# J.F. Drake State Receives **On-site Visit Success**

J. F. Drake State Community and Technical College is celebrating a successful on-site visit from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) for reaffirmation of regional accreditation. Regional Accreditation, the highest standard of accreditation, is a voluntary process relying on peer review of the College. Reviewers are selected from similar institutions and evaluate the College on approximately 90 rigorous standards related to instruction, administration and finance.

Additionally Drake State developed a Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP) as part of the reaffirmation process. Drake's QEP, "Mind Over Math," will be launched in January 2017. According to SACSCOC, the QEP "is a carefully designed and focused course of action that addresses a well-defined issue directly related to enhancing student learning." Mind Over Math uses the innovative

Math Emporium model and growth mindset strategies to improve students' mathematical skills and reduce math anxiety. The College has piloted the project during the past



results.

On the morning of September 22, 2016, the SACSCOC reaffirmation team met with over 25 faculty and staff members to share the preliminary results of their review. During the exit conference, the committee stated that Drake had cleared all of the standards in the Compliance Certification. While the final decision will be made by the SACSCOC Board of Trustees, this is a

very positive outcome.

"We cleared everything!" exulted Dr. Kemba Chambers, interim president of Drake State. "This is very exciting because we are definitely heading on the right path," she added.

> "We plan to celebrate this tremendous achievement in the near future."

Crystal Brown, vice-president of business and investor development at Decatur-Morgan County Chamber of Commerce, is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Alabama Community College System. Brown was

actively engaged in the onsite visit preparation with Drake State and reported "widespread enthusiasm throughout the faculty and staff as well as the students (she) spoke with."

The report of the on-site committee will be submitted to the SACSCOC Board of Trustees, who will make the announcement regarding Drake State's reaffirmation of accreditation during its meeting in June 2017.

#### CHANGE OF COMMAND CEREMONY - Friday, September 30, 2016

After a 36-year career in the Army, Gen. Dennis L. Via passed the AMC colors to Lt. Gen. Gustave Perna, who was promoted to the rank of general prior to the change of command, on the AMC Parade Field, September 30, 2016.

During the ceremony, Gen. Via reflected on his career and family. He expressed gratitude to his lovely wife, Linda, and their sons Brian and Bradley, for being there for him throughout his 36-year commitment to the United States Army.

We will miss his leadership, their loving family and the gracious and kind spirits they have displayed in the Huntsville community.



Here are the top issues in DC this week:

- 1. The House and Senate are in recess for six weeks until after the November election.
- 2. President Obama hosted "South by South Lawn" at the White House, an event inspired by the "South by Southwest" festival in Austin, Tex., which will be streamed live on WhiteHouse.gov.
- 3. Google provided more details about how it plans to incorporate data from the Obama administration's College Scorecard into its search results. The search engine will now display graduation rates, post-college earnings information and college tuition costs when users search for an individual college.
- 4. The Education Department on Friday unveiled a database of the agreements that colleges have with banks and other providers of financial products on campus. Under

new regulations finalized by the Obama administration last year, colleges were required to post online their contracts with banks and financial institutions. The department's database is a centralized list of those contracts. A separate requirement that colleges report how much money they make off of those arrangements which often include collegebranded debit cards or other products that are marketed as easy ways to access financial aid refunds - kicks in next September.

5. The Supreme Court begins its new term this week, still short-handed by the vacancy caused by the death of Justice Scalia on Feb. 13. Judge Merrick Garland, nominated by President Obama on March 16, has now been waiting 200 days for a hearing in the Senate. One of the big cases this term is a case to decide whether state legislators in VA and NC improperly relied on race when drawing electoral districts.

6. Early voting for the November election has started in Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota, New Jersey, South Dakota, Vermont, and Wisconsin. In total, 37 states and the District of Columbia will allow early voting in 2016.

7. The next Presidential Debate is scheduled for Sunday, October 9, at 9 p.m. EDT at Washington University in St. Louis, Mo. Some of the questions will be taken from the internet and persons can submit questions for the debate at PresidentialOpenQuestions.

Written for The New Yorker in the mid-1990s, this short story opens in a makeshift upstairs lab, where the narrator and colleagues are working on a time machine. They had made some progress, although it was sometimes increasingly difficult to define it.

They decided to take a break to eat in a Chinese restaurant that had originally been a laundry. The restaurant offered a wide variety of intricate, almost poetic dishes, along with a large paper lantern. In the laundry-turned-restaurant, the men marvel at how the owners use their imagination to make a dish out of nearly everything imaginable. Their fascination was cut short

by the realization that someone forgot to turn off the Bunsen burner back in the lab.

They rush back to find their lab engulfed in flames, taking down with them their dreams, along with the dreams of other innocent occupants and businesses within the building.

The narrator is reminded of another flame within a flame that symbolized his role in an adulterous affair with a woman married to a hospitalized Vietnam veteran. They, too, watched the flames of a factory building along a Chicago river. They, too, made efforts to capture time for future moments. All of these efforts met an untimely end--possibly because life has to be lived laugh by laugh, wrinkle by wrinkle, snow and cinder.


