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Washington in One Minute



Here are the top issues in Washington, D.C., for this week.

1. The House and Senate are in recess until November 13.
2. This week, President Trump had three campaign rallies on his schedule with a trip to Houston on Monday, Mosinee, WI on Wednesday and Charlotte, NC on Friday. On Tuesday, the President hosted state officials from Alaska, California, and Hawaii

at the White House for a "State Leadership Day Conference."

On Wednesday, the President spoke on the nation's opioid abuse crisis. According to The Washington Post, the President has held 27 rallies to date for GOP candidates in the 2018 mid-term elections.

3. On Sunday, President Trump and Treasury Secretary Steve Mnuchin announced that the Administration will release shortly a new tax cut

plan specifically targeted at the middle class, although no other details were released. Secretary Mnuchin said that he has been working with House Ways and Means Committee Chair Kevin Brady (R-TX) on the new plan – but would not say which tax brackets would be affected nor how the bill would be financed.

Last year's \$1.5 trillion tax cut is expected to add \$1 trillion to the national debt, with the latest numbers showing the 2018 federal budget deficit growing by 17% to \$779 billion, largely due to a steep decline in federal revenue because of the tax cut.

4. According to the SCOTUS Blog, for the first time in its history, the majority of the Supreme Court Justices' law clerks are women, including all four (4) clerks who work

for new Justice Brett Kavanaugh.

5. The New York Times reported on Sunday that the Department of Health and Human Services has drafted a memo that would define male and female under the federal civil rights statute (known as "Title IX") as unchangeable determined by the genitals a person is born with, which would largely eliminate the Obama Administration's recognition and protections for the estimated 1.4 million Americans who identify as transgender.

6. Approximately 150 students and their teachers from around the country gathered in Washington over the weekend for a student gun

violence summit organized by gun control groups and teachers' unions. At the summit, attendees adopted a students' bill of rights aimed at making communities safer. The steps include the creation of transparent safety committees at schools and implementing equitable funding to under-resourced schools for after school programs.

7. There are 15 days until the mid-term elections. According to Politico, the most recent round of campaign finance disclosures on Saturday showed a surge of GOP big donor cash, with the national party committees, key House and Senate candidates, and the top super PACs having \$337 million on hand, compared to the Democrats' \$285 million.

The Cook Political Report on Friday predicted a 25-35 net pickup of seats for Democrats in the House (they need 23 to take control), although it noted that the Brett Kavanaugh confirmation battle has energized GOP voters. In the Senate races, Cook has four (4) of the 26 Democratic seats as a tossup (FL, IN, MO, and MT), with North Dakota's Sen. Heitkamp now in the "leans Republican column." On the GOP side, of the 9 seats in the election, 4 are tossups: AZ, NV, TN and TX.

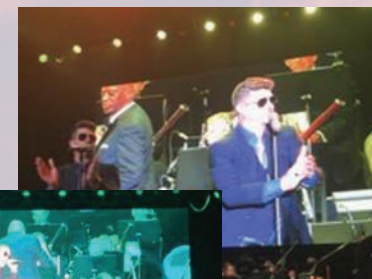
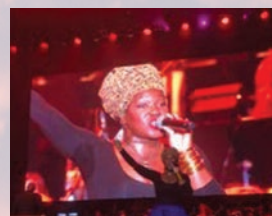
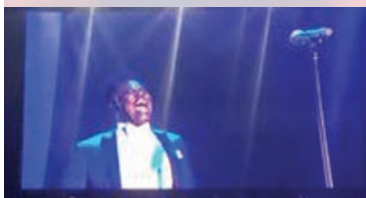

Millennial Thought

Consciousness and the HBCU Experience

Sometimes, it is easy to feel a certain level of societal acceptance when we are embedded within the warm arms of historically black colleges and universities (HBCUs). There is often a feeling of protection, oneness and a chance to expand and breathe more freely. However, an HBCU is not the world, but its charge is to prepare us for storms and opportunities beyond its borders.

