Here is what's happening in Washington, D.C., the nation's capital, this week:

1. CONGRESS. The House and Senate are in recess until September 5 (Senate) and September 12 (House).

2. THE WHITE HOUSE. On Monday, President Biden took a break from his week-long vacation in Lake Tahoe to travel to Maui to tour the recent fire destruction there. He will remain in Lake Tahoe until Saturday.

3. FIRST GOP DEBATE. According to fivethirtyeight.com, as of last Friday, August 18, five (5) GOP presidential candidates (DeSantis, Ramaswamy, Haley, Scott & Burgum) had fully qualified for the first GOP presidential debate that was scheduled to be held on Wednesday, August 23, at 9 p.m. EDT in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, which means they have met the polling (at least 1% in 3 nat'l polls), donor (40,000 donors with at least 200 in 20 states), and RNC pledge (to support the eventual GOP candidate) requirements.

Reportedly, former President Trump has decided to skip the debate and will instead sit for an interview with former FoxNews personality

Tucker Carlson. Pence and Christie have met the donor and polling requirements but have not yet signed the pledge.

In related news, Mr. Trump and his 18 codefendants are expected to surrender to local officials at the Fulton County jail in Atlanta, Georgia, by Friday to be arraigned per the 100page indictment issued last week for their efforts to overturn the 2020 election.

4. HIGHER EDU-CATION. The Senate Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions (HELP) Committee has announced that it has delayed plans to vote on bipartisan legislation to expand Pell Grants to short-term programs, but future consideration is unclear given other urgent priorities waiting for Congress after the August recess.

The Jumpstart Our Businesses by Supporting Students (JOBS Act of 2023 - S. 161), introduced by Sens. Tim

Kaine (D-VA) and Mike Braun (R-IN), would allow students to use Pell Grants to cover the costs of eligible job training programs at community or technical colleges — but not for-profit institutions — that are as short as eight weeks long, versus the current 15-week minimum. The JOBS, Act would add language to section 401 of the Higher Education Act of 1965 requiring the Education Department to establish a program to award federal Pell Grants to students in eligible job training programs (Secs. 1-2). There are laws put into place, we know this, rules to follow, but you can choose to follow them. YOU alone control your actions and responses. You're accountable. You cannot blame anyone else.


So, do what's right!

COVID-19's Re-rise: God's Dress Rehearsal? "Be ye also ready, for in such an hour as ye think not, the Son of Man cometh." -Matthew 24:44

COVID-19, our uninvited guest, is returning both stateand nation-wide, https://bit.ly/45fJEbS. So, let's now be better prepared for this 2023 "dress rehearsal" from God.

In both 2017 and 2019, Trump officials practiced but disregarded earlier pandemic dress rehearsals, https:// nyti.ms/3OEFLpR. As a result, they seemed baffled by the 2020-2021 pandemic and thereby chose to "blame-game" others to mask their lack of preparation.

Since then, the Biden administration has produced 230 million fully-vaccinated Americans - 70% of the population - and 270 million (81%) with just one dose.

If these instances mirror our knowledge of similar endtime warnings in the Bible's Book of Revelation, then thank a loving God for allowing us this dress rehearsal.

CHARACTERISTICS OF A DRESS REHEARSAL

Dress rehearsals feature a completely costumed and staged trial performance or practice exercise for an upcoming three-act presentation.

THEREFORE, WHAT THREE ACTS MUST WE FOLLOW?

1. Script-reading is over, as Bible will soon be outlawed; therefore, all lines must be memorized verbatim - no ad libs, as in "... leaning to your own understanding," (Proverbs 3:5a)

2. The main character Jesus is located in each of the 31,102 Bible-script verses. Find, study, and share him liberally; and



3. Appreciate and

maximize this final act's most effective tool, the "pregnant pause": a presenter's preceding words - accentuated by inserting a timed silence - to build up suspense for what is to come.

In his Celebration of Discipline, author Richard Foster wrote, "In contemporary society, our Adversary majors in three things: noise, hurry, and crowds. If he can keep us engaged in 'muchness' and 'manyness,' he will rest satisfied."

Ironically, that 2020 coronavirus pandemic produced quieter public places, slowed-down lifestyles, and outlawed crowds.

Therefore, we need to avail ourselves of a possible returning pregnant pause to re-connect with our households, cherish this downtime and affirm the increased alone Godtime - before the curtain rises for earth's final act.

Students and families are choosing Alabama A&M in record numbers because of that commitment and the return on investment realized by those who come from The Hill."

Freshmen were welcomed to campus at Saturday's Convocation and Torch Lighting Ceremony featuring keynote speaker Eboni Major. As classes began Thursday, Director of Admissions Dwavne Green said the arrival of the largest class in AAMU history was the realization of intentional work to recruit students far and near.



"For some time, we have used the mantra Start Here, Go Anywhere," said Green. "We have witnessed a cohort of students from diverse backgrounds who have heard that message loud and clear. They believe in the promise that our University can prepare them for life, and we're going to keep that promise to them through graduation day in 2027."

Earlier this year, AAMU received a record number (15,000) of applications, reflecting a 30 percent increase compared to the previous

recruitment cycle. The University also saw an uptick in transfer applications (up 16 percent).

"This moment of history is just a starting point," said Vice President of Student Affairs Braque Talley. "Our admissions staff, alumni, and entire University community have rallied behind this accomplishment. That's added motivation for our entire team to go out and make history again." 


