S.R. Butler Star Signs with Milwaukee Bucks

Former Butler High School basketball star Trevor Lacey has been signed by the Milwaukee Bucks to an Exhibit 10 deal.

Lacey turned 28 October 13 and is still known to fans from his time in college with both Alabama and North Carolina State.



In his final season in college, Lacey averaged a solid 15.7 points, 4.6 rebounds, and 3.5 assists per game with the Wolfpack, while shooting 39.2 percent from deep on 5.7 attempts per game. All of that combined for Lacey to be named as a Second Team All-ACC pick from the media.

Lacey built a steady career as a role player overseas spending two seasons in Italy, before joining Russia's Lokomotiv Kuban for the last two years. Lacey shot over 40 percent from deep in each of his seasons in Russia, and could bring similar marksmanship to the G League, according to behindthebuckpass.com.

HCS Makes Large Gains on State Report Card

Huntsville City Schools (HCS) has advanced from a "C" to a "B" on the latest Alabama State Report Card, with the district average increasing five points from a 77 to an 82. Almost 90% of schools in the district saw an increase on their individual report card, with 15 schools increasing by an entire letter grade. The largest increases were in the areas of reading growth, math growth, and attendance.

Last year, HCS proactively developed indicators of future success using accountability measures from the state report card but also an additional layer for continuous improvement. This is a key component of

the district's strategic plan which focuses on the whole student.

Superintendent Christie Finley is very proud of what the school system has accomplished, stating that it is "a true testament to what is happening in the classroom."

Finley thanked students, parents, and community partners, along with teachers, "who work diligently to ensure our students are achieving at high levels."

The Alabama State Report Card uses several pieces of information for the report that include academic achievement and growth, chronic absenteeism, graduation rates, and college and career readiness data.



Highlands Elementary School celebrates!

The report card is considered a snapshot in time that can look at a school's performance year after year to monitor academic progress and growth.

State Superintendent Eric Mackey says that the report card can tell us "something valuable about a school or

school system, but it does not tell us everything."

Mackey says that it is also very important to take a closer, more detailed look at the challenges a school faces, the aspirations and goals they have set, and the variety of ways in which they might have succeeded.

Presbyterian Official Will Address Fellowship PC

The Reverend Dr. J. Herbert Nelson, II, Stated Clerk, General Assembly, Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) will be the anniversary speaker, at Fellowship Presbyterian Church, 3406 Meridian Street, Huntsville, Ala., Sunday, November 10, 2019 at the 10 a.m. worship service.

Dr. Nelson was elected at the 222nd General Assembly (2016) in Portland,

Ore. The son, grandson, and nephew of Presbyterian pastors, Nelson is the first African American to lead the denomination, which has a

300-year history in the U.S. Prior to becoming Stated Clerk, Nelson served as director of the PC (USA)'s



Office of Public Witness in Washington, D.C. His service to the denomination also includes calls as pastor of St. James Presbyterian Church, Greensboro, N.C., and organizing pastor of Liberation Community Church in Memphis, Tenn.

As an extension to his ministry in the PC (USA), Nelson served as associate director of the Benjamin L. Hooks Institute for Social Change at the University of Memphis.

As a consultant, he provided staff development training for teacher specialists, curriculum specialists, and principal leaders who provide assistance for low-performing schools.

Consequences But Not Condemnation

Genesis 3:16-19;
Ephesians 6:6-8

Someone has rightfully said, "One can choose to sin, but not the consequences."

Right from the very beginning, God made it clear that there are consequences for disobedience. However, when applied by God, mercy is always present; that is, until that day of

final judgment.

In the case of our first parents we see that there were consequences for them, but they were not condemned. When looked at carefully, the consequences actually assured them of God's continued presence and help. The pain in childbirth, for the woman, would give way to the joy of seeing that newborn come into the

world. A woman's desire to "control" her husband is off set by the exhortation to submit to their husbands, as to the Lord. The Spirit is present to enable her to not give in to her "natural" desire, but rather to submit to the supernatural power of the Spirit of God.

Wiley Joseph Henderson was born in Clarke County, Ala. He was a distinguished graduate, longtime employee and retiree of Alabama A&M University. He participated in further studies at the University of Alabama at Birmingham, University of Alabama in Huntsville, Auburn University, University of Tennessee and Central State University.

