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Drake State Names Advisory Board

A nine-member advisory board has been named to oversee Drake State Community & Technical College's new Frontiers Research Program (FRP). FRP was established after Drake State was selected by NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center as a partner to develop 3D printing technologies to support the Artemis mission.

The Frontiers Advisory Board, made up of technical experts, NASA officials and community leaders, will provide guidance to the research team throughout the yearlong project.

"NASA is calling on us to help develop construction techniques suitable for use on the moon," said Dr. Pat Sims, president of Drake. "Our advisory board has the expertise to help guide our efforts as we complete this significant work."

In addition to the advisory board, the Frontiers Research team will be supported by representatives from NASA Marshall Space Flight Center and ICON, a construction technologies company leading the 3D space construction research efforts for NASA.

Drake State is the first community college and only historically black community college to receive a cooperative agreement award from Marshall's CAN opportunity since its inception in 2013. The FRP team, which consists of students, instructors and administrators from the college's Engineering Design program, will test 3D-printed concrete structures to help develop construction techniques suitable for building landing pads, roads, and other large

structures on the Moon.

(R) District 22; and Lisa Williams, co-founder and president, 3D Research Corp.

the variables, Huntsville is the clear choice for this vitally important unified combatant command."

The Air Force anticipates making a public announcement on its decision in early 2021.

OSHA Announces \$3.1M in Coronavirus Violations

If you believe your employer has OSHA violations, please take action. Since the start of the coronavirus pandemic through Nov. 12, 2020, the U.S. Department of Labor's Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) has issued 232 citations arising from inspections for violations relating to coronavirus, resulting in proposed penalties totaling \$3,148,452.

OSHA inspections have resulted in the agency citing employers for violations, including failures to:

Implement a written respiratory protection program;

Provide a medical evaluation, respirator fit test, training on the proper use of a respirator and personal protective equipment;

Report an injury, illness or fatality;

Record an injury or illness on OSHA recordkeeping forms; and

Comply with the General Duty Clause of the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970

The primary food provider for the Senor Center closes during the Christmas season. With your support, more than 1,500 meals will fill the gap.



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

Finally, Jesse summoned from shepherding his youngest David, and God directed Samuel to anoint him.



Even as silver-mettle leaders are untapped leaders who lie often below their organization's surface, so too are under-the-surface conditions that can hinder or doom, as the Titanic captain showed

The Edward John Smith Model

On April 15, 1912, this Titanic captain was warned of an upcoming iceberg. Like Jesse's older sons, it was towering and impressive. Smith steered his ocean liner to avoid what he saw of the iceberg - only 10% of the frozen mass.

Smith failed to account for the iceberg's lower-lying 90% mass, which buttressed the upper visible ice tower. Therefore, the Titanic struck unknowingly that below-

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Washington in One Minute

Here are the happenings in Washington, D.C., this week:

- 1. ON THE FLOOR. The House and Senate are in recess this week. There is not yet a deal on the FY21 defense authorization bill, the FY21 appropriations package, or a COVID-19 relief bill, but congressional staff representing Speaker Nancy Pelosi, House Minority Leader Kevin McCarthy, Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell and Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer met last Thursday to discuss legislation in the lame duck session.
- 2. LATEST ELECTION RESULTS. The makeup of the Senate in next year's 117th Congress is currently 50 Republicans to 48 Democrats (a net gain of 1 for the Democrats) with the 2 Georgia seats not to be decided until the January 5th runoff elections. To date, House Democrats have lost a net of 7 seats to the GOP and the House currently stands at 222 Ds to 205 Rs with 8 seats undecided, according to The Washington Post.
- 3. NEW BIDEN STAFF. On Tuesday, President-elect Biden announced his first cabinet secretary nominees. Last week, he announced his top White House staffers, including: Chief of Staff: Ron Klain

4. PRESIDENTIAL
TRANSITION. Last Thursday (Nov. 19), key congressional committee chairs demanded a briefing no later than today (Nov. 23) from

General Services Adminis-

trator Emily Murphy on her

ongoing refusal to grant the Biden-Harris Transition Team access to critical services and facilities specified in the Presidential Transition Act and the millions of dollars in funding that Congress appropriated on October 1, 2020, for transition activities under the Act. The letter to Murphy warned that

the House may call her up to the Hill for a hearing on the matter.

5. BIDEN INFRA-STRUCTURE PLAN OUTLOOK. Advocates are hopeful that President-elect Joe Biden and his former Senate colleague Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-KY) will work together for possible action next year on a major infrastructure package. Under his \$2 trillion Build Back Better proposal for reviving the U.S. economy, Biden envisions investing in schools, water systems, municipal transit, universal broadband and affordable housing. Moving the proposal through

Congress, though, would require extensive cooperation with Republicans, especially Majority Leader McConnell -- who since May has spurned a comparably sized pandemic relief package pushed by House Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-CA). President-elect Biden highlighted infrastructure in an economic summit November 16. Most Americans favor additional investment in public works. A February 2020 poll conducted by The Pew Charitable Trusts showed that 68% of U.S. residents support an increase in federal infrastructure spending. The poll was conducted before the coronavirus pandemic damaged the U.S. economy, however.

6. TREASURY ENDS CARES ACT LENDING PROGRAMS. In a surprise move last week, Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin announced that several coro-

navirus-related lending programs will end on December 31, including the primary and secondary market corporate credit facilities, under which the Federal Reserve purchased corporate bonds, as well as the Municipal Liquidity Facility for state and local governments, the Main Street Lending program and Term Asset-Backed Loan Facility, aimed at keeping the market for those securities liquid. In addition, Mnuchin requested that the Federal Reserve return \$455 billion in unused funds. The U.S. Chamber of Commerce decried the move as prematurely and unnecessarily tying the hands of the incoming Biden Administration and closing the door on important liquidity options for businesses at a time when they need them

7. HOUSE LEADERSHIP ELECTIONS. The House

chose its party leadership positions for the 117th Congress last week with House Speaker Nancy Pelosi and Minority Leader Kevin Mc-Carthy and their top team members winning reelection in their respective party caucuses. Newcomers on the Democratic Leadership team include Rep. Katherine Clark (D-MA) who defeated Rep. David Cicilline (D-RI) for Assistant Speaker and Rep. Pete Aguilar (D-CA) who beat Rep. Rep. Robin Kelly (D-IL) for Caucus Vice Chair. Speaker Pelosi will still need to win a majority of votes from the full House to remain Speaker when the 117th Congress begins in

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
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
