
The evening will begin with a reception starting at 6 p.m., and the program

Your Washington Recap

Here are the top issues in Washington, D.C., this week:

1. The House and Senate are in recess and will reconvene next week. Assuming the party keeps its majority, the House Republican Conference is scheduled to hold its closed-door elections for Speaker, Majority Leader, Whip, Conference Chair, Vice Chair, Secretary and Policy Committee Chair on Nov. 15. The House Democratic Caucus will hold its leadership elections sometime during freshman orientation in November — either the week after the election or the week after Thanksgiving.

- 2. On Monday, President Obama campaigned for Hillary Clinton in Michigan, New Hampshire and Pennsylvania.
- 3. Over the weekend, FBI Director James Comey sent a 5-sentence letter to Congressional leaders stating that the FBI's investigation of additional e-mails (announced on October 28) had been completed and that no charges would be filed against Hillary Clinton.
- 4. The Supreme Court reinstated an Arizona law making it a felony to collect early ballots, overturning a Friday decision by 9th Circuit Court of Appeals that had blocked the law. In Arizona, voters can

request an early ballot to be sent to them before the election, which they can then mail or drop it off at a polling locations as long as it is received by 7 p.m. on Election Day.

Strength Training Could Protect Memory

Exercise is a path toward brain health as one ages, according to BlackDoctor. org. Thus, lifting weights may protect persons against memory loss. In fact, according to a group of Australian researchers, hitting the weights as little as twice a week may help ward off Alzheimer's disease and other forms of dementia.

The study involved 100 men and women, ages 55 to 86, who were all diagnosed with mild cognitive impairment (MCI) were divided into two groups. Those assigned to strengthtraining used a weight machine, working to at least 80 percent of their peak strength during each session. As their strength increased, so did the weight.

Meanwhile, those assigned to the latter group, used a computerized brain-training program in addition to following a basic exercise routine. In 2014, the study's primary results, revealed that those in the strengthtraining groups made significant improvements on tests to measure cognition — persisting even 12 months later.

Brother Clarence Hall attended Councill Training and after the Army attended AAMU and had a career with IBM as a program manager. 




