From the Editor



Many of you know that my dear sister, Vanessa, lost the fight in 1995 to the enemy--breast cancer. She was the victim of too much "trust." She discovered her own lump, but she trusted her physician even after she told him that she found a lump. He sent her for a mammogram and told her that she did not have breast cancer. We encouraged her to get a second opinion; however, her doctor was telling her, "You do not have cancer, we have looked at the results of the mammogram." They performed a lumpectomy to console her and again insisted that the lump was benign.

There were months of going back and forth, with a breast that was not healing after the lumpectomy, and she was being told that healing was a slow process! Our family eventually convinced her that a second opinion was warranted. Her husband took her out to Houston, Texas, to the University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center. MD Anderson is one of the original three comprehensive cancer centers in the United States. Further, this facility is considered the best hospital in the world for oncology and related cancer treatment. It was there that she was told that not only did she have breast cancer but that it was advanced to the point that they would be using the most progressive treatment available to her.

From MD Anderson to Vanderbilt University, from chemotherapy to radiation, to an eventual bone marrow transplant. My family and I were living in Nashville at the time. We urged her to come there for the bone marrow transplant because our sister--Mary--and I could be close to her. God knows we tried everything available for her; however, her time had come. Fortunately, most physicians today are not and should not be offended by the request of a second opinion. Many doctors will suggest it when the patient has persistent questions about the results of a test, diagnosis, or nagging medical issue. That was not Vanessa's case. At 38 years old, breast cancer extinguished her life. She left her devoted husband and three beautiful children at home, in the same community where we grew

up. Her husband passed away a few years later with pancreatic cancer. From the time of her gruesome discovery until her death, she never could understand the "how" and the "why" of her diagnosis.

With Vanessa, God was able to add another young, beautiful flower to HIS garden. Our family is grateful for her short life. Her life has taught us many things over the years, including: get an annual mammogram; seek a second medical opinion if things just don't seem right or if you are unsettled about the opinion you have been given; hold close to family and friends; share experiences with others to diminish or remove taboos; and, understand the importance of education and training. The more we know, the better we can respond. Had we known then what we know now about breast cancer, the importance of early detection and treatment options, we might be in a different space. My mother and four of her eight daughters have been diagnosed with cancer. What we now know is that although Vanessa's life was short, she did not live in vain--she taught us so much!

We are still learning, educating and training. October is my trigger. I have made my appointment for a mammogram. My OB/GYN recommended it for me again this year. What about you? Have you taken the time to have your mammogram scheduled? Flannery O'Connor once said, "The Life You Save May Be Your Own."



AAMU Professor to Train Nigerian Officials


An Alabama A&M University transportation professor has been approved by the State of Osun House of Assembly (Nigeria) to conduct a workshop for government leaders.



Breakthroughs in Cancer Testing Could Impact Lives

(BPT) - Jim Ford felt completely healthy. He didn't have any symptoms and kept up with recommended cancer screenings. When his doctor suggested he participate in a clinical trial for a new cancer screening test that could detect a shared cancer signal across 50 different types of cancer, he figured he had nothing to lose.

But then the test—a multi-cancer early detection test called Galleri®—showed a positive signal. Ford's diagnosis was confirmed with a CT scan and a PET scan. He was shocked to learn he had stage 2 pancreatic cancer.*

He worked with his doctor and had surgery, radiation and chemotherapy.

Treating cancer starts with knowing you have it

Early detection of cancer can improve outcomes,

including higher survival rates and better quality of life. It also can reduce the cost and complexity of cancer treatment.

The challenge is that, although there are more than 100 different types of cancers, only five cancers have recommended screenings in the United States—breast, cervical, colon, prostate, and lung for smokers considered at risk. In fact, approximately 70% of cancer deaths are caused by cancers that don't have widespread screening recommendations.

In addition, because most cancers don't show symptoms until later stages, they may be found too late when they have already spread and there may not be as many treatment options.

Detecting multiple cancers through a simple blood draw

Multi-cancer early detection tests, like Galleri, can be used alongside existing recommended screenings to detect cancer earlier. Using the power of next-generation sequencing and artificial intelligence, the Galleri test can detect a shared cancer signal across more than 50 types of cancer through a simple blood draw.

The Galleri test does this by examining DNA isolated from blood. All cells in the body shed DNA into the bloodstream, but DNA released by cancer cells is different from the DNA released by healthy cells. This DNA may contain specific patterns that allow cancer to be distinguished from non-cancer.

The test looks for a signal present in the blood that could indicate the presence of cancer. If a cancer signal is detected, the test can predict

where in the body the cancer signal is coming from with high accuracy and help a healthcare provider determine appropriate next steps.

The Galleri test must be prescribed by a healthcare provider and can be incorporated into annual health checks or routine blood work, if appropriate. It is generally recommended for adults with an elevated risk of cancer, such as those aged 50 or older. False-positive and false-negative results do occur, and the test should be used in addition to routine screening tests healthcare providers recommend.

Be proactive and take action

One in two men and one in three women in the United States risk getting a cancer diagnosis in their lifetime, according to the American Cancer Society.

Although Ford is now part of that number, the multi-cancer early detection test gave him an opportunity to treat his cancer early, when he had a higher chance of successful treatment.

"The surgeon said that I was probably one of the luckiest people she'd ever met, because she almost never sees stage 2 pancreatic cancer. Usually people at this stage have no symptoms, and you don't find it early," said Ford.

Galleri was designed to improve detection of cancers like Ford's that are more aggressive and deadly.

Thinking about the possibility of cancer can be overwhelming, but people can now take proactive steps to test for many cancers, increasing the chances of finding them early and before symptoms. Learn more about multi-cancer early detection screenings and the
