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Here is what's happening in Washington, D.C., the nation's capital, this week:

1. CONGRESS. The House and Senate are in session this week. The House will spend the week getting through two FY2024 appropriations bills: (1) Transportation/HUD and Financial Services/Gen Gov't. Last week, the House GOP leadership abruptly pulled the Transportation/HUD bill due to objections from Northeast Republicans over the \$1 billion cut to Amtrak funding ... The Senate may take up a bill to provide funds for Ukraine and

Israel (the House narrowly passed a bill last week that contains \$14.3 billion for Israel only) and also may turn to a resolution to change Senate rules to overcome a hold Sen. Tommy Tuberville (R-AL) has imposed on hundreds of military officer promotions since February protesting the Pentagon's policy offering time off and travel reimbursement

to service members seeking abortions or fertility care (although Sen. Tuberville has allowed a handful of top leaders to be confirmed) ... Senate Republicans are convening a special meeting this week to

OU Prez, Board Respond to **Alums and Supporters**

In "An Important Message from Oakwood University" recently posted on the institution's website, OU trustees sought to address financial and other concerns from stakeholders.

"After reviewing the financial records of the University, the Board found that certain assertions were based on misunderstandings," noted Board Chair Alexander Bryant. "The Board focused on the University's financial challenges during their Executive Session, which are being addressed in various ways and will be announced once the audit for this year is completed. The Board recognizes that faith-based education institutions face particular financial challenges, and Oakwood University is no



exception. Despite these challenges, discussions with our Auditors and OU financial staff have underscored that the leveraged debt of the University does not threaten its solvency."

The message goes on to provide updates on an array of areas ranging from recruitment and renovations to technology and increased communications.

Bryant and OU President and Board Secretary Leslie N. Pollard asked OU supporters to "recommit" to its mission.

2. THE WHITE HOUSE. Last Monday, President Biden issued his much-anticipated executive order to govern the development of artificial intelligence in accordance with 8 guiding principles. Last Friday, the President and First Lady traveled to Lewiston, Maine, to pay respects to the victims of a mass shooting that killed 18 people. The President met with Amtrak workers in New Castle, DE, and delivered remarks on the economy. This weekend, the President will travel to San Francisco for the 5-day Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) leaders' summit, which will include a private meeting between President Biden and Chinese President Xi Jinping. 3. SUPREME COURT. On Tuesday, the Court heard oral

arguments in a major gunrights case challenging the constitutionality of a federal

ban on the possession of guns by individuals who are subject to domestic violence restraining orders (U.S. v. Rahimi). 4. GOP DEBATE. On Wednesday at 8 p.m. EST, GOP presidential candidates held their 3rd debate in Miami, FL. NBC News hosted the debate and with reportedly 5 candidates on the stage: Chris Christie, Ron DeSantis, Nikki Haley, Vivek Ramaswamy and Tim Scott. Former President Trump is not expected to attend, but was in a New York City courtroom Monday taking the stand in his civil fraud trial.

5. OCTOBER JOBS REPORT. Last Friday, the Labor Department announced that the U.S. economy added 150,000 jobs in October, which was below the expected 170,000 jobs predicted by economists. The unemployment rate rose to 3.9% from the previous month's 3.8%. Manufacturing jobs declined by 35,000 last month, largely due to the UAW strike against the Big 3 U.S. automakers. Last Wednesday, the Federal Reserve's Federal Open Market Committee held the federal funds interest rate steady at 5.4%, its highest level in 22 years.

6. HIGHER EDUCATION. Last Thursday, the House of Representatives voted 396-23 to approve a resolution condemning the support of terrorist organizations and antisemitism on college campuses. The resolution (H.Res. 798) is the latest response by Congress to the rise in pro-Palestinian student demonstrations on campuses related to the Israel-Hamas conflict that started in early October. Last week, the Senate passed a similar resolution, S.Res. 418 by voice vote.



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



Valley Weekly AAMU Trustees Holds Regularly Scheduled Session in the Magic City

During its regular Board Meeting October 26, 2023, the Alabama A&M University Board of Trustees paved the way for several new partnerships and programs to enhance recruitment and expand opportunities for students. The Board received University-wide updates from President Daniel K. Wims and Cabinet leadership and entertained several key initiatives during Magic City Classic week meetings.

