Mayor Battle: Top Retail Store Coming to Huntsville

Huntsville Mayor Tommy Battle delivered his annual State of the City address virtually this year. One of the highlights of the presentation was Battle's announcement that the Rocket City is getting a Trader Joe's retail store in MidCity District on University Drive in 2021.

Based in Monrovia, Calif., and part of the German-owned ALDI chain, Trader Joe's is a chain of grocery stores and has more than 500 stores in more than 40 states and the District of Columbia. It was founded in Pasadena over 60 years ago.

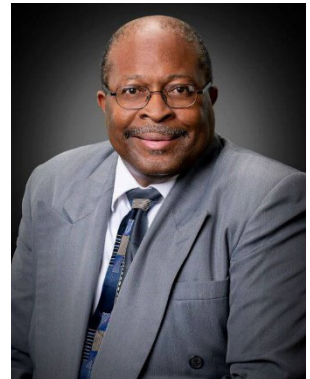
Glassdoor ranked the store #14 in the nation in 2020 in the category of best places to work.

AAMU Receives \$3M DoD STEM Award

Alabama A&M University (AAMU) has been awarded a new grant totaling \$2.96 million over three years from the DoD NDEP (National Defense Education Program) under its Science Technology Engineering Mathematics (STEM) education, outreach and workforce initiative programs.

According to the DoD announcement, "the goal of this

DoD effort is to establish programs to better position the current and next-generation STEM workforce, which is critical to the Department and our Nation's security." The DoD NDEP program awarded a total of \$31 million over a three-year period to fund STEM education, outreach, and workforce initiatives for students and educators from early childhood through post-



secondary.

The AAMU response was one of only 12 selected for funding from a competitive national pool of 182 submissions. Dr. Paul Ruffin, chief scientist of AAMU-RISE and an adjunct professor in AAMU's physics program, is the principal investigator.

Drake State, NASA Enter Cooperative Agreement for Space Construction

Drake State Community & Technical College has been selected by NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Ala., as a partner to develop 3D printing technologies that will help prepare for sustainable Artemis operations on

the Moon by the end of the decade and for future human missions to Mars.

Drake State submitted a proposal to Marshall's seventh competitive Cooperative Agreement Notice (CAN) for Dual-Use

Technology Development solicitation, and the award will fund collaborative research in support of NASA's Moon to Mars Planetary Autonomous Construction Technologies (MMPACT) project. This project aims to develop, deliver, and demonstrate ondemand capabilities to protect astronauts and create infrastructure on the lunar surface via construction of landing pads, habitats, shelters, roadways, berms and blast shields using lunar regolith-based materials.

Drake State is the first community college and only historically Black commu-

nity college to receive a cooperative agreement award from Marshall's CAN opportunity since its inception in 2013.

The research team consists of students, instructors and administrators from the college's Engineering Design program. It will test 3D printed concrete structures to help develop construction techniques suitable for building landing pads, roads, and other large structures on the Moon.

"Being Huntsville's community college, we're especially proud to have received this CAN award," said Dr.

Patricia Sims, President of Drake State Community & Technical College. "We've been a part of the Rocket City since 1961. The opportunity to support NASA with our research project is truly exciting."

The one-year research project is funded through NASA's Minority University Research and Education Project (MUREP).

The research team will collaborate with ICON, an innovative 3D printing construction company in Austin, Texas, that is working with NASA on early research and development of a space-based construction system that could support future exploration of the Moon and Mars.

Washington in One Minute



Here are the happenings in Washington, D.C., this week:

1) The Senate is in session this week and the House is out, although Members have been told that they will be given 24 hours' notice if a deal is reached with the White House on a coronavirus relief bill and votes on the House floor are necessary (NOTE: On Sunday, House Speaker Nancy Pelosi set a deadline for the White House of Tuesday, Oct. 20, to submit final language to the House for review). The Senate will vote on a \$500 billion GOP coronavirus relief bill on Wednesday, which reportedly may include additional federal unemployment benefits, a new round of loans under the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP), and \$100 billion for schools, as well

as money for testing, contact tracing, and vaccine development and distribution. On Thursday, the Senate Judiciary Committee is expected to send the nomination of Judge Amy Coney Barrett to the Senate floor, with floor debate expected to last through the weekend with a vote by the full Senate on the following Tuesday (Oct. 27).

2) President Trump this week has campaign rallies in Arizona, Pennsylvania and North Carolina. On Thursday (Oct. 22) from 9-10:30 p.m. EDT, the President and former VP Joe Biden met at Belmont University in Nashville, Tenn., for the final presidential debate, which was moderated by NBC News White House correspondent Kristen Welker. The six debate topics were: Fighting COVID-19,

American Families, Race in America, Climate Change, National Security, and Leadership.

