Washington in One Minute

Here are the top issues in Washington, D.C., for this week.

1. The Senate is in session this week after reconvening Tuesday, while the House is in recess until November 13. Having finished a long, dramatic week that culminated in the confirmation of Supreme Court Justice Brett Kavanaugh on Saturday evening by a vote of 50 yeas, 48 nays, 1 present (Sen. Murkowski, R-AK) and 1 absent (Sen. Daines, R-MT),

the Senate will this week turn to debate on the Water Resources Development Act (WRDA) 2018 bill and maybe the Coast Guard reauthorization bill.

2. On Monday, President Trump participated in a ceremonial swearing-in event for Justice Kavanaugh (he was officially sworn-in by Chief Justice Roberts on Saturday evening) and then traveled to Orlando, Fla., to address the annual convention of the

International Association of Chiefs of Police.
On Tuesday, traveled to Council Bluffs, Ia., where he was expected to announce that the EPA would lift the summer ban on higher ethanol blends of gasoline (known as "E15") and participate in a campaign rally. On Wednesday, the President headed to Erie, Pa., for a campaign rally

and, on Friday, traveled to Ohio for a rally. On Saturday, he was in Richmond, Ky., for a rally.

3. Newly-sworn Justice Brett Kavanaugh joined his colleagues on the U.S. Supreme Court for the first time Tuesday morning for oral arguments in the case of Stokeling v. United States, concerning what crimes qualify as violent felonies for federal firearm offenders to trigger the 15-year mandatory minimum sen-

tence for persons with 3 prior convictions. Last Friday, Rep. Jerrold Nadler (D-NY), the likely Chair of the House Judiciary Committee if Democrats retake control of the House in November, told The New York Times that House Democrats would open an investigation into accusations of sexual misconduct and perjury against Justice Kavanaugh if they win control of the House. On Saturday, Politico reported that Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-KY) has urged the Senate Judiciary Committee to open an investigation of who "leaked" Dr. Christine Blasey Ford's July 2018 letter alleging that Kavanaugh had sexually assaulted her when they were teenagers.

4. Homeland Security Secretary Kirstjen Nielsen and FBI Director Chris Wray testified on Wednesday on "Threats to the Homeland" before the Senate Homeland Security

and Governmental Affairs Committee, which may include questions on preparations to provide cybersecurity for the mid-term elections and Facebook's disclosure last week of a security breach that affected 50 million accounts.

5. The College Transparency Act (S. 1121), a measure sponsored by Senator Orrin Hatch (R-UT) to allow the federal government to collect more data on college students, is being discussed as Congress looks to reauthorize the Higher Education Act in 2019. Specifically, the proposed data system would evaluate student enrollment patterns, progression, completion, and post-collegiate outcomes, and higher education costs and financial aid at the student level; provide complete and customizable information for students and families making decisions about postsecondary education; reduce the

requirements for reporting by colleges and universities; and link with other federal systems of data.

6. November Mid-Terms: Last Friday, the Cook Political Report shifted 3 Senate races in favor of the GOP (MT to "tossup," NE to "solid Republican," and a pullback of NJ to only "leans Democratic."). One bright spot for the D's was Ohio's Sen. Brown who was moved from "leans Democratic." to "likely Democratic." In the House, Cook shifted 8 more House seats toward the Democrats.

The outdoor market (located at the corner of






The name Wilbert L. Brown is

Under his leadership, the foundation has awarded more than \$300,000 in scholarships to local youth. Additionally, Wilbert Brown leads the local, state, regional and national fundraising efforts for Alpha's March of Dimes campaign.

Born in Mt. Clemons, Mich., but reared in Tallassee, Ala., Brown is a two-time graduate of Alabama A&M University, where he earned his baccalaureate degree in secondary education with a concentration in English and later the Master of Science in supervision and administration. A seasoned educator and sought-after practitioner for educational leadership, Brown served in various capacities with Huntsville City Schools. He culminated his career as principal of Huntsville's first Magnet School, the Academy for Academics and Arts.

Outside of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Incorporated, Wilbert Brown is a member of the Trustee Ministry at his church, Union Chapel Missionary Baptist, where he also chairs the Union Chapel Christian Academy Foundation Board of Directors. 

2018 Nobel Peace Prize Winners Embody Ego-holism Recovering's Final Steps

"Return home and tell how much God has done for you." So the man went away and told all over town how much Jesus had done for him" - Luke 8:39, New International Ver-

Nobel Committee chair Berit Reiss-Andersen: "We want to send out a message of awareness that women, who constitute half of the population in most communities, actually are used as a weapon of war — and that they need protection."

On Friday, Oct. 5, Yazidi activist/ex-sex slave Nadia Murad and gynecologist Dr. Denis Mukwege received 2018 Nobel Peace Prizes for exposing extreme female sexual violence during Islamic States and Congolese war times, respectively.

This year marks the first time the Norwegian-based award has recognized combat



zones' abused women, "an underappreciated aspect of war," some experts acknowledge.

In 2014, ISIS fighters invaded Murad's village, killing hundreds and abducting many young women; she escaped after three months of repeated rapings. While many escapees declined to be identified, she nonetheless insisted on being photographed and named, thus creating her platform for urging the US State Department to acknowledge ISIS' genocide of her people.

The Democratic Republic of Congo's eastern region had been ransacked by varied terrorist groups, and its women some of its greatest casualties. Dr. Mukwege opened his Panzi Hospital in 1999 and, while working many 18-hour days, treated multiplied thousands of rape victims.

Murad's and Mukwege's Nobels also illustrates many of the steps followed in recovering from ego-holism - the addiction to self - most notably, the overlapping of recovering steps five through seven:

- •#5, Turn your lemons into lemonade;
- •#6, Your healing is in your revealing; and
- •#7, And now that you know, go elevate and grow!

Murad converted the pain of her victimization into a global platform (#5)."This is not something I chose," she told a 2017 Washington Post

interview. "Somebody had to tell these stories. It's not easy" (#6); in her 2017 book, The Last Girl: My Story of Captivity, and My Fight Against the Islamic State, Murad detailed her experiences, calling her captivity "a slow, painful death - of the body and the soul"

As a preacher's son, Mukwege toured eastern Congo with his father. Shocked at the number of childbirth complications from his father's congregants who solicited the elder's prayers, he then determined to school in France to become a gynecologist (#5). He addressed the women's childbirth and rape victimizations by creating a hospital named Panzi (#6), which also became the name of his 2014 book (#7).

Most of us seek to hide or dismiss our pains, but Purpose Driven Life author/

pastor Rick Warren suggests otherwise, declaring, "Your greatest life messages and your most effective ministry will come out of your deepest hurts. The things you are most embarrassed about, and most ashamed of

and most reluctant to share are the very tools God can use most powerfully to heal others."
