually, while doing all the exercises in her class and being more selective in what she ate, Marie began to lose weight. By the time she was a senior, she had lost fifty pounds, and her self esteem increased tremendously. Consequently, when she graduated, she was ranked number five out of 195 students, according to grade point averages.

She pursued further education by attending the University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa, Alabama, along with five other students from her graduating class. When she arrived, she was in awe of the huge campus. During freshman orientation, she scored in the 90 percent range in Spanish on her placement exam, so she decided to declare it as her major. As a result of hard work, she was inducted into the Spanish Honor Society and received the Instituto Cultural Diploma De Honor from the Spanish government in Madrid, Spain, in 1972. She received the Bachelor of Arts degree in Spanish with a minor in English in 1973. She later continued her studies and received the Master of Arts degree in 1981. Naturally, she is a huge Crimson Tide fan. ROLL TIDE!

Her first job was at Scottsboro High School as a Spanish teacher from 1971-1978. While in Scottsboro, she married Allen Ben Cothron on July 27, 1974, and later they were blessed with two wonderful sons, Anthony and Ashley Bryan. They then decided to move to Huntsville, Alabama, where she proceeded to her next job at J.O. Johnson High School from 1974-2011. At Johnson, she taught Spanish and one year of English, as well. She served as co-sponsor of the Spanish Club and the Spanish National Honor Society and was the Foreign Language Chairperson for two



years. On several occasions, she also received awards such as Teacher of the Month, Ninth Grade Academy Teacher of the Year, ROTC Teacher of the Year, The Friendliest Teacher, and The Master Teacher Apple Award. Working at Johnson was so special to her. There was a comradery that is difficult to find in many places, and she was thankful to be a part of it. During the 33 years at Johnson High, she also worked in the Alabama A&M University Upward Bound federal program on Saturdays and in the summer for 20 years. One additional teaching job was at Redstone Arsenal in the Department of the Army's educational program for one year. She is a member of the Blue Spring Road Church of Christ, where she actively participates in serving the Lord.

She has been blessed to travel to Paris, London, various parts of Mexico, Jamaica, Belize, the Bahamas, the Cayman Islands, Honduras, and many parts of the United States.

Justice Mukaro is leading the charge to make artificial intelligence work for Africa. The Zimbabwean entrepreneur is the founder of Strateji, a company building Afrocentric datasets to train AI systems that reflect the continent's needs and values. This summer, he is participating in AAMU's

inaugural Leadership in Business Institute, part of the Mandela Washington Fellowship for Young African Leaders – a U.S. State Department program for rising African business leaders.

"The world is fast adopting Artificial Intelligence across all



industries," says Mukaro.
"Africa, on the other hand, is merely importing AI from other continents. Yet an AI is only as intelligent as the datasets upon which it was trained. At Strateji, our mission is to build African datasets and train AI that exists to serve our people and invent a better

African future."

For the past two years, Mukaro has led Strateji as its founder, overseeing innovation and mobilizing resources to bring the company's vision to life.

He holds a Bachelor of Science in Computer Science from the Bindura University of Science Education in Zimbabwe, as well as certifications in Data Analytics and Business Intelligence from Google. Before launching Strateji, he worked as a data annotator at Talent Africa in Zimbabwe.





## Impact of Simply Implementing a "Salt" Mandate

If the government greatly **reduced** salt and other additives in processed foods through regulation, it could have significant long-term effects on public health and healthcare costs. Here's how:

### 1. Reduction in Chronic Diseases

Lower Hypertension Rates:

Excess salt is a major contributor to high blood pressure (hypertension), which affects about half of U.S. adults.

Cutting sodium intake could lead to fewer cases of stroke, heart attack, and kidney disease.

Fewer Cardiovascular Diseases (CVD):

Lower salt and fewer artificial additives could reduce risks of heart disease, which is the leading cause of death in the U.S.

Better Metabolic Health:



Additives like high fructose corn syrup and preservatives are linked to obesity and diabetes.

Cutting these could reduce Type 2 diabetes rates, leading to lower insulin dependence and fewer hospitalizations.

### 2. Decreased Healthcare Costs

Fewer chronic conditions would reduce hospital visits, prescription drug use, and long-term medical expenses.

The CDC estimates that 90% of U.S. health-care spending goes toward

chronic diseases many of which are linked to diet.

Reducing sodium alone could save billions annually by preventing strokes and heart attacks.

## 3. Shift in Food Industry and Consumer Behavior

Processed food manufacturers would need to

reformulate products, which could lead to higher costs at first but healthier options long-term.

People might gradually adjust to lower salt levels, reducing dependency on high-sodium foods.

Increased demand for whole foods and fresh produce could push more people toward healthier eating habits.

#### 4. Potential Downsides

Consumer Resistance: Some might object to

government intervention in food choices.

Taste Adjustments: Salt and additives enhance flavor and shelf life, so food reformulations could take time to be widely accepted.

Initial Business Pushback: The food industry might resist major changes, requiring strong public health advocacy.