3) According to ProPublica, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) will held a preliminary meeting Thursday (Oct. 22) on potential COVID-19 vaccines to discuss the standards the FDA will seek before authorizing a vaccine. The FDA has committed to holding advisory committee meetings to review data from individual vaccine candidates.

4) Last Friday, the U.S. Supreme Court announced that it would expedite an appeal by the Trump Administration in a dispute over a July 2020 memorandum, in which President Trump ordered the Commerce Department to include information in the 2020 Census' state-by-state breakdown that would enable the President to exclude people who are in the country illegally for use in the allocation of seats in the House of Representatives. The justices (who will likely be joined by newly-sworn Justice Amy Coney Barrett) will hear oral argument in Trump v.

New York on Nov. 30. A three-judge district court issued an order on Sept. 10 that blocked the Trump Administration from implementing the memorandum in a lawsuit filed by the State of New York, plus 21 other states, the District of Columbia, 15 cities and counties, and the U.S. Conference of Mayors.

5) Upcoming: on October 28, three giants of the tech world, Twitter's Jack Dorsey, Facebook's Mark Zuckerberg, and Alphabet/Google's Sundar Pichai, will testify remotely before the Senate Commerce Committee on the topic

of whether social media platforms do enough to stop the spread of misinformation and whether the sweeping immunity granted by Section 230 of the Communications Decency Act enables "

6) Education and Workforce: Community colleges throughout the country are creating contact tracing courses to meet the urgent demand for trained people able to track COVID-19 infections and thus slow the spread of the disease. According to the American Medical Association, states and localities in the U.S. need at least 100,000 contact tracers "to meaningful-

ly control transmission of the virus as states continue to lift social distancing restrictions." Before the pandemic, the nation has just 2,200 contact tracers. Students who complete the program can secure jobs at state or local health departments or private organizations contracted by public agencies.

DAP2.0 Documents Successes

After 33 years of running Drug Alternative Program (DAP) – a 12 to 18 month substance abuse recovery program for adult men – Cliff and Freddie Harris were ready to slow down. They had watched God guide DAP to miraculous successes since starting the program in 1987.

They'd helped to free hundreds of men from substance addictions, and DAP had garnered a 65 percent success rate, much higher than the 15 to 20 percent of other national recovery programs. With that kind of reputation, Cliff and Freddie felt their purpose for DAP was complete and they decided to retire.

The Harris' moved from California to their "vacation" home in Huntsville, Alabama – now their permanent home. As Cliff and Freddie settled into their new routines, their experience as substance abuse recovery leaders resulted in requests for their help. They agreed to lead an overcomer's support group for Oakwood University (OU) students and a substance abuse support group for Oakwood Univer-

sity Church (OUC) because once a servant leader, always a servant leader.

During that time, Cliff felt a sneaking suspicion he tried his best to ignore. Was the Lord calling him to begin a new DAP site in Huntsville? Like Jonah, his and Freddie's first impulse was to resist and run the other way. But like Jonah, Cliff and Freddie eventually accepted the Lord's call and started scouting for a location. True to form, God led Cliff right to the house He'd picked out for their first recovery home.

The home owner noticed Cliff walking around the property and saw the sign, "Drug Alternative Program" on his truck. She looked DAP up on the web and decided she wanted Cliff to have her home so DAP could make a difference in the community.

The house, set on 3½ acres of land, is an eight-bed facility. With five current clients, they have room to add three more. And instead of being an additional DAP site, the Huntsville facility is DAP's new home.

DAP's signature work therapy program – their lawn/landscaping service – has already gained clients and is looking to gain more. Through this part of the program, DAP's recovery clients work to pay off one half of their program expenses. Their professional work can already be seen around OUC, Oakwood Memorial Gardens Cemetery, and several residential yards in DAP's neighborhood.

"I want to help multitudes of people come to Christ," Cliff says. Already, four of their five current clients have accepted Christ through baptism.

Neither Cliff nor Freddie knows how long God wants DAP to continue. But they're committed to working tirelessly to add to God's kingdom, one recovered addict at a time.