Henderson was actively involved in civic and community outreach programs for more than half a century. As a young professional, he organized a civic club to inform and increase voter registration in his rural south Alabama community.

He also helped to organize a federal credit union to serve minority educators. For several years, he served as chairman of the board for this

organization.

He remained at the forefront as a leader in his church. While serving as chairman of the trustee board, he spearheaded a fundraising effort that resulted in the building of a new edifice. He also served as superintendent for the Sunday School.

Upon moving to Huntsville, he and his family affiliated with the NAACP, Alabama Democratic Conference, and First Missionary Baptist Church. He served as a board member for the Child Development Center at First Missionary Baptist Church, and as an advisor for the Fellowship of University Students. He participated in the Congregational Care and Keenage Ministries. Over the years, Henderson skillfully used his fraternal affiliations



as a venue for community outreach. While serving as president of his undergraduate chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, he began a legacy of working with programs that enhanced the health, social and leadership skills of young black males.

He has also received recognition as Professor of the Month and Teacher of the Year.

Washington in One Minute



Here are the happenings in Washington, D.C., this week:

1. The House and Senate are in session this week. The House will take up a bill to create a duty on the part of candidates and political committees to immediately report attempts by foreign agents to influence an election and will also mandate that political ads sold online (e.g., Facebook, Twitter and Google) are covered by the same rules as ads sold on TV, radio, and satellite ... On Thursday, the body of Rep. Elijah Cummings (D-MD), who passed away last week, laid in state in Statuary Hall in the U.S. Capitol and a ceremony was held that morning. Rep. Cummings's funeral was held Friday at 10 a.m. at New Psalmist Baptist Church in Baltimore.

2. The Senate took up a treaty allowing Northern Macedonia to enter NATO and then turned to debate on some of the FY2020 appropriations bills, likely Transportation/HUD, Agriculture, and Defense (the Senate has to date passed none of the 12 annual appropriations bills and the House has passed 10 of the 12 bills). There is still no agreement between the House and Senate on the individual allocations for the 12 appropriations bills and the clock is ticking on the stopgap measure keeping the government open, which expires on Nov. 21, 2019.

There is also considerable discussion on whether to bring up a Turkey sanctions bill in view of its incursion into Syria.

3. President Trump on Wednesday travelled to Pittsburgh, Pa., to deliver the keynote address to a gathering of shale gas producers. On Thursday, he participated in a ceremony marking the start of the Hindu festival of lights, known as Diwali, and also presented the Presidential Medal of Freedom to auto racing team owner Roger Penske. On Friday, he travelled to Columbia, S.C., to speak at a criminal justice forum focused on the African American community held at Benedict College. The forum also heard from at least 9 of the 2020 Democratic candidates, including Biden, Booker, Buttigieg, Harris, Sanders, and Warren. Notably, the forum will hold its first straw poll of all students and alumni of the 8 historically black colleges and universities (HBCUs) in South Carolina, who will vote online for the presidential candidate that best addresses their concerns ...

4. On Last Tuesday, House Education and Labor Committee Chairman Bobby Scott (D-VA) released the College Affordability Act, its proposal to overhaul the Higher Education Act (HEA). The legislation includes prioritizing federal

funding for states offering free tuition programs at community colleges that let students use other forms of aid for nontuition costs, as well as maintaining funding for public higher education. However,

it does not include notable progressive priorities, including those that have gained traction on the 2020 presidential campaign trail, such as debt-free college at four-year universities and sweeping student loan forgiveness for existing borrowers ...

6. Last week, the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee announced that Boeing CEO Dennis Muilenburg will testify before the committee on October 30 in his first public hearing since the 2 fatal crashes of the company's 737 Max jets. on the aircraft ...

7. On Friday night at 8:07 p.m. EDT, the World Series will return to Washington, D.C. for the first time since October 7, 1933, when the New York Giants beat the Washington Senators in Game 5 to clinch the Series at the old Griffith Stadium in D.C. (now the site of Howard University Hospital). On Friday, the WASHINGTON NATIONALS will host the Houston Astros for Game 3 of the Series (as well as Games 4 and 5, if necessary). GO NATS!!!
