Rev. Rice faithfully churned out his column, providing thought-provoking messages and advice

for living a life of morality and purpose. There was no doubt that he took his ministry seriously and fully executed it to the fullest of his capabilities.

For several years, Rev. Rice served as the pastor at Grace Gethsemane Mission Church in Madison, Ala.

A native of Monroeville, Ala., Pastor Rice moved to Huntsville in 1972 with his family after he graduated from high school to attend and later graduate from



Alabama A&M University in 1977.

His father, W.A. Rice, retired from AAMU after serving in the Alabama Cooperative Extension unit as an administrator. His mother, Lillie Rice, was a retired educator with

Huntsville City Schools.

Rev. Rice was a band director in both south Alabama and the Huntsville City School systems.

More recently, he diligently served as an adjunct instructor at Alabama A&M and as founder and pastor of Grace Gethsemane Mission Church.

Rev. Rice's books include a devotional and a book primarily for males: Men, It's Your Call. He possessed a passion for helping men to find their God-given purpose and for being proactive in helping young boys find their way before being tainted by or caught up in "the system."

Gospel Concert Celebrates Anniversary of Second Chance Ministries

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



November's Mid-term "Olympics": A Congressional Sprint vs. a Senate Marathon?

"Dollar Tree" Wisdom

Recently, I visited Dollar Tree to purchase AA batteries. When I saw displayed AA four-packs upfront, I was about to grab three and head for the checkout. With a little more searching,



however, I discovered two almost-hidden AA six-packs.

I replaced the three four-packs with the two six-packs, giving me the same 12 batteries for \$1.25 less.

With a little more diligence, I saved both some grocery monies and learned a "Dollar Tree" object lesson concerning this November's congressional and senatorial midterm elections:

Our quicker voter "sprint" grab would be just a U.S. House of Representatives four-pack (featuring two-year congressional seats).

But the better voter "marathon" value is the U.S. Senate six-pack (affording six-year Senate chairs).

A new or re-elected six-year Senate term = three congressional seat stays.

Do the Math!

Most of our attention is riveted on 2024's quadrennial presidential "beauty contest" sprint; however,

smarter strategists recommend investing in the sexennial U.S. Senate marathons.

Although the American majority was pleased electing its 1st Black president (sprint), the GOP-controlled Senate thwarted Barack Obama's 2nd-term initiatives for key legislation and longer-term judicial appointments (marathon).

While a "yes-and" strategy (White House-Senate majority) may be ideal, if forced to choose, an "either-or" Senate marathon run is better political wisdom.

In the above Bible passage, Jesus counseled listeners both to complete what they'd started but also to do so for the long haul.

So yes, learn to sprint but master completing the marathons!



The subsequent tests became God's way of



directing and redirecting a heart that had been searching for answers. Speaking

of the heart, it was during my echocardiogram that I learned that if bacteria get attached to the valves of the heart, they can be gravely dangerous. Thankfully, they had not.

The Spirit reminded me that the same can happen in the spiritual realm with 'spiritual bacteria,' such as pride, offense, unforgiveness, doubt, fear and the like. These could dangerously affect my intimacy with God. God's word is called a mirror. For me, it was now my echocardiogram.



God also taught and retaught me about servant-hood. He allowed me to be served by a team of nurses that served so unassumingly and joyfully that what I experienced was almost surreal.

One of them said to me, "Thank you for allowing me to serve you today." Really?

Who says that but a true servant? The Spirit used that statement to humble me and remind me of my

own attitude about serving in my household and my ministry. Thank God for those 'five days in room 745'--my green pastures, where He MADE me to lie

When Gladys L. Branch received her diploma as a Top 20 student at Birmingham's Hooper City High School in 1964, she knew that there were still plenty of opportunities during a turbulent time in America during the 1960s. She entered historic Alabama A&M University, where she received the Bachelor of Science degree in mathematics and general science in 1968. She returned to obtain her Master of Science degree in guidance and counseling in 1974.

Over the years, Mrs. Branch has developed an impressive career that has spanned more than 40 years. For some five years, beginning in 1969, Branch was an elementary and middle school teacher for the Athens (Ala.) City School System, where she prepared and carried out lesson plans for second graders and later for math and science students at the middle school level.

In 1974, she served one year as a counselor for the Huntsville Sickle Cell Center before returning for a final year of mathematics, teaching at Westlawn Middle School. She remained at Westlawn for an additional 20 years as a general counselor and then as a vocational counselor until 1996.

In August 1996, Branch decided to use Westlawn as a base for a position in administration and served as Westlawn's assistant principal for four years.

She was acting principal for a year at McDonnell Elementary School before culminating her career as principal of Rolling Hills Elementary School.
Branch has been affiliated with Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., for over 50 years and is a past president of the Huntsville Alumnae Chapter.

Currently, she serves as the co-chair of the Protocol Committee for Huntsville Alumnae and is a member of the State Protocol Committee. She is also president of the Association of Ladies for Agape of North Alabama; member and past secretary, Madison County Retired



Educators Association; member, Northwest Church of Christ, where her husband serves as the Pulpit Minister; and she works on various committees and teaches ladies and children Bible classes. Moreover, the retired educator also serves as vice chair of the board of Diverse Educational Life Training Activities, Inc. (DELTA, Inc.).

Mrs. Branch and her husband, Elder John Branch, have two children and three grandchildren, along with another couple of adopted children, who also have three children of their own.

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USDA Supports AAMU Efforts to Assist Small Farmers

Alabama A&M University's decades-old endeavor to provide key knowledge and adequate resources to small-scale farmers just received another boost from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Risk Management Agency.

AAMU's Small Farms
Research Center, ably administered by Dr. Duncan
M. Chembezi (PI) and
E'licia Chaverest (Co-PI),
was among 16 entities
receiving a combined total
of \$2.2 million to educate
underserved producers
and small farmers about
such topics as risk management and climate-smart
farm practices. SFRC was
awarded \$198,518.

"The AAMU Small Farms Research Center



looks forward to continuing its work educating limited resource, socially disadvantaged farmers," said Chaverest. "The project aims to address pertinent issues farmers face and assist them in becoming more profitable

and sustainable in the food system."

The AAMU team will train African-American and veteran producers on crop insurance, risk management tools and strategies through a handson educational outreach program.

According to SFRC, climate change has made crop insurance critical for farmers to survive throughout the United States. However, many small, limited resource producers and socially

disadvantaged minority farmers are unfamiliar with crop insurance and the role it plays to assist them in minimizing risk.

Crop insurance and agricultural risk management strategies continue to be the cornerstone in

securing future funds, managing risk and providing support for the farmers. Thus, Chembezi and Chaverest will provide training on crop insurance, risk management tools and strategies.

SFRC will partner with Fort Valley State University and Alabama Cooperative Extension System-Auburn University in an effort that is expected to reach more than 300 persons.

Earlier this summer,
North Carolina A&T State
University announced that
AAMU was among three
partners assisting with the
success of a newly funded
Agriculture Business Innovation Center, awarded
\$1.92 million by the U.S.
Department of Agriculture.

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