"As we look toward the 150th anniversary of this University, we're growing in a way that we've not seen in our recent history," said Dr. Daniel K. Wims, president of Alabama A&M University (below). "We



have to be strategic about managing that growth and building the necessary support alongside this thriving Alabama A&M of the future."

The Board approved a new MOU with Girls Incorporated of Huntsville to create a STEM Center on the campus and provide programming for up to 400 students grades 1-12. Alabama A&M also entered into a new partnership with Ross University School of Medicine to collaborate to increase admission opportunities to AAMU students.

Board President Pro Tempore Dr. Roderick Watts (top right) placed an exclamation on the meeting by outlining the Boards commitment to helping the University reach new heights.

"In order for us to go



places we've never been, we're going to have to do things we've never done," said Trustee Watts.

"This University is on an upward trajectory. In order to go new places, we're going to have to do the things that are uncomfortable. Much of the work we will do together has never been done before. That's going to be uncomfortable. Some people see problems. I see opportunities for increased growth and development."

Watts says the mission toward becoming an R2 institution and continuing to increase enrollment will take a commitment from everyone in the AAMU community. "I want to share my commitment to this administration, to this Board, and to the direction this University is headed," he said.

Board members echoed Trustee Watts' position that a unified approach is crucial to continued success. Trustee Dr. Elizabeth B. Richardson says new efforts to engage the community are already paying dividends for the University.

"As one of the newest Trustees, I am so grateful for how this administration has really intention-



ally engaged in outreach and building meaningful partnerships with our city and county government," said Trustee Richardson (above). "I'm excited now when I meet officials and can express the wonderful work this administration is doing to support not only our students, but really for the community. I've been able to witness, in a very short period of time that, among this cabinet, there is an admiration for the President and his leadership."



The Board also approved several new partnerships geared toward bolstering recruitment for graduate programs. New threeyear MOUs with Albany State University, Benedict College, Fort Valley State University, Lane College, Lemoyne-Owen College, Mississippi Valley State University, Paine College, Philander Smith College, and Tougaloo College will facilitate the admission of qualified graduates into AAMU School of Graduate Studies.

Trustees also commented on the successes surrounding 2023 Homecoming activities including recordbreaking attendance, record-breaking fundraising, enhanced gameday experience, and more.

"I was blown away at Homecoming," said Trustee Ralph Williams. "Many of my classmates have called it the best one ever. I've

been around this State to every HBCU. We have best in class people, no matter the title. I have high expectations, but this staff has far exceeded them. The alumni are really proud, and we're

a tough crowd." Dr.

Charles McClelland. the sixth Commissioner of the Southwestern Athletic Conference. addressed

concerning his work to position the University and conference for success. McClelland expressed his belief that AAMU has strongly positioned itself for the future of the Magic City Classic and other

events. "All of the other classics are predicated upon ticket sales," he said. "This Classic is not. That is extremely important. It's a guarantee that you have a significant payout."



Sweet Trails Alabama, alongside the Singing River Trail and Jacksonville State University, recently concluded a five-day, 11-stop statewide Swing Around the State Tour aiming to identify trail projects while collecting valuable info from communities.

The initiative is key in building a network of outdoor trails in Alabama, connecting communities and creating a better quality of life for residents. Hundreds of Alabamians from diverse communities came together during the tour to support the idea of a statewide trail route.

"The initial five-day tour provided us with a wealth of insights that we will use to craft the trail route plan,"

said John Kvach, Executive Director of the Singing River Trail. "With the support of our communities, we can create a trail network that connects every corner of Alabama. We are encouraging the people of Alabama to dream big!"

State Senator Andrew Jones, District 10, was a key sponsor of SB298, which established the Sweet Trails Alabama Project Fund. Senator Jones joined the tour and spoke about how this initiative will strengthen community bonds and create more opportunities throughout Alabama.

The tour, with stops in Huntsville, Florence, Tuscaloosa, Selma, Atmore, Mobile, O range Beach, Dothan, Montgomery, Birmingham,

and Jacksonville, was made possible by a \$25,000 donation from the Alabama Association of Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) Councils. These Alabama RC&D Councils are made up of volunteers who identify the unmet needs in their communities and create solutions across Alabama.
