
100 Black Men Prepare for Annual Gala

Washington in a Minute



Here are the top issues in Washington, D.C., for the week of October 16:

1. The Senate returns to session this week after being out last week. The House is in recess this week. The Senate will take up an \$36.5 billion emergency funding bill for hurricane and wildfire relief and recovery that the House passed last week by a vote of 353-69, which includes \$4.9 billion in low-interest loans to help Puerto Rico from running out of cash during its recovery. The Senate was expected to take up the FY 2018 Concurrent Budget Resolution, which contains budget reconciliation instructions that would allow the Senate to take up a tax cut that could increase deficits by up to \$1.5 trillion over 10 years - and need only 51 votes to pass under the same strategy the Senate used for the failed Obamacare repeal plan. The House passed its version of the budget resolution on October 5.

2. President Trump hosted a meeting of his

cabinet Monday at the White House and had a luncheon meeting with Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-KY). On Tuesday, he hosted Greek Prime Minister Alex Tsipras at the White House and then gave the keynote address at the Heritage Foundation's dinner at the Marriott Marquis Hotel in Washington, D.C.

3. Eighteen states and the District of Columbia - led by California Attorney General Xavier Becerra - filed a lawsuit on Friday to stop the Trump Administration from halting key Obamacare subsidy payments to insurers, which help cover the cost of deductibles and copayments for lower- and middle-income people (which cost \$7 billion this year and were estimated at \$10 billion for 2018). Last Thursday, President Trump announced he was ending the payments. The lawsuit will seek a temporary restraining order, preliminary injunction, and permanent injunction requiring the cost-sharing reduction payments be

made. Congressional Republicans have argued that the original 2010 Obamacare law did not include specific language providing appropriations to cover the government's cost of the subsidy payments (which are separate from the subsidy payments made to individuals to help them pay their healthcare premiums). The states in the lawsuit are: California, Connecticut, Delaware, Kentucky, Illinois, Iowa, Maryland, Massachusetts, Minnesota, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, Virginia and Washington.

4. The U.S. Supreme Court had a deadline of Friday, October 20, to decide on a petition from the City of Houston, which seeks a review of the Texas Supreme Court's decision in Pidgeon v. Turner that held that the Constitution does not require states and cities to provide tax-funded benefits to same-sex couples. The Texas Supreme Court decided that the landmark gay rights case of 2015, Obergefell v. Hodges,

merely required states to license and recognize samesex marriages to the same extent that they license and recognize opposite-sex marriages, but they do not have to provide the same publicly-funded benefits to all married persons.

5. Last Thursday, the National Rifle Association (NRA) announced its opposition to legislation introduced by Senator Dianne Feinstein (D-CA) and Rep. Carlos Curbelo (R-FL) that would ban the use of bump stocks, a device that





What You Can Do Now Before Filing Your Tax Return for 2018

While we will not start filing our tax returns for a few months, there are a few things we can do to make the process easier next year.

There are two things that could affect the 2017 returns that will be filed in 2018.

1. Report name changes

Recently married or divorced individuals who change their names should notify the Social Security Administration. They should also notify the SSA if a dependent's name changed. This needs to be done so that when the individual files next year, the new name on the tax return matches. A mismatch between the name shown on a tax return and the SSA records can cause problems in the processing of the tax return and may even delay the tax refund.

2. Renew Individual Taxpayer Identification Numbers (ITIN)

Individuals who use an Individual Taxpayer Identification Number should check to see if their number expired in 2016 or will expire this year. If so, and they need to file a return in 2018, they should apply now to renew their ITIN to avoid certain disallowed tax credits and processing delays next year.

Individuals who have not used their ITIN to file a

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federal return at least once in the last three years will see their number expire Dec. 31, 2017. Additionally, ITINs with middle digits 70, 71, 72 or 80 will also expire at the end of the year.

Only taxpayers with expiring ITINs need to take any action. To renew an ITIN, a taxpayer must complete a Form W-7 and submit required documentation. No tax return is required when submitting an application to renew.