Academics, etiquette and all those things that prepare us for the “real” world are nice, but without a firm foundation in our past, they profit us nothing. Without knowing who we are as a people—grasping as our own the accomplishments of a Marcus Garvey, a W.E.B. du Bois or even the true history of the Black Panther Party, we become—and are viewed by others—as a mere imitation. An African with no ties to Africa. A pseudo-European with no land claims to Europe.

“A people without the knowledge of their past history, origin and culture is like a tree without roots,” said Marcus Garvey. But

some millennials feel that the past is not relevant to the present nor as a means toward intergenerational unification. In one sense, we feel that it is not important because of advances in technology. We can look up any person from the past, read about them and quickly study their contributions. That’s not quite the same as having a meaningful relationship with the past that can sustain one’s present and support one’s future.

However, some feel that the past holds the key, imparting important information for the next generation, limited only by HBCUs’ willingness to formally incorporate the black experience into the curriculum and fabric of the institution for the benefit of those to come. This is a task that is not for the weak. This requires a Hannibal.

So, where do we go from here? Do we have to prod black colleges to build black people? Would not doing so serve all of mankind? Why not form a total 100-school HBCU alliance dedicated to assessing where our black youths are and where they

need to be? An alliance transcending state lines and curricular limitations and that is bold enough to mandate two comprehensive semesters of black history—just as a start? This course would transcend the watered-down accounts of Martin Luther King and Rosa Parks received in high schools.

I believe that sometimes we are afraid to hone in on the past because we are somewhat ashamed that we know so little about it. What would happen to us with this new empowerment? Dare we think about how the world would have differed if more black men had crossed the Alps to claim Rome?

Now, some might ask: why is it the college’s responsibility to show the history of our people? I say it is because, minus churches, it is the only institution that spans the generations. And, an HBCU must be more than an acceptable copy of the flagships. It must be an institution with a mission to meet the needs of a student on the inside. Learning our unique history can unify us and prepare us for the world-class leadership deserved by the world’s first people.

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Three Strikes NOT Out - But UP!

Joseph replied, "Don't be afraid. Don't you see, you planned evil against me but God used those same plans for my good, as you see all around you right now—life for many people. Easy now, you have nothing to fear." - Genesis 50:20,21

The US Justice Department's three-strikes law - a.k.a. the "habitual offender law" - derived its name from baseball's three-strikes-and-you're-out tradition.

But now, baseball can no longer authenticate this axiom, according to Julio Daniel Martinez.

On Thursday, Oct. 18, this Boston Red Sox slugger and MVP candidate went 2-for-3 with the lead-off solo home run, leading his team in the American League Championship Series (ALCS) into the World Series, by defeating 4-1 the defending World Series champion Houston Astros - that fired him in 2014, after three seasons.

After striking out in Houston, Arizona and Detroit, "J.D." credits now his ALCS opponent: "My failures in Houston are what made me who I am ... There's really no animosity there. In a sense they did me a favor by allowing me to leave and play on another team."

The key? Martinez kept on swinging, never struck out. Former Detroit Tigers teammate Justin Verlander, a one-time Rookie-of-the-Year/Cy Young/MVP,

recounted being "there from the moment he turned his career around. He went and completely revamped his swing that offseason, and saw immediate dividends. Never stopped hitting. Seeing somebody like that who works so hard and turned their career around to where he's at now, as a fellow player, and you respect it, and I'm happy for him."

As you and I continue recovering from ego-holism - i.e., the addiction to self, either from our big (arrogance, etc.) egos or from our little (low- or no esteem) egos - we must also follow recovering step #5: turn your lemons into lemonade.

