## **City Program Aims for Male Mentorship**

The City of Huntsville's Community Services Recreation Superintendent Dorianne Johnson said the department's latest outreach is the direct result of community engagement.

"Through speaking with parents and children at our recreation centers and other facilities, we learned there was a real desire for strong male role models in the lives of many boys," she said. "After researching the possibilities, we identified boys, ages 7 to 17, as our target audience and got to work!"

The resulting Male Mentorship Program launched last week with a free monthly series, titled "Under Construction." Topics will include building self-esteem and increasing self-confidence, as well as the importance of self-projection, emotional intelligence and conflict resolution skills.

Next month, attendees will explore the topic of building self-esteem on Thursday, October 6, at the Johnson Legacy Center.

## **A&M Gets \$750K USDE STEM Grant**

Alabama A&M University's program in Animal Bio-Health Sciences (ABHS) has received the support it needs to retain and to graduate minority students through innovative hands-on techniques, in addition to remote learning opportunities.

The U.S. Department of Education has awarded AAMU a three-year grant totaling \$750,000 under USDE's Minority Science and Engineering Improvement Program (MSEIP), one of the largest grants received in more recent years in the Food and Animal Sciences Department.

The grant will be facilitated at AAMU by Dr. Jorge Vizcarra, professor of food and animal sciences and the ABHS program coordinator (top right).

ABHS began in 2014 and, while not a decade old, has steadily attracted more than 100 students a year.

Following an enhancement of the program at the undergraduate level, Vizcarra and co-PIs (Drs. Martha Verghese, Josh

Herring and Gamal Eden Abdelrahim) will begin to explore the feasibility of establishing an animal biohealth sciences program at the master's level.

If successful throughout the three-year period of grant support, AAMU will offer the nation a steady supply of underrepresented minorities, primarily African Americans, to the important field of animal bio-health sciences,



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## Washington in One Minute



Here are the happenings in Washington, D.C., this week:

1. ON THE FLOOR. The House and Senate are in session this week. Both bodies have yet to start debate on the stopgap appropriations measure to keep the federal government open thru mid-December (or later) when the new federal fiscal year starts on October 1, although it is mentioned for possible floor action this week. The House is scheduled to take up the Presidential Election Reform Act, sponsored by January 6 Committee Members Rep. Zoe Lofgren (D-CA) and Liz Cheney (R-WY), which would make changes to the process for counting electoral votes in presidential elections. The bill, for example, would make it harder for Members of Congress to raise objections to a state's electoral votes by imposing a requirement that 1/3 of the Members of the House and Senate would need to object (a change from current law which requires only 1 lawmaker from each body to object). The Senate is expected to take up the temporary FY2023 appropriations measure first, possibly coupling it with Sen. Manchin's (D-WV) energy permitting reform language (or the GOP version sponsored by Sen. Shelley Moore Capito, R-WV). Last week, 22 GOP Senators sent a letter to Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-NY) urging him to bring up the FY2023 Defense Authorization bill before the end of September (the House approved the bill on July 14th on a vote of 329 -101).

2. THE WHITE HOUSE. On Monday, the President and First Lady were in London attending Queen Elizabeth's funeral, where Sunday they paid their respects to the late Queen at the Lying-in-State and signed the condolence book. On Tuesday, the President arrived in New York City for meetings with world leaders, including the new U.K. Prime Minister Liz Truss, and on Wednesday he addressed the United National General Assembly and later hosted a diplomatic reception. Last Friday,

the White House announced a "Comprehensive Framework for Responsible Development of Digital Assets," which includes the creation of an interagency task force led by the Treasury Department to consider the issuance of a U.S. Central Bank Digital Currency.

3. FEDERAL RESERVE MEETING. On Tuesday and Wednesday, the Federal Reserve's Federal Open Market Committee met to set interest rates and was expected to announce another hike in the federal funds rate by 75 basis points. The US central bank has raised the benchmark lending rate four times this year, including 2 straight three-quarter-point hikes in June and July. The U.S. annual inflation rate eased for a second straight month to 8.3% for August 2022, the lowest in 4 months, from 8.5% in July but was above market forecasts of 8.1% with large increases in the cost of food (11.4%), rent (6.2%) and used cars and trucks (7.8%).

4. ARTEMIS 1 TEST. On Wednesday at 7:15 a.m. EDT, NASA planned to test its fixes for the issues that scrubbed 2 previous launches of the Artemis 1 mission by pumping a supercold propellant of liquid hydrogen and liquid oxygen into the Space Launch System booster on Launch Pad 39B at the Kennedy Space Center in Florida. If all goes well, Artemis 1 will launch during a 70-minute window that opens

Sept. 27 at 11:37 a.m. EDT.