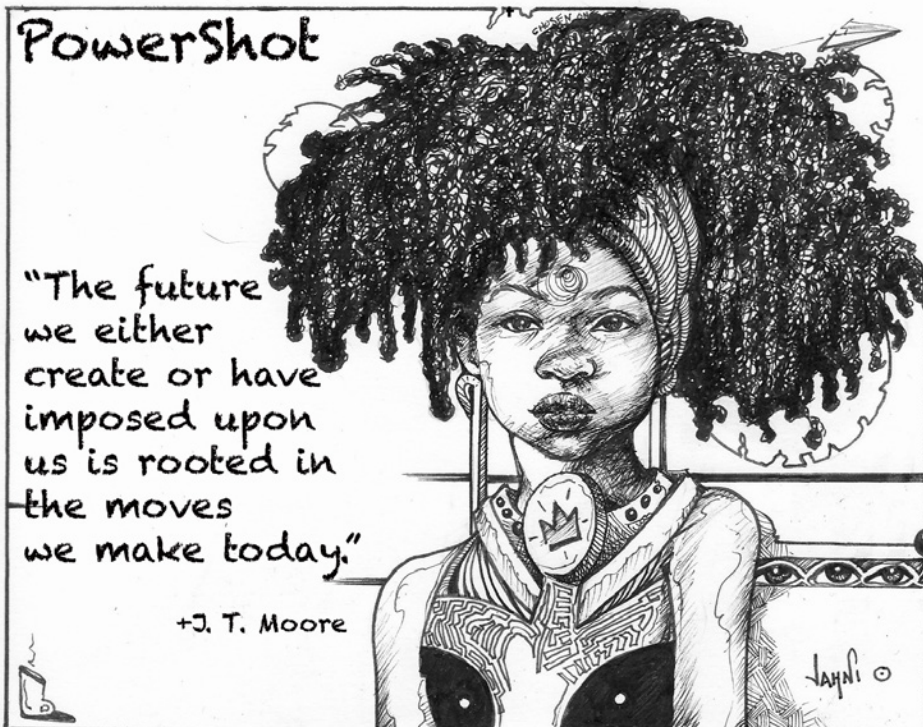

Needed: More Ants in your Mailbox!

"Take a lesson from the ants, you lazybones. Learn from their ways and become wise! Though they have no prince or governor or ruler to make them work, they labor hard all summer, gathering food for the winter" - Proverbs 6:6-8, NLT.

Here, King Solomon advised that just like ants, one can be productive without a top leader.

And today's United States Postal Service (USPS) workers are following that Solomonic advice.



(Not) Playing Post Office

According to The Washington Post, "With the Postal Service expected to play a historic role in this year's election, some of the agency's 630,000 workers say they felt a responsibility to counteract cost-cutting changes from their new boss, Postmaster General Louis DeJoy, that they blame for the mail slowdowns.

"They question whether DeJoy — a top Republican fundraiser and booster of President Trump — is politicizing the institution in service to a president who has actively tried to sow distrust of mail-in voting, insisting without evidence that it will lead to massive fraud, <https://wapo.st/34ioco>.

More than in previous times, this year's presidential election will be influenced more by below-the-radar and "leaderless" USPS workers; here, they are exercising their civic (and moral) responsibility over bureaucratic politicizing.

These workers are showing their true mettle as "silver-mettle leaders," or leaders from the middle.

Are You A Silver-Mettle Leader?

You are a silver-mettle leader if you:

1. Report to someone in your organization - whether it's in your family, workplace or church (silver);
2. Perform your often-unheralded tasks with character, fortitude and courage (mettle); and
3. Succeed primarily NOT through your title or position, but through your influence and your relationships (leader).

Dr. Joseph Henderson

Coach Joe Henderson was born in Hale County, Ala. He received his high school education from U.S.



Jones High School in Demopolis, Ala. He later earned both the Bachelor of Science degree in history and physical education and the master's degree in counseling and guidance from Alabama State University in Montgomery.

Continuing his educational pursuits, Coach Henderson earned his educational specialist degree from Georgia State University in Atlanta, Ga., in psychological counseling. He received the Doctor of Education degree from George Peabody College at Vanderbilt University, Nashville, Tenn.

He served his country in the U.S. Army as a military policeman for two years, becoming the first African-American to receive "MP of the Month" at Camp Casey, Korea.

In 1975, Coach Henderson entered the ranks of college coaching at Alabama A&M University. His first assigned duties were as an instructor in physical education, athletic counsel, assistant basketball coach and head track coach. Coach Henderson produced seven (7) Olympians, over 100 All Americans, three NCAA Division II Women's Outdoor Championships and one Indoor NCAA Division II Women's Championship. His women's team won 16 consecutive SIAC outdoor track and field championships and 12 consecutive SIAC cross country championships. Some of his most successful athletes were: Grace Jackson Small (Olympic Silver Medalist, Jearl Miles Clark (Olympic Gold Medalist); Dannette Young Stone (Olympic Gold Medalist); and several others.

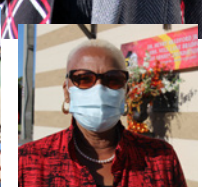