Meet Martinez's new I-won't-give-up All-Star teammates:

1. Thomas Edison: "Our greatest weakness lies in giving up. Just because something doesn't do what you planned it to do doesn't mean it's useless. Opportunity is missed by most people because it is dressed in overalls and looks like work. . . ." After one failed attempt, this electric light bulb inventor consoled a downcast associate, "I have not failed. I've just found 10,000 ways that won't work";

2. Sir Edmund Hillary failed multiple times before leading the first team to reach the summit of Mount Everest, the world's tallest mountain, in 1953. After one such failure, he stood at the base of this



3,028-ft. mountain, shook his fist and declared, "I'll defeat you yet, and you know why? You're as big as you're going to get, but I'm still growing!";

3. Defeated resoundingly in 2000 for a Chicago congressional seat, he noticed surprisingly both how his candidly attracted majority white precincts and how systematically small donations added up from neighborhood black churchgoers. Fusing together those two polarized audiences in 2008, Barak Obama became the first US president whose last name began and ended with a vowel! And finally

Mr. Hutchinson's original shop was housed in Huntsville's first African-American owned commercial office building, built by Mr. Lawrence Hundley, first generation owner of Royal, who purchased the funeral home from its original owners, The Binford Family, in 1946.

Second, Mrs. Ollye Ballard Conley, a Huntsville native, became the first African-American female principal in Huntsville City Schools and the Academy for Science and Foreign Languages, a free-standing magnet school. An innovative educator and social advocate, she is highly recognized for her devel-

opment of the Alabama African-American Historic Project designed to teach students to document history, and to preserve and protect historical monuments and artifacts.

Third, in 1961, Mr. Thornton Stanley, Sr., proprietor of Stanley's Landscaping and Construction Company, Inc., began his business with two employees, one dump truck and a backhoe that today contributes over \$2 million annually to the North Alabama jobs economy. Fueled by his professional philosophy "Find a Job or Make One" and a strong work ethic, Mr. Stanley received the 2001 SBA National Small Business Person of the Year—a prestigious honor presented by President George W. Bush during a historic White House Ceremony.

And lastly, self-made entrepreneur and media giant, Mr. Hundley Batts, Sr., is managing general agent of Hundley Batts and Associates Insurance Agency and owner of four radio stations in North Alabama and Tennessee. For over half a century, Mr. Batts has served as commission-

er and chairman of various boards and foundations advocating for economic development, providing leadership and resources for disadvantaged youth and giving a voice for underserved audiences.

David W. Smith, Sr. stated, "We are ecstatic to present these awards at our gala. We chose to use the name *Sentinel* for the awards because it symbolizes the nobility of a true soldier or guard who stands watch. These four individuals certainly exemplify longevity and excellence in their various occupations, business and community endeavors directly aligned with Royal's mission of service to our fellow man."

The story of Huntsville's oldest black business began in 1918 with its first operator and owner, Mr. Charles King Binford. A Huntsville native, young Binford hails from a family lineage of educators and civic/politi-

cal leaders. His father, Mr. Henry Claxton Binford, retired as principal of the Colored City School, a Huntsville's Alderman, chairman of the Republican Executive Committee of Madison County, editor of the *Huntsville Journal* newspaper and the Most Worshipful Master of Alabama Colored Masons.

Serving families throughout North Alabama and surrounding communities, Royal's original location was in downtown Huntsville at 230 W. Holmes Avenue and later relocated to 118 W. Holmes Avenue, where Mr. Binford ran the enterprise until his death in 1940. In 1946, Mr. Lawrence B. Hundley, Sr., and Mrs. Amanda Rice Hundley purchased the funeral home from Mr. Binford's widow, Mrs. Carrie Parker Binford.

In 1969, The Hundley's son-in-law and daughter, Mr. James A. Jones, Sr. and Mrs. Barbara Hundley Jones purchased the funeral home, followed by the third generation, Mr. David W. Smith, Sr., and Mrs. Karen Jones Smith, who purchased the funeral

home in 2000. The Smiths are the son-in-law and daughter of the Joneses.