5. CHIPS and SCIENCE ACT. On last Friday, a report was issued by the American Institute of Physics on the workforce diversity initiatives included in the CHIPS and Science Act that was signed into law by President Biden on August 9. The new law includes a variety of provisions aimed at promoting diversity, equity, and inclusion within the STEM workforce through grant support and workforce research, and by instituting new requirements for data collection and ethical research conduct. Various provisions in the law are focused on diversifying the STEM workforce. Together, they provide guidance for education and research capacity-building programs at the National Science Foundation and Department of Energy, and mandate crossagency initiatives to expand demographic data collection, improve workplace inclusivity, and combat sexual harassment in STEM fields.

Moore will receive additional details about his \$2,500 artist honorarium and the next steps for inclusion in the forthcoming virtual exhibition, opening Fall 2022.


All winning artworks were selected from a



## **AAMU Enters Fall with Enrollment Increase, Homecoming Hype**

Alabama A&M University officials have reported a 5 percent increase in undergraduate enrollment for Fall 2022, along with a 2 percent retention increase. Fall 2021 overall enrollment peaked at 5,802 and was set at 6,008 for Fall 2022, according to data from the Office of Institutional Planning, Research, and Effectiveness.

The increase returns enrollment numbers above the 6,000 mark for the first time since the two-year period of the COVID-19 pandemic. The 300-person decline in the number of first-time undergraduates reported at the height of the pandemic in Fall 2020 was regained this fall with the reporting of 1,556.

The latest overall gains, along with more demand for campus housing, was met by AAMU through reorganization and the reassigning of select residence halls to net additional

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rooms and beds, allowing a smoother overall transition



## Mrs. Carolyn Rice Florence

As "Miss Kamama" (the Cherokee word for "butterfly"), Carolyn Rice Florence has shared her message of social etiquette for over 50 years with all age groups. As a self-made businesswoman and community volunteer, she has championed the art of social graces.

Florence's quest to transform average people into models of respectful behavior began in the 1960s with her class, "Fascinating Womanhood," which taught females the finer points of being women. Wanting to expand her knowledge base, Florence used a mix of college and specialty courses to broaden her own education. Florence studied clothing textile and merchandising at Andrews University in Berrien Springs, Mich.; and family and consumer sciences and public relations at Faith Grant College in Birmingham, Ala. She was mentored by Maxine Powell, a Motown talent agent and American Etiquette instructor, and Letitia Baldridge, Jacqueline Kennedy's social secretary. She received certifications from the National Children's Etiquette Society and Huntsville's Neil Bryant Modeling and Charm School and Tiffany's Academy of Personal Development. She also trained and worked as a make-up artist for Fashion Fair Cosmetics.

As Florence's personal

training evolved, so did her message. Along with a focus on manners, her trainings grew to include image consulting, dining skills, character education, and international business protocol. She packaged all of these specialty areas into her company, Elegant Behavior, founded in 1999 under the motto "Preparing for the King's Table."

Through Elegant Behavior, Florence has conducted seminars for churches, elementary and high schools, trade schools, and colleges. She has presented at workshops conducted by Ebony and Essence magazines; offered training to several groups at Oakwood University and Alabama A&M University; and provided workshops for community groups including Huntsville's Boys and Girls Club of America; New Futures, Inc.; and HOPE Place.

A Christian who believes in service, Florence makes time to volunteer throughout Huntsville and Northern Alabama. She has been honored for her work with the United Negro College Fund (UNCF); North Alabama's Food Bank; W.C. Handy Head Start Program; Huntsville City Public Schools' Indian Education Program; and the SAVSS program at Oakwood University Church. The pinnacle of recognition for volunteer service came through Huntsville's Retired



Senior Volunteer Program. For logging 1,000 volunteer hours each year over a span of 28 years, Florence received presidential lapel pins and certificates from Presidents George H.W. Bush, Bill Clinton, George W. Bush and Barack Obama, as an Alabama honoree.

Florence has held professional memberships in several organizations, including the National Association of Christian Women Entrepreneurs (NACWE) and the Association of Image Consultants International (AICI). Florence shares her life with Emmett Florence, her husband of nearly 60 years, two adult children and two grandchildren, a large extended family, Oakwood University Church members, and a host of citizens who have been transformed under her tutelage.
